PRIVILEGE TO GO TO PRIMARY NEXT TUESDAY TO VOTE

IT IS a privilege to exercise the electoral franchise, and it is the duty of every voter to go to the polls next Tuesday and register a preference for candidates. Nominating primaries and final elections are not cut and dried in advance as they are in some countries of the old world. In Germany, citizens are told not only to vote, but who to vote for, and according to the latest step in wiping out popular liberties, it is not healthy to disobey orders. The coming election in Germany is a mere form and means nothing in the way of expressing what the masses think or want. In sharp contrast, people in this country are entirely unhampered in casting their ballots. They are free to vote for the men they think will best carry out the policies which their judgment suggests, and the result of an election means a popular mandate that must be respected. Everyone should study the sample ballot that appears in today's Herald, and all qualified voters, men and women, should be at the polls some time next Tuesday and have a voice in results.

FORMER WAYNE RESIDENT DIES

Rites For Wm. L. Nickols Are Held Tuesday And Burial Is Here.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 1:30 from the home at Norfolk and at 2 from Church of Christ there for Wm. L. Nickols, 57, formerly of Wayne, who died Friday evening. Rev. G. O. Bell had charge of rites and interment was made in Wayne cemetery.

Mr. Nickols had been despondent because he was unable to find employment. He left home in late afternoon and told his family he was going to search for work. He went to a park in Norfolk and swallowed a portion of poison about 9 o'clock. After identifying the body officers tried to notify Mrs. Nickols Saturday morning but were unable to reach her until that afternoon as she and the family were on their cream and egg route.

William L. Nickols was born at Otadot, Va., May 31, 1887. He grew to manhood there. Mr. Nickols married Miss Donna Barker of Spring Valley, Va., May 28, 1906. In 1913 the family moved to Crowley, Colo., and in 1919 to Wayne. They went to Norfolk two years ago.

Deceased leaves his wife and 10 children. Raymond of Wayne, Mrs. Thelma Rosacker of Carroll, Mrs. Clara Echtenkamp of Wayne, Robie of Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, Audrey, Elmo, Romaine, Marcelline, Katie Mae and William, jr., at home. One son, Cecil Fielder, preceded him in death. There are six granddaughters and one grandson. Mr. Nickols joined the Christian church in 1926 and had been a faithful member.

Many friends from Norfolk, Wayne and Winside attended the final rites. Pallbearers were John Schneider, Lynn Spaulding, Walter Compton, Will Evans, Fred Schuck and Mr. Ireland of Norfolk.

Youth Is Injured In Car Accident

Stanley Norton Is Cut And Machine Is Damaged Early Saturday.

When the car in which he was returning to Wayne from Wakefield Saturday morning about 2:15, struck a bridge two miles north of Wayne, Stanley Norton, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Norton, sustaining severe scalp cuts and a badly bruised shoulder. REPUBLICANS IN WAYNE TO SPEAK

Theodore W. Metcalfe And Robert Smith Address Audience Here.

What Nebraska and Nebraska people are going to do to meet the situation resulting from depression and drouth is the paramount issue today, stated Theodore W. Metcalfe, republican candidate for governor, in addressing a good-sized audience on Wayne Main street on Saturday evening. The next governor, he said, must have a head and a heart to use intelligent guidance and to embrace all peoples in the state. And the heart is more important of the two for the disaster is the most serious the state has ever met.

Traveling 11,000 miles in Nebraska Mr. Metcalfe said he found northeast Nebraska the most favored. In range sections he learned that cattle cannot be grazed there from two to five years for even the roots of grass are gone. During the past three to six years farmers have been depending on their cream and egg checks for their living. Milch cows and chickens must be saved for the farmers. Mr. Metcalfe favors providing feed so that farmers are able to save the stock which has meant their living.

Repeal of prohibition to get rid of the bootlegger, the racketeer and gangster is favored by Mr. Metcalfe.

The highway department should be removed from politics, the speaker added. The governor and politicians should not have power to favor one section above another in matter of roads. Mr. Metcalfe would have the highway system under a non-partisan commission which would promote a state-wide program of good roads without partially.

The state banking department should, he believes, be reorganized. He would help reorganize the banks so the banks could in turn help the people. An investigation into disposal of assets of all failed banks. (Continued on Page Four)

LOANS FOR FEED MADE AVAILABLE

Wayne County Farmers May Obtain Help In Feeding Stock.

Farmers and stockmen in Wayne county are now entitled to loans for feed from the \$25,000,000 relief fund, applications to be filed at G. H. Liggett's office in the court house.

Loans will be made to applicants who because of drouth do not have necessary feed, to maintain their livestock and must produce forage crops and do not have the means or other sources of credit available to obtain such feed. Amount will be based on a maximum per head for the stock with the minimum loan \$25. Loans are made only on stock owned before April 1 and are not made to those in commercial feeding business. Notes mature November 1, 1934.

Wayne county committee includes J. J. Steele, L. B. McGuire and G. H. Liggett. Number and condition of livestock, supply of feed funds, list of debts, mortgages, judgments and encumbrances will be filed with the committee. The feed loans do not require chattel mortgages or waivers.

TWO DISAPPEAR ON FISHING TRIP

Fred And Paul Miller Who Left Hoskins In July Reported Missing.

Mysterious disappearance of two Hoskins brothers, Fred Miller, 64, and Paul Miller, 44, has led the family and officers to make an extensive search and to date no trace of the men is found. Relatives fear for their safety.

The two left July 21 for Wood lake and Marsh lake, near Valentine, to fish and planned to be gone five days. Walter Miller went in search of the two Wednesday last week and at Wood lake a storekeeper told him that a man answering description of Fred Miller had bought meat and bread Sunday or Monday, July 22 or 23, and said fishing was not good and they were going on. Rev. Fritz Miller of Colome, S. D., went to learn word of the party Monday and returned Tuesday with the same information. The men and their car have not been reported as seen since.

Fred Miller, who is about 5 feet 10-12 inches tall, slightly stooped, weighing about 150, with brown hair and close cut mustache which begins to show grey, was wearing striped overalls, grey shirt and house slippers when he left. Paul who is about the same height, weighing 160 pounds and who is slightly bald, wore new blue overalls and he took with him both a dark and light shirt. They were driving Fred Miller's 1923 model T Ford coupe, license number 27-3335 and engine number 8093785. They carried a small home-made trailer in which were a tent, camp stove and other camping utensils.

Both men have been accustomed to go fishing and knew the country well. Neither could swim. Fred Miller has lived at Hoskins since 1902 and has been in the garage business since 1912. Paul, who has spent his life in Wayne county, has been in blacksmith business at Hoskins four years. A wife and six children comprise each family.



FRANCES FLOOD EXPLAINS A. A. A.

World Traveler Thinks Plan Will Work Itself Out For Farmers.

Francis Flood, Nebraska-born representative of Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, undertook to explain workings of the A. A. A. and need of the radical adjustment plan to an audience of farmers and interested townsmen at Wayne State Teachers college auditorium Saturday afternoon. The auditorium was well filled and the audience attentive, despite the heat.

Mr. Flood was introduced by Agricultural Agent G. H. Liggett, who announced that 330 corn checks totaling about \$55,000 were being distributed Friday and Saturday, and remainder of the first payment totaling \$239,000 would be ready within the next two weeks. He introduced Richard McGuire of Pluma Creek, James Greig of Wilbur, and F. L. Moses of Brenna, all members of the county allotment committee.

E. E. Hubbard of Lincoln, defined purpose of the A. A. A. program as restoration of purchasing power to agriculture, and restoration of exchange value. "We've always assumed that no matter what we produced, there would be a market for it, but now we have had to face the fact that we have over-produced for a long time. We've drained swamp lands, straightened creeks, built well-drained highways and brought on shortage of water. We will have to remedy this by planting trees, letting land grow up to grass and woodland, and building reservoirs."

Mr. Flood, the Nebraska product who traveled in many foreign lands and came back to lecture about these and to write his ventures for newspapers and farm papers, held his audience well. He stated that after traveling all over Nebraska, speaking at 21 meetings within two weeks, he found this the greenest spot in all the state.

He told of revolutionary changes he had witnessed in agriculture in various parts of the world. In interior of Africa, for instance, way up the Nile river, he saw how the Nile had been harnessed for power in a flat plain region, and its waters made to grow thousands of acres of cotton a new chapter, indeed, in history of this ancient Egypt. Then in Brazil when the coffee industry was suffering, he found them burning 750,000 bags of coffee monthly because they were trying to keep up price without holding down production. And then, in Mexico, he found that temperate country at last blessed with a stable government which was interested in developing agriculture and was opening up a new era to farmers. But, said the speaker, during the past year and one-half he had witnessed fully as great a development in agriculture here in our own country, under the Agriculture Adjustment act.

Expanding at Ends. "Our grandfathers, our parents and we have all been part of a pioneering and expanding period here on the prairie country, but this era came to an end on May 12, 1933 with signing of the adjustment act. It brought to a close the years of cheap food surpluses and poverty."

"What were conditions in May of 1933? We were laboring under unprecedented surpluses of foods, especially wheat and meat, of raw materials including cotton, oil and iron, of labor with 10,000,000 unemployed, and of gold, hoarding 40 percent of all monetary gold in the world. Yet in spite of this piled up wealth, we were bowed down, depressed, unable to enjoy our riches. Science had given us these expenses but our economic life had not progressed far enough for us to know how to consume them all.

"The years 1908-1914 being party years, with gold balance between value of the dollar and its purchasing power, we are now attempting to restore agriculture to have the same purchasing power as in that period.

War Made Increases. "When the World War came we

learned to produce still more food—40 to 50 million acres were put under cultivation which had never been plowed before. Agriculture had a few years of prosperity, but not for long. Motorization of America came—the truck and tractor replaced horses and mules, and this meant cutting down a big demand for feed.

"Then, the United States went into war as a debtor nation, having always owed money to Europe previously. But the close of the war found us as creditor nation, other nations owing us huge sums. Instead of changing our program we kept on as before. We didn't buy from Europe or give Europeans a chance to sell us goods and thus pay their debts. So we lost our foreign markets.

"Some say it is wicked to cut down production, but you would not expect a shoe manufacturer to operate at full power to produce more shoes than he could sell at profit, simply to sell shoes at a loss to needy folks. So why expect the farmer to produce at a loss more than he can sell? The farmer was the last to cut down his production. Iron and steel production fell off 75 percent the years 1929 to 1932; coal fell off 70 percent; auto manufacturing fell 70 percent; textile manufactures cut down 70 percent. But in the same period, the farmer had only decreased his production of cotton, grains, dairy products, beef and hogs 10 percent.

Tells Wheat Problem. "Take wheat, for instance. The American farmer raised too much—more than he could consume and sell. For the ten-year period he raised \$20,000,000 bushels, we consumed \$20,000,000 of these, and sold \$90,000,000 to Europe. When exports to Europe fell off, the wheat piled up. What could be done? Burn the wheat? Yes, but it seemed wiser not to raise it in the first place. Starting a co-operative reduction program was launched, acreage was cut down, and about \$6,000,000 in wheat checks came into this state this year as a result. Next year we will have a normal carry-over of 125,000,000 bushels. Why couldn't we sell our surplus in Europe? Because France, for instance, had a tariff of \$1.44 and Germany of \$2.65. Furthermore, Mussolini decreed that 99 percent of all wheat ground in Italy must be grown in that country. Germany demanded 97 percent be home-grown, and France went still further and called for 100 percent. Because we can grow wheat in this country and ship it over to Europe, still understanding the farmers there, European nations have raised a tariff high enough to keep us out. These countries owe us money—but we won't buy their products so they naturally won't buy from us.

May Take Choice. "We've lost out on foreign markets—we've lost the demand for horse and mule feed—what will we do? There are two courses open to us—first is nationalism—the theory of staying in our own back yard, neither sell or buy, and keep up the tariff walls. The cost of this program is that we must produce only what we can consume. Second choice is internationalism. That means to buy from other countries, and adjust our tariffs to make it possible for them to buy from us. The price of this program is that we must buy about \$500,000,000 worth more of foreign produce than now. Secretary Wallace favors a middle course—buying \$200,000,000 more foreign goods than at present, and follow program of certain production control, such as increasing pastureland, grassland and woodland. This question—if we shall retire some 50,000,000 acres or else take the other road—must be decided by the American people. The secretary urges people to meet together in groups, for debate and reason-

ing, and work out the answer to this problem by themselves.

Processing Tax. Mr. Flood discussed the processing tax at length. Said he: "You know that you pay the processing tax because the Nebraska Farmer has told you so often." In humorous reference to the paper he formerly served. "But who does pay this tax? When they ask you that question, ask them what the price of hogs would be if the millions of extra pigs which were taken off the market last fall were back again. Back east, consumers think they pay the tax. In the middle west the farmers think they do. Back in Washington the packers come with complaint that they have to pay it. Let's forget who pays it—you know who gets it!"

As to program of the government for next year, Mr. Flood stated that a committee had already been appointed to draw up the plans. Secretary Wallace wishes these to include a simple contract, the one contract to cover all commodities, and to be voluntary. One county control group would have charge of all phases, and farmers would agree to put into pasturage, woodland or grass, 15 to 20 percent of their acreage. Production of livestock would be automatically controlled by the decrease in grain production.

"The entire program is flexible—it seeks to control, not to curtail, and can be expanded as well as decreased. If there is a definite program next year, it will be brought up to the people for their approval." Mr. Flood regretted that the adjustment plan had been contented with politics, pronouncing it a program demanded by the people to fill an important need.

Governor Heard At Local Theatre

Gov. Charles W. Bryan addressed a crowd at Gay theatre Wednesday evening last week, explaining how he had administered the state's business and pointing out legislation he had succeeded in putting into effect, for benefit of the people.

Replying to charges that he had failed to cooperate with the national administration in its recovery plans, he gave instance after instance in which he had done so, and said there was no truth in charges that he would not continue to cooperate if elected senator. He explained the Columbus-Sutherland project for which he insisted upon certain contracts which would provide that power be sold as cheaply one place as another, as safeguard to all communities.

The governor charged that the public press was muzzled—that he was unable to get facts concerning his activities into the press, and that accounts were garbled.

During the talk, Gov. Bryan made announcement that the state tax levy would be reduced from 2.39 to 2.01 for the coming year, having received this word from the state board of equalization that day by telephone. This will be lowest state tax levy since 1916.

Discussing the democratic platform, the governor declared that while he has always upheld prohibition, that issue has now been definitely decided and is no longer a campaign issue.

He stated that he had never felt better in his life, and showed considerable energy and fire while on the platform. In closing, the veteran politician stated: "If you think I have been a good governor and a good public servant, isn't that the kind of fellow you want to elect to the senate?"

Old Court House Clock Is Veteran Of About 58 Years

There's one occupant of the Wayne county court house which is not harassed by the coming election—isn't handing out political cards in its sleep, and dreading the passing of August 14, yet anxious to have the suspense ended. Confidence of remaining with the court house, no matter what whimsical turn the vote may take, the old calendar-clock sits serenely on its shelf in the county clerk's office, and ticks the seconds away just as it has done the past 58 years.

Nothing lazy about this clock—not only will it tell the exact time of day, but its upper dial also gives day of the week, and in the lower dial you can read the month and date of month. Dr. R. B. Crawford bought it for the county when he was serving as clerk—must have been 1876 or 1877. And all those 57 or 58 years intervening, the clock has been doing its work uncomplainingly, registering neither agreement with nor disapproval of the changes which the years have brought. First the old court house at LaPorte, then the new big frame building on Main street in Wayne which also housed jail and community hall, temporary quarters when the first building burned, finally, the big red stone building with its Norman tower.

You'll find the old, eight-day brass clock in the clerk's office—its walnut veneer finish somewhat galled by age, but its loud clanging goes as heavily as ever. All its ticks is a little winding every eight days, and a nice high shelf upon which to tick out its life beats.

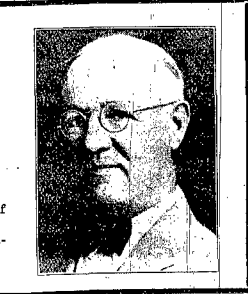

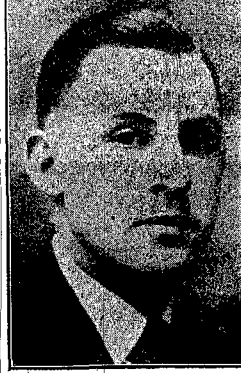

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
