FARM PROSPERITY IS ESSENTIAL TO ALL HUMAN UNITS

EVERY person capable of practical judgment is vitally interested in the development of just values for farms and strong markets for farm products. The prosperity of agriculture determines directly or indirectly the prosperity of every group. There are honest differences of opinion as to the best public policies to pursue in gaining permanent relief for farm communities, but no one is indifferent to the importance of results as a sound and lasting basis for the general welfare. Some believe under-consumption of farm products is more the fault than over-production, and that as consumption catches up with production, the need of curtailed cultivation will be removed. This adjustment between production and demand, by whatever means it may be accomplished, is a healthy prospect and the thing most needed and most desired by everybody.

CLEANUP WORK IS NEAR FINISH

Precinct Representatives To Meet And Form Board Of Control Association.

Wayne county farmers who have signed the clean-up reduction contracts, numbered 1,909 Tuesday, G. H. Liggett, agricultural agent, reports. Precinct chairmen are finishing their clean-up campaign this week, explaining the plan to farmers who have not yet signed. Those who wish to sign do so at the court house.

Those who have signed contracts will meet in the various precincts this week to form their permanent precinct organization. These meetings will elect a precinct chairman and three additional precinct committeemen. The chairman will automatically become a member of the Corn-Hog Control association board.

Chairman and the other three will inspect all contracts in each precinct and will also appraise the contracted acres in the precinct they represent. This work will probably begin the last of next week.

The county board, composed of the chairman from each precinct, will meet next Wednesday afternoon at the court house in Wayne. At this time also will be elected the allotment committee, which will make final appraisal on all corn-hog contracts in Wayne county. Paul H. Stewart of Lincoln, plans to be here for next week's meeting.

At the state press association meeting in Omaha E. W. Huse of Wayne, was named one of four editors of the state as a special committee to work with the corn-hog administration on a satisfactory method and rate of publication of names and basic figures of farmers who sign corn-hog contracts.

George J. Kirsch, field inspector for the Crop Production Loan Office, will talk over WJAG on the farm forum hour at 2:00 p. m. Sunday, March 11.

At this time Mr. Kirsch expects to have the new regulations for crop loans in this territory and to be able to tell farmers just what the conditions for a new crop loan will be.

In talking to G. H. Liggett Monday afternoon, Mr. Kirsch said that he was sure no farmers in the hall district would have any trouble in securing a crop loan with which to purchase oats seed this spring.

Corn Loans Totals. County Clerk Bertha Berres reports 414 corn loans in Wayne county up to Tuesday night. These represent 494,120 bushels, or \$222,354.

HENRY B. BRUSE DIES IN HOSKINS

Funeral Rites Are Conducted At Lutheran Church With Burial In Altona.

Henry B. Bruse, resident of Hoskins almost 40 years, passed away at his home Thursday, March 1, after an illness of over four months, aged 63 years, 11 months and 21 days. He was stricken last October 25 with a severe heart attack from which he never recovered.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at Trinity Lutheran church in Hoskins with Rev. Im. P. Frey officiating. A mixed quartet, consisting of Mrs. Frey, Mrs. Ed. Winter, Rev. Frey and Carl Flinup, sang "The Homeland." Interment was in Altona cemetery. The Beckenhauer funeral service of Wayne, was in charge.

Henry Christian Bernhard Bruse was born in Wandrum, near Schwerin, Germany, on March 9, 1870, the son of Joachim Bruse and Karoline Luebke Bruse. He was baptized in the Lutheran faith March 20, 1870, and was confirmed in Wittenford, Germany, April 6, 1884, by Pastor Thomoelen.

In the fall of 1884 Mr. Bruse came with his parents to America, residing first at Oakland, Neb., and later at Hooper. In 1895 the family moved to a farm north of Hoskins where they lived for almost 25 years. In 1919 deceased moved into Hoskins, his home since. He served as village marshal for more than 12 years.

Mr. Bruse married Miss Alwina Johansen October 17, 1897. To this union was born one daughter, Wilhelmine, now Mrs. Emil Barelmann of near Wayne. Besides his wife and daughter, Mr. Bruse leaves one sister, Mrs. Henry Kleen-sang, and two brothers, John and William, all of Hoskins, his son-in-law, Emil Barelmann, and two grandchildren, Mildred and Myllette Barelmann, of Wayne. His parents preceded him in death, also one sister, who died in Germany, and one brother, Fred, who died October 9, 1933.

Mr. Bruse was a member of Trinity Lutheran church for many years, and his faith was great comfort during his long illness. The village of Hoskins and fire department were among those who recognized Mr. Bruse's faithful services with special floral pieces.

VALUATIONS DOWN TO LOWEST LEVEL IN TWENTY YEARS

IN AN address before the Nebraska county assessors' meeting in Grand Island this week, State Tax Commissioner W. H. Smith expressed the belief that bottom had been reached in most property valuations, but suggested that the question of still further reductions in real estate valuations for the year 1934 would rest on the judgment of county assessors. Commissioner Smith explained that land valuations were fixed last year generally below those of 1913 and in some counties even below those of 1908. The lack of demand for land and accordingly the comparatively low prices asked for it on sale would seem fully to warrant the tax valuations following a level below that of the 1908 quotations. Even with a strengthening of farm prices, there should be delay in stimulating tax valuations until agriculture has been able to catch its breath and move upward with assurance of more nearly adequate rewards. Scaling down taxes has been an important part in the recovery movement, and the tax load should be kept bearably light.

JOHN W. MORGAN DIES ON FRIDAY

Funeral Services Carried Out According To Request Of Wayne Man.

John W. Morgan, 86, passed away Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock from effects of a heart attack which he suffered Wednesday last week. According to his own wishes, funeral services were conducted Tuesday morning at 9 at the Beckenhauer parlors with Rev. W. E. Braisted of Holdrege, formerly of Wayne, in charge. The Beckenhauer took the body to Harlan, Iowa, Tuesday where Rev. Braisted and the Methodists had charge of rites at 3 at the Methodist church and committal forwarded in the Harlan cemetery beside the body of Mrs. Morgan, who died March 27, 1929.

Mr. Morgan's death occurred a month to the hour after his granddaughter, Miss Margaret Graves of Harlan, was fatally injured.

John W. Morgan was born February 15, 1848, in Fredericktown, Washington county, Pa., a son of John and Nancy Cannon Morgan. His paternal grandfather had come from Wales to Morgantown, W. Va., and his maternal grandmother was of Pennsylvania Dutch stock. His mother was of Irish and English descent.

In 1862, at the age of 14 years, Mr. Morgan united with the Methodist Episcopal church, the Ulrey church as it was called in Pennsylvania. He married Miss Hannah Jane Chapman January 20, 1870.

In 1870 the Morgans moved to a farm near Harlan, Iowa, where Mr. Morgan was county commissioner from 1892 to 1898. The family came to Wayne in 1906 and resided here since.

Five children were born to the Morgans, Orval Oliver, who died in 1902 at the age of 30, Wilder, Frank, Jessie and Ella. Surviving are four children, Wilder, of Granite Falls, Minn., Mrs. Fred Graves of Harlan, Iowa, Frank S. Morgan and Mrs. Roscoe Jones of Wayne. There are 16 grandchildren and six great grandchildren. Mr. Morgan leaves two sisters, Mrs. Drisilla Dixon of Streator, Ill., and Mrs. Eda Hohneshell of Cornell, Ill.

Wider Morgan, who came from Granite Falls Monday, Mr. and Mrs. S. Morgan and Jack, Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Jones, F. L. Blair and Rev. Braisted went to Harlan, the last two returning the same day and the others remaining until Wednesday. Mr. and Mrs. Morris Jenkins of Carroll, and Eunice Ward and E. W. Clark of Yankeetown, were here for the funeral.

Kiwanians Hear Insurance Talk

A. T. Cavanaugh Is Speaker At Luncheon Meeting Here Monday Noon.

"Wayne people spend enormous amounts for insurance annually but know very little about it," said A. T. Cavanaugh in his talk on insurance before Kiwanians club Monday noon. Mr. Cavanaugh pointed out that five rates are made up by the Nebraska inspection bureau which is supported by all fire insurance companies in the state. Rates for a hotel, for instance, are much higher than an ordinary back building because of the greater number of people inhabiting it—each one a fire hazard.

Speaking of auto insurance, he states that the original rates were evolved in 1914 but have been much changed since that time. For one thing, average speed of motor cars has increased from 35 to 40, to 80 and even 95. About 1925 there were few closed cars and motorists could hear approaching cars, but with the advent of closed cars, danger increased. The only way to cut down auto insurance rates is for every driver to be careful in his own driving, for fewer accidents will mean fewer claims to pay, and consequently a lower rate.

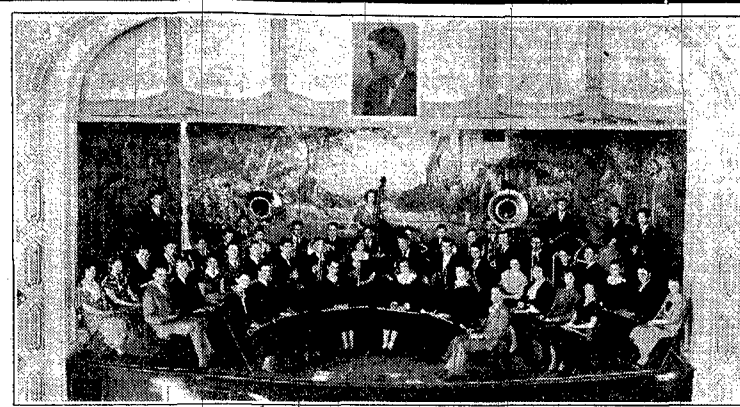

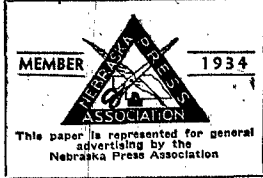

Demands Of NRA

Gen. Hugh S. Johnson's immediate goal for the employment of a million more men in industry by still further shortening hours without decreasing wages is possible of attainment if there are left enough employing institutions that can stand the extra strain. Small industries and small businesses which are already toiling under overhead expenses not justified by earnings, will find exceeding difficulty in trying to meet additional demands. The thirty-hour week could probably be made to work if wages were reduced accordingly and if skilled labor were not essential. Green hands cannot be moved like automats into places of responsibility with any certainty that production will not slip. Possibility for shorter hours will depend on the endurance of an institution and the flexibility of its requirements.

Beginning of spring work on the farm may be expected to absorb some of the surplus help, though how much will be determined by the degree to which decreased acreage will reduce labor demands.

General Johnson is evidently a resourceful thinker and a powerful organizer, but he is too hardboiled and dictatorial in his manner of speech to bring the highest popular momentum back of his efforts. If his irritating personality were pushed into the background and if his conclusions and wishes were allowed to filter to the public through an affable front, the response would be more cordial if not more complete.

It is a truism, often mentioned, that for substantial resources that require no artificial means of respiration, the mid-western area is nowhere equalled.

The crime wave still waves despite the intensified determination of authorities to puncture and extinguish it. The crime menace terrorizes one community after another, and capture of the guilty is made difficult by the improved means employed by criminals to avoid capture. Every orderly member of society should lend every possible assistance to the authorities in taking outlaws out of circulation and bringing them to justice.

Among leading attractions in Wayne this week-end will be the annual district basketball tournament in which teams from a number of high schools will compete for honors. Many of the students who come will be planning to begin college training next fall, and it is hoped they will find advantages here in harmony with every wish. Wayne should and can prove its merits as educational headquarters for northeast Nebraska.

There can be equality of opportunities, but, as the Omaha Journal-Stockman points out, "some people always will contrive to earn and have more of this world's goods than others." Concludes that newspaper: "Take the incentive of some reward for his work out of the life of the go-getter and the whole world would very soon stop going."

We cannot keep other nations from engaging in the folly of war, but the United States can keep out, and by so doing it will be in better condition to protect and help unfortunate peoples of the world. While Nebraska law requires publication of proceedings of city councils, it makes no provision for the publication of proceedings of school boards. An official report of one is just as important as an official report of the other, and the legislature should awaken to the need and act accordingly.

ding is firm in the center. Serve hot, with top milk, if desired.

Six tablespoons of cocoa may be substituted for the chocolate. Mix this with milk as for the beverage cocoa, and proceed as above.

Prepare a sauce with the milk, flour, fat and salt. Add the cheese, and stir until melted. In a shallow greased baking dish place the potatoes, pour the cheese sauce over them, and cover the top with the bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven for 20 to 30 minutes, or until the crumbs are golden brown and the potatoes are thoroughly heated. Serve from the baking dish.

Place a layer of the salmon in the bottom of a greased baking dish, add some of the sauce, then another layer of salmon, and so on until all the ingredients are used. Cover the top with the bread crumbs and bake in a moderate oven until the sauce bubbles up and the crumbs are brown.

Cook the carrots in the boiling water until just tender. Fry the salt pork until crisp, remove it from the fat, and cook the onions over the fat. Stir in the flour and cook a few minutes longer. Mix all ingredients in the upper part of a double boiler, stir until well blended, and cook about 10 minutes.

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BACK TO THE FARM.

Though farming has been hit hard and is having an uphill struggle to get back to a standard of fair profit, we notice that more persons are going back to agriculture than ever before. Back to the land, getting away from irritating rivalries of town business, has been the wish of not the realization of increasing numbers. Especially the man who owns a farm without large pressing obligations, is the fortunate person in the world at this time. Of this we are reminded by the decision of Allan Hoover, second son of former President Hoover, to abandon a "white collar" job and become a "dirt farmer." Some months ago, young Hoover quit a banking position and turned to practical farming, learning to prune trees and vines and to spread water from irrigation ditches. His thoughts of future advantage and future content are but in harmony with those of many others who are turning from the cities to the rural areas with certainty of greater independence and greater peace of mind.

Wayne County Family Wins Fight For Bequest Of Former Negro Slave.

After 10 years of dispute, the estate of George Mattingly, former negro slave, was settled in favor of the Mattingly heirs, several of whom live in this county. Mr. Mattingly died in Butler county in 1924, leaving an estate valued at \$150,000, which now has shrunken to about \$20,000. He left farm property near David City, willing \$10,000 to Joseph Mattingly or to his heirs. Joseph was dead when the negro died in 1924, and his children pressed their claims to the estate through J. E. Brittain. There were many other claimants, and several legal contests were heard in Butler county, as well as in the Nebraska supreme court, before final settlement of last week. Charles Mattingly, grandfather of the two, was a white man. George's grandmother was a negro and Joseph's was a white woman, so the local families are descendants of the white branch of the family.

Wayne Appears In Military Dress For D. A. R. Visitors

Flags floating aloft... the refreshing contrast of bright, clear red, white and blue greeting one on every hand... priceless family antiques grouped in Main street windows... newcomers everywhere, well-dressed, well-poised, keen looking women wearing blue and white badges... Wayne has taken on a bustling and quickening air... which is reminiscent of those World War days... For Douglas King, chapter of Daughters of American Revolution is playing hostess to other chapters of the state, and all Wayne city is taking a friendly and active interest in the event.

About 145 women now make up the Douglas King chapter, including several from neighboring towns of Wakefield, Winside and Laurel. Mrs. C. A. Orr is regent, and the other officers are: Mrs. C. P. Oman, vice regent; Mrs. Paul S. P. Oman, secretary; Mrs. A. R. Davis, treasurer; Mrs. J. H. Montgomery of Wakefield, historian; Mrs. Clara Ellis, chaplain; Mrs. Henry Ley, registrar; Mrs. C. E. Wright, organist; and Mrs. E. W. Huse and Mrs. H. S. Seace, directors.

To Mrs. Ella K. Morrison, mother of Mrs. J. Woodford Jones and Mrs. Paul Harrington, goes the credit for bringing into being the Wayne chapter. Mrs. Jones was appointed organizing regent in May, 1914, and two years later the group of 14 members was welded together into a unit of the national organization. The chapter was named for Captain Douglas King, ancestor of Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Harrington. This captain and his father, Phineas King, both saw much active service during the Revolution. A direct descendant of theirs, Rev. George I. King, was instrumental in colonizing Wayne county. He came here in 1869, buying up land for himself and for friends back in Jerseyville, Ill. Arriving soon after the Civil war, he made the trip from Sioux City to this vicinity on horseback, and then went back to Jerseyville, sending out many good, substantial folks to help build up newly-opened prairie country. Probably the part which Rev. George King played in developing Wayne county influenced the petitioning group to adopt his name.

line. In addition, the Pingreys were "good honest men, tillers of the soil." Both the Pingreys and the Prescotts came across the waters before 1700. This name, Prescott, means "priest's cottage" in its native Welsh, and Pingrey translated "green pine" in French. However, both families were of English origin. For generations, the name "True Prescott" has been handed down from father to son, and there is a True Prescott near Wayne at this quaintly expressive name.

Rev. William Johnston of New York, an army chaplain, was Miss Margaret Mines' ancestor.

Mrs. Horace Theobald is a descendant of John Bush who served with the Minute Men and later in Col. Samuel Williams' regiment. From Prudence Pickett, wife of Major John Bush, Mrs. Theobald undoubtedly received her name of Prudence Bush. This Prudence of Revolutionary days was the daughter of a participant in the Boston tea party. Both Major Bush and his son, John Bush, Jr., served with the American troops.

Is Fourth of Line.

From four separate ancestors Mrs. J. O. Owen has moved her right to D. A. R. membership. Judge Phinkee Fleasman was "president judge of Philadelphia" and in this office lost much money to the state to care for American troops. He was a signer of the non-importation act, and is now buried in old St. Paul's churchyard in Philadelphia. Captain George Gray raised and equipped a company of men in Virginia and served as their captain. He was a cousin of President Madison and a first cousin of President Monroe, being a pallbearer at the latter's funeral. Mrs. Owen was named Georgia Gray for this same Captain George Gray, and is the fourth of the line to bear this name. Another ancestor, Lieut. Robert Moffitt, was a step-son of Governor Kimball of Ohio. Two of his children, both boys, were captured by Indians and held several years before the troops could locate them. The Admiral Moffitt who recently disappeared in a plane during a storm, was a descendant of this early-day officer.

World Events

President Roosevelt has ordered an investigation into charges of sabotage of army airplanes carrying the mail. The administration has asked congress permission to try the present monetary system for remainder of the fiscal year before a fixed policy is determined. One bandit was dead and two ready to plead guilty last Thursday to robbery charges as result of a spectacular frustration of an attempted holdup at Plattsmouth, Neb., State bank.

The announcement that the Austrian constitution has been superseded by a "natural law" and a report of imminent peace between Austria and Germany took Austrians by surprise. Public works officials said they had submitted to directors of Nebraska's Sutherland and Columbus projects a list of consulting engineers whom they considered competent to handle the project. Actual selection and appointment of those engineers, PWA explained, would be left to the applicants. George D. Welty, state director of surplus commodity distribution, today said more than half a million pounds of flour, butter, roast beef and smoked pork were distributed to relief families in Nebraska last month. He said 343,196 pounds of flour, 70,180 pounds of butter, 61,076 pounds of roast beef, and 132,000 pounds of smoked pork had been distributed. The commodities were purchased with federal relief money.

President Roosevelt says a plan to care for unemployment when CWA is demobilized this spring is being worked out. The broadly drawn plan, yet to be worked out in detail calls for aid to distressed families in rural areas, aid to the "stranded populations" whose jobs permanently moved away or died, and aid to the cities' unemployed. Mass treatment of all types of relief is to be abandoned for specialized treatment in each field.
