HUNTING VICTIM DIES IN WAYNE

Rites For Alfred Helleberg Are Held At Home Here Saturday Morning.

Alfred Helleberg, 34, who was accidentally shot October 12 when hunting pheasants near Concord, died Thursday morning, October 25, at 11:10. Funeral was conducted Saturday morning at 10 at the home in Wayne with Rev. P. A. Davies and the Hixcox next in charge. Richard Pinkham, accompanied by Mrs. H. A. Welch, sang "Crossing the Bar." Committal followed in Columbus.

Mr. Helleberg, in company with Bert Rector of Sioux City, and C. C. Herndon, was hunting early in the morning of October 12, a mile west of Concord when Mr. Herndon's gun accidentally discharged, the shot striking Mr. Helleberg in the left side. An operation was performed and several blood transfusions given Mr. Helleberg who was improving until his condition took sudden change a few hours before he died.

Alfred Helleberg was born February 16, 1900, at Thisted, Denmark, and was thus aged 34 years, 8 months and 9 days. At the age of 16, in 1916, after having spent his boyhood and school days in the land of his birth, he came to America to join an older brother living at Columbus. For two years he was employed in office of an architectural firm in Columbus and then entered employ of a photographer there. Mr. Helleberg came to the C. M. Craven photograph studio 12 years ago and had been here since.

Mr. Helleberg married Miss Florence Rector at Columbus July 28, 1923. Besides his wife Mr. Helleberg leaves three children, Finley, Jacqueline and Mary Alice. He is survived by one brother in this country, John P. Helleberg, of Kearney; his mother, Mrs. N. F. Helleberg, two brothers, Carl and Emil, and three sisters, Mrs. Christensen, Mrs. Bach and Mrs. Halek, live in Denmark.

Mr. Helleberg was a member of the Presbyterian church. He was held in high esteem by many friends. Pallbearers were Dr. J. C. Johnson, W. R. Hickman, A. L. Jacobson, James Kilhion, Ross Jacobs and Francis Jones.

PIONEER PASSES AT WAYNE HOME

Funeral For Mrs. Bastian Will Be Held Friday At Church Here.

Mrs. C. C. Bastian, resident of Wayne county 58 years, died at her home here Tuesday morning from effects of a stroke she suffered last Saturday morning. She had reached the age of 79 years, 7 months and 8 days. Funeral will be conducted Friday afternoon at 2:15 from the home and at 2:30 from Our Redeemer's Lutheran church with Rev. H. A. Teckhaus and the Hixcox service in charge. Burial will be in Greenwood cemetery.

Mrs. Bastian, whose maiden name was Miss Marie Elizabeth Schreck, was born March 22, 1855, in Muscatine county, Iowa. She was married to Christ C. Bastian January 16, 1876, in Pekin, Ill. The couple came to a homestead in Wayne county arriving, March 2, 1876, and lived on their place 10 miles southeast of Wayne until 1913 when they moved into Wayne. The Bastians celebrated their golden wedding in 1926 and their 55th in 1931.

The Bastians experienced the hardships and pleasures of pioneer life and made many friends. Mrs. Bastian was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith. She was a faithful member of Our Redeemer's church and was active in the Aid.

Mr. Bastian died September 30, 1931. A son, Anton C. Bastian, died overseas during the World war, and a daughter, Mrs. Ottilie Gilderseleeve, died January 16, 1928. Surviving are four sons, Albert and Martin of Wayne, Adam of Chance, S. D., and Leonard of Faith, S. D., and one daughter, Mrs. Anna Cowan of Gardiner, Mont. There are 13 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

All the children excepting the daughter are here for the funeral.

TWO ARE KILLED IN CAR ACCIDENT

Deloise Mattingly Of Wayne And Sam Allen Of Concord In Mishap Friday.

Deloise Mattingly, 18, of Wayne, and Sam Allen, 42, of Concord, were instantly killed Friday evening when Allen's open roadster turned over into a ditch about four and a half miles south of Concord. The lifeless men were found beneath the car about 10:30. Dr. H. C. Miller of Laurel, who was summoned, said the men had been dead only a short time. He thought their necks were broken when they struck the back of the car, but the men were not hurt otherwise. Persons who came to the scene knew Mr. Allen and identified Mattingly by a letter and trapping license in his pocket. Both bodies were brought to Wayne and Allen's later taken to Laurel.

Deloise Mattingly and her father, Joseph Mattingly, had been helping Mr. Allen out wood at the Guy Allen home. Sam Allen and Deloise Mattingly decided to come to Wayne in the former's car. They were driving south, apparently at moderate rate of speed, when the car went over the left embankment, pinning the two beneath it.

When Mrs. D. A. Paul, Miss Hazel and Miss Marjorie Paul, Mrs. Lela Tryon and Edward and Bruce Tryon were returning about 10:30 to Concord from an evening's visit in Wakefield they saw the overturned car and hurried to the Geo. Wischhof farm for help. The car was removed, a doctor, Dixon county sheriff and attorney, summoned. Joseph Mattingly and others were notified. Officials stated that no inquest would be necessary.

The Allen car was only slightly damaged. Funeral in Wayne. Funeral services for Deloise Mattingly were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 from St. Paul Lutheran church in Wayne. Rev. W. C. Heidenreich and the Beckenhauer service had charge and interment followed in Randolph cemetery.

Deloise Mattingly, son of Joseph and Pearl Mattingly, was born at Sholes, Neb., September 26, 1916. His early life was spent in the parental home. He was baptized in the Lutheran faith in infancy and attended school in Sholes.

The Mattinglys came to Wayne in August, 1933. Besides his parents, deceased besides five sisters, Myrtle, Dorothy, Agnes, Pearl and Cora, and one brother, Lyle, all of Wayne, also his grandmothers, Mrs. Anna-Balster of Howard, S. D., and Mrs. Margaret Mattingly of Sholes. Two brothers died in infancy.

Detectives are scattered everywhere to be on the alert to catch any unfavorable remarks about the government. Everything that goes into the newspapers is censored. Any suggestion of criticism involving government policies is arbitrarily suppressed. An absolute military dictatorship prevails, says the correspondent, and the Bulgarians have only to listen and obey. That a system to spread fear and servile obedience. Is there any surer way to rob people of ambition and desire of sense of security?

Navy Day Introduced

Navy Day was a new one, and boosters for the navy were led to shout for bigger sea power as a safeguard to peace. Those who want peace without adopting the latest fashions in naval equipment figure that such preparation supplies temptation for practical demonstrations. But a look at the American navy is likely to inspire pride in the most pacific individual. Theodore Roosevelt, former president was a strong advocate of a powerful navy—one that would induce feelings of respect on the part of nations that could not be persuaded by anything but force.

Corn-Hog Program

The processing tax is the big obstruction in the wheels of the corn hog reduction program. The consumer thinks he pays it, and the farmer believes he pays it. Thus, there is no doubt that it is paid. Sam McKelvie's Nebraska Farmer is convinced that a large majority of the state's producers are against continuing the proposed corn-hog plan. That publication picked at random a number of farmers to have a test of its own on the proposition, and of 263 ballots received, 226 registered against and 37 for a corn-hog program in 1935.

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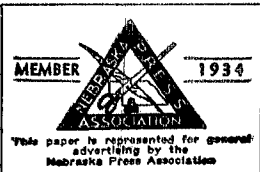

Simmons THE Omaha World-Herald which swallows the New Deal program without exception or qualification, excuses Edward R. Burke's lack of oratorical powers as struck with those of Robert G. More Light REFERRING to W. E. Roggenbach's unprofitable experience in marketing sixty light pigs, mentioned in last week's Herald, R. S. McGuire, member of the Wayne county allotment committee, says wires were tangled in reporting that a processing tax was a part of the burden. He says no processing tax was involved. Mr. McGuire says the consumer—not the farmer—pays the tax. Differences of opinion concerning the tax recalls that old, unsettled question: "How old is Ann?"

Mention of Mr. Roggenbach's shipment of little pigs brought an explanation from G. H. Liggitt, county federal agent, who says the Roggenbach pigs were sold to feeders and therefore no processing tax was imposed. He adds that three of the animals weighed 100 pounds apiece and sold for \$3.50 per 100, and the balance averaged a weight of 50 pounds and sold for 50 cents per 100. Instead of actually losing \$5.07 on the shipment, Mr. Liggitt says Mr. Roggenbach is entitled to a refund of \$5.32.

Not So Dumb A "dumb" stenographer is blamed for the endorsement given the candidacy of Upton Sinclair, socialist, nominated by the democrats of California,—an endorsement which, on reflection, the administration at Washington is trying to sidestep. The published copy of the letter endorsing Sinclair bears none of the earmarks of a "dumb" stenographer. If the stenographer wrote the letter without thorough coaching or sufficient supervision—an unlikely presumption—the result shows she is not "dumb."

As a matter of fact, an experienced stenographer is often not so "dumb" as her employer, and it is a further fact that if she were not intelligent, alert and careful, her employer would frequently show off to less advantage. Far from being "dumb," the stenographer usually exercises insight and foresight and tact which safeguard an employer against blunders. The faithful, wide-awake stenographer is entitled to a better lot than to be used as a buffer.

He stated that he would consider it his duty, if elected governor, to cooperate with the national administration and with local officials in assisting those who are needy, due to drought or unemployment. "Politics should not enter into a single phase of this proposition and the relief money should be spent to take care of those who need it and not furnish political jobs for party workers," he said.

"It is also necessary," said Mr. Griswold, "that our state railway commission be reorganized and I feel that in its place we should have public utilities commission selected on the basis of ability and knowledge. One member should be a capable engineer, one an attorney who specializes in rate matters, and the other a person who is acquainted with the agricultural and industrial needs of Nebraska. The members of this commission should not be permitted, after their service with it has ended, to accept employment with any utility company or be candidates for public office. This will cause them to be absolutely fair in their decisions."

He stated that he felt this public utilities commission should also furnish a free engineering service to the cities and towns of the state, giving them advice in all disputes with the public utilities. "The power to fix electric light charges should remain in the hands of the city councils but they need this engineering and advisory service to assist them," he advised.

Mr. Griswold discussed several other matters of interest to Nebraska people and in closing stated that he did not feel that Nebraska needs a lot of new laws or a lot of fads or "isms" but rather the interest of the state could best be served by a short business session of the legislature, and with greater common sense in the administration of the state government.
