PREFERRED BIDS ARE DESIGNATED

Approval Of Washington Authorized To Start New Building.

Wayne city council, at an adjourned meeting Tuesday, accepted bid of Paul Sothman, Grand Island contractor, for \$49,423 for general contract on Wayne's proposed new community hall, subject to approval of PWA in Washington, D. C.

Mayor M. L. Ringer received word this week that Wayne's formal bid had been approved in Washington. No work on the hall will start, however, until Washington authorities give final approval and send the grant.

Sothman's general contract bid was \$49,200. To this was added \$452 for face brick on complete north side; \$100 was deducted for substitution of fir for maple on part of the stage floor and \$129 deducted for omitting assembly lockers and locker bases.

Besides Sothman and Beckenhauer, bidders on the general contract were Busbom & Raue of Salina, Kan., Olson Construction company of Lincoln, E. Kokahr & Sons of Lincoln, Peter Kahr & Sons of Omaha, J. L. Soderberg of Omaha, Green Brothers of Grand Island, and Vrana Construction company of Omaha.

Besides the A. E. Siefert bid on plumbing and heating, the council held open the bid of E. L. Rodwell of Omaha, until final PWA approval. Bids on this work ran from the Siefert bid of \$6,787 up to \$8,130.

Other bidders were B. Grunwald, Inc., of Omaha, A. M. McKenzie of Sioux City, Dudley Hamilton Company, Inc., of Omaha, and W. G. Volkman of Norfolk.

Writing bids ranged from the Quolvig bid of \$2,100 up to \$2,860. Bid of Elkhorst Electric company of Norfolk, was held open until final PWA approval. Electrical bids were also submitted by Hackney Electric company of Fremont, P. E. Malmquist of Omaha, and Krueger Electric company of Norfolk.

Mr. Sothman is contractor in charge of Wayne's new post office which is under construction. The Clyde Omans are having their house moved this week from the Third and Pearl street lot which is to be site for the new city hall.

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Employ Teachers In State Schools

Normal Board In Meeting At Wayne Transacts Business Monday.

State normal board, at a regular meeting held in Wayne Monday, elected George Graham of Chicago, instructor of chorus for Wayne Teachers College, Miss Marian Marsh of Franklin, Neb., to be assistant professor of English at Peru school, and Miss Marion G. Deters of Chadron, as bookkeeper at Chadron to fill the vacancy caused by resignation of Miss DeLilah I. Rice.

Mr. Graham, who comes to Wayne, is now teacher in a Chicago musical college. He is graduate of Oberlin conservatory where he received bachelor degree. He had three years of additional voice training with nationally known instructors, Weatherspoon, Klidanski and Proschowski. He was instructor and soloist for five years at Wooster college.

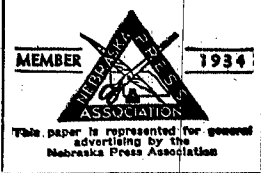

want to think conditions are better. With billions of government money put into circulation, they feel they should be better. They have persuaded themselves to cut corners and to practice increased economies. They have delayed improvements which they need, and have denied themselves comforts which would ease life, in order to make ends meet without feverish effort.

The fellow who has goods or services to sell, gambles on future demand, and he doesn't know whether his confidence will be justified or whether he will have to sit and chew the cud of disappointment. If he is required to do more sitting than normal rest would suggest, he postpones buying things he wants—necessarily curtails operating and living costs. He is one of many in a great circle.

The persons with large cash reserves or large industries seem to have been waiting to be assured of future public policies. Their waiting reacts to the disadvantage of smaller businesses and smaller industries. As a consequence members of the great middle class with strained resources, must drag anchor and delay usual contributions to trade channels.

What is needed is more confidence expressed on a definite basis at Washington. More than organizations of FERA workers are needed to put red blood into trade arteries and hasten healthy recovery. Those who have capital must be encouraged to go ahead. In every endeavor, the individual must occasionally strike "pay dirt" in order to help and be a vital part of any forward movement.

Straining At a Quat

FOR years and years the National Editorial association has been using lots of steam in an effort to persuade the federal government to quit retailing printed envelopes, and right now association heads want the campaign stimulated. The fact that the government tends more and more to engage in different lines of production in competition with private interests would seem to weaken the chance of wiping out a long standing government practice that is now more than ever in harmony with present public policies. And it appears to us that the government's increased competition with advertisers holds more indirect injury to the publishing business than the government-envelope industry which is only one rather inconsequential source of job printing revenue. As an objective to keep the association busy, something besides the government's envelope printing business could be substituted with greater promise of success, and if successful, of greater advantage both to publishers and the public.

What's Ahead

ACCORDING to Sam McKelvie's Nebraska Farmer, we live in a "fool's paradise" if we think we can gain permanent recovery without doing certain practical and necessary things. If recovery plans were working properly, he says these things would be happening:

1. Wages would be adjusted to the cost of living, and budgets in business could be balanced;
2. relief rolls would be decreased instead of increased;
3. the cost of government would be controlled under the budget;
4. income taxes from business and wages would balance the budget;

College Leads In Enrollment

Wayne Institution Has The Largest Student Body Among Normals.

Wayne State Teachers college has a generous lead in enrollment over the other three teachers colleges in the state, according to reports submitted at the state normal board meeting here Monday. The number of regularly matriculated resident college students was reported as follows: Wayne, 725; Kearney, 678; Peru, 503; Chadron, 440. These figures are for college students only, not counting training school enrollment. Peru city does not have a public school but all 224 children attend the training school. Kearney has 636 training school children, including those from seven rural schools where some observation and practice work is done. Chadron has 210 training school pupils.

government securities would be purchased out of the savings of the people—not by banks out of the money that should be used for industry."

In his two lead paragraphs Mr. McKelvie observes conditions in this way:

"The cost of government increases by leaps and bounds. These costs can be met from only two sources: 1. Taxes; 2. borrowing. But if profits from business are prevented by increased wages, there can be no income taxes from that source; and if the government imposes the minimum of taxes on wage earners, as is the constant tendency of politicians who live by votes, whence will come the money to run the government?"

"That is exactly what is happening. What might represent profits in business is being absorbed in increased wages under NRA. The number of people on relief rolls increases alarmingly. The cost of government mounts rapidly. The budget deficit grows from month to month, and is by far the largest in history."

Of Two Policies

THE Nebraska supreme court has refused to permit Eugene D. O'Sullivan to appear on the general election ballot as a candidate for United States senator. We are rather glad O'Sullivan will be kept off the ticket, because his rivalry would have made the Simmons-Burke campaign lopsided, giving Simmons an advantage and defeating the match between issues, even if the republican were elected. Nothing should prevent a full expression of the electorate for and against New Deal programs. If a majority of the voters want one hundred per cent endorsement of the national administration, they should elect Burke. If on the other hand, they would scrap some of the New Deal plans and sober down the spending spree to a level more tolerable for taxpayers, they should select the sound middle course for which Simmons, if elected, would lend his influence.

Notwithstanding the importance of political issues at this time, report of the Simmons-Burke debate was relegated to the inside pages of Sunday morning's newspapers, and Saturday's football game was heralded in detail under screaming, first-page headlines. The newspapers only respond to popular interest, and it may be better to take people's minds away from thought of public policies and lead them into the exhilarating whirl of football or other sport. The world series held chief attention for some days, and then football mounted to first place. While going to either extreme of work or play may hurt, a reasonable proportion of each doubtless keeps the mind in trim for largest responsibilities and greatest usefulness.

EPIC in California means Upton Sinclair's candidacy to "End Poverty in California." He is going to do it by finding gainful employment for every idle person. He says his plan is not Utopian, but practical. He says he sees in eager faces everywhere a desire to work, and he is going to furnish opportunities. We hope he will not be disappointed in his interpretation of the passing countenance—the reflection of feverish passion for work. Idle factories will be set to work and idle lands will be tilled by those now out of jobs. California will be no place for tramps whose anxiety for work is most ardently expressed when there is no work.

The last legislature ordered the party circle removed from the election ballot in order to force electors to vote directly for a candidate for each office, and the supreme court has lately endorsed the validity of the change. So one cannot vote a straight ticket by making one cross. The voter must go down the ballot and mark the names of those he wishes to support. As to national issues, these may be considered only from the standpoint of the avowed position of each candidate.

The Omaha Journal-Stockman says the Kansas City Drovers Telegram had a vote of its own on the AAA, and the result was 5,275 to 160 against continuing the corn-hog program. The Journal-Stockman comments: "The AAA is going to put the program into effect anyway, regardless of referendums or protests. That's bureaucracy."

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RELIGION.

The pendulum has swung away from former practices in religious observance quite as much as in some other things during the last forty years. But the need for a practical religion is even more important now than it was in the old days—more important because we have more temptations to overcome, because we have learned that material values are uncertain and that whatever is permanently worth while must belong to the soul. In the period around the economic blowup of 1894, religious observance was often too narrow to appeal to many inquiring minds. There was rather too much inclination to put the form above the spirit in religious worship, and I believe largely as a consequence people's religion tended to cool off. Certain Sabbath rules were closely followed, though the rest of the week was so given over to conflict with neighbors and to worldly considerations generally that the soul products of noble thoughts and unselfish deeds had little chance for development. The average old-time church pillar who contributed liberally to the material organization, was in his pew regularly and he solemnly considered himself slated for uninterrupted flight to heaven when the time of his departure arrived. In the passing years narrow man-made dogmas have largely given way to spiritual truths, and religious observance is coming more and more to be accepted as an every-day experience—an essential foundation for life here and hereafter. This swing away from orthodox should cause a religious awakening along practical lines, and strengthen the church as a helpful community influence.

Norfolk Man Is Club Speaker

Dr. Lucian Stark Addresses Kiwanians on "Common Sense in Medicine."

"The well-known axiom, 'The man who is his own lawyer has a fool for a client,' may well be applied to persons who try to diagnose their own illnesses rather than have faith in their doctors," said Dr. Lucian Stark of Norfolk in his address before Kiwanis club Monday noon on "Common Sense in Medicine."

"The foundation of medicine was superstition," said the speaker, "but we have rapidly changed this foundation to a sound scientific basis. Scientists have sat down and used pencil and paper to figure out facts in connection with diseases, making exhaustive research to arrive at these conclusions. When the same symptoms occur again and again in persons, the medical profession recognizes these to indicate certain diseases."

"Medicine has made rapid strides. Over 100 years ago, about 200,000 died yearly in European countries from the dreaded smallpox but now the number is small. Vaccination has made smallpox scarce. Inoculation has converted diphtheria into a preventable disease, and scarlet fever can be avoided. Lockjaw, so common among farmers because the organism which produces it is found in intestines of a horse, can be prevented by prompt inoculation.

"No drug can help tuberculosis—only common sense. If you can save a man from his family and friends, he will probably get well. He must be put to bed so that all his energy can be conserved to combat the disease."

Costerisan, explaining the aims and principles of Kiwanis and value of the association to its members. V. H. Green was not present but formally received. 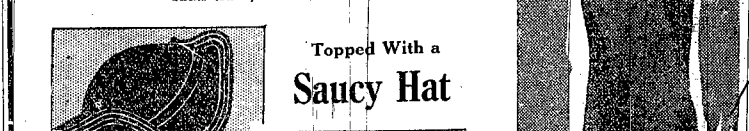




