and so comparatively few to do it, no one in good health is warranted in loading. This is no time for parasites." Rev. and Mrs. D. W. McGregor received a letter from their son, Warren, who is in France. In part the letter reads as follows: "Hikes have been taking most of our time. Now the boys are near the front line so I believe we will be here two or three weeks. I have been living in underground dugouts, some of which are 30 feet deep. For a few days I lived in style, on the hay of an old tumbled down barn. Even though we are eight miles from the very front bombs drop on us every night and big guns shoot 10 miles beyond us with ease. Hence we are always on the lookout for shells and bombs. We are between a city and the front and the artillery shells menace this city considerably and the earth simply shakes. For a week we lived underground in a wood. It reminded me of my ancient history study, telling of our ancestors of ages ago. At the edge of the wood I could see miles of the fighting line. Balloons watch every move. At night the sight was beautiful but to realize and to hear was terrible. It reminds me of a great storm but even nature cannot compete with its wrath. A few days ago I was ordered to the front line to look up a dugout for first aid station. These seven miles seemed a long journey, especially with 18-pounders, gas shells, shrapnel, etc. falling all around. It was new to me so I hardly conceived the idea that I was in danger. After two hours of slow marching, passing cemeteries, trenches, old captured tanks, millions of exploded shells and shell holes, we arrived to report to the colonel, who asked me where I was from. I told him and you should have heard him laugh. He said they had no place for a dentist so near the front and said most of them were in England. In four years of war I am the first dentist to be within 10 miles of the front in this sector. The colonel said as long as I had taken the trouble to come up I could stay a couple days and look around. At the end of two days I started back. It was raining pitchforks. I was alone and did not know the way. After struggling through rain and mud that was ankle deep for two and a half hours, I reached my dugout safely. Maybe you don't think I appreciated my hole in the ground." A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Backstrom of Wakefield, August 23, 1918. C. A. Sar of Wakefield, went to Red Oak to the funeral of his niece, Miss Hilfred Liljedahl. Helen, daughter of the Walter Carlsons of Wakefield, fell and struck her eye with a knife. Walter Haglund of Wakefield, writes his sister, Mrs. Ezra Boeckman at Wakefield, from France, says: "The farmers are harvesting here. The wheat looks good; don't see any corn. They raise all kinds of garden truck." Mrs. L. W. Ellis went to Bloomfield to teach while Mr. Ellis is in service. Ed. Wittman is building a new barn north of Hoskins. Mrs. Robert Struthers of Hoskins, underwent an operation at Norfolk. P. G. Burrell sold a half section north of Carroll to P. J. Braner of Laurel. The sons of C. E. Belford and John L. Jones of Carroll, had tonsil operations. Dr. A. Texley sold 80 acres west of Carroll to C. H. Morris and another 80 to C. E. Closson. Concord, flag raising ceremony was in charge of Dean Hanson, Mayor Harm of Bloomfield, spoke. From Ponca Journal for September 4, 1879: With the present railroad prospects we expect to see Newcastle a thriving, booming town within six months, with stores and elevators, and vim and energy. Dr. Hasson, Squire Quinn and others went out hunting. They wandered over hill and dale and shot several chickens. Finally misfortune befell them. Mr. Quinn's gun went backward at the breach and hurt his finger and tore his clothes and made him think the heavens and the earth had come together. It seems that the two barrels of the gun were of different caliber and could not agree and hence kicked like mules. Rev. Lips was visited by thieves Sunday night and relieved of his clothing, "literally cleaned out." Wm. Kruse of Martinsburg brought in a monster stalk of corn which contains 12 ears.
