together for half an hour. In Brit-tany they simmer the fish in equal parts of milk and water, with salt. The Norwegian fish delicacy is fish pudding — fresh haddook ground or pounded into a paste mixed with eggs and milk, season-

mixed with eggs and milk, seasoned with salt and a little nutmeg, steamed in a mold and served with melted butter or cream sauce.

This Italian dish may be made with any large, dry-meated fish, such as cod, haddock, pollock, or buffalo-fish. Italians often made tit with wings of the skake, also of shark meat. They use Italian tomato paste, for more concentrated flavor, or they make a spiced tomato sauce which is simmered down until thisk.




