

And one year of shortage or a few extra adversities should not lead one to give up the ship and abandon hope. Other years are coming, as other years have gone, and we are just as sure to have abundant crops in the future as we have had them in the past. Taking into account the variableness of the seasons and the manhandling of economic conditions by politicians, the person engaged in farming or

handling of economic conditions by politicians, the person engaged in farming or in business or industrial operations is wise to figure results over a term of years to determine headway and success.

In this country which is still comparatively free, citizens may exercise a powerful influence in determining legislation, but they cannot shape the weather. Great as the problem of selecting statesmen becomes, still greater is the question of adjusting activities to the caprices of the elements.

McKelvie, in his Nebraska Farmer, castigates the NRA as the instigator of strikes and the enemy of price parities and of agricultural recovery. Mr. McKelvie says objections to the NRA on the start have become more pronounced and certain after a year's trial. He says in part:

It violates the spirit and the letter of the Constitution which reserves to the states the right to commerce within their borders. It head off the exploitation of crime—to avoid the unhealthy atmosphere of government which was designed to encourage individual initiative, and protect the rights of the small, the weak and the unorganized.

A number of campaign speakers agree that the butt of the depression and the birden of recovery rest on the great middle class. Robert G.
