

Pigs And THE plight of a farmer with pigs on hand and short of feed is shown by a communication to the Norfolk Daily News from I. R. Quimby, an Orchard farmer who explains that he has fifty fat pigs for which he can realize two cents per pound if they weigh 125 pounds or only fifty cents per head if they weigh less. He says the pigs cost him \$5 or \$6 apiece so far and that he has run out of feed.

The Daily News comments:






