**Bertha Berres Is Elected Officer**

County Commissioners Pass Resolutions At Meeting Held In Omaha.

Miss Bertha Berres, Wayne county clerk, was elected vice president of Nebraska county clerks and registers of deeds at their annual meeting in Omaha Thursday, Hugo Bukendahl of Pierce, is president, J. D. Forsyth of Niobrara, was reelected head of commissioners.

Miss Berres, Mrs. George Berres, Jr. and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Erlleben attended the clerks' and commissioners' convention, going Tuesday and returning Friday. Commissioners passed resolutions to effect that relief situation in the state can be handled most efficiently and economically through local relief agencies. They asked that congress utilize appropriations for relief in doing essential highway work. They feel that the present old age pension law is inadequate and should be amended to bring relief for those whom it is intended to benefit.

Convinced that road construction is one of the prime factors of relief for unemployment, the officials opposed any diversion of highway funds for other purposes and insisted that division of the gas tax fund between state and counties be left as it is. They favored additional tax on tractor fuel and gasoline. They urged passage of a per-ton mile tax on commercial trucks. They recommended that the law which permits state and county funds to be used for matching federal funds be amended to include the right of municipalities on the federal road system to match federal funds for state improvement.

Commissioners favored establishment of a state police system to prevent accidents and violation of traffic laws, to stop bootlegging of gasoline, to cooperate with local units in license inspection work on motor vehicles and to be financed by revenue from beer tax.

The men voted down a proposal that the Nebraska commissioners affiliate with a proposed national organization of county officials, and also voted down an attempt to get them on record regarding the sales tax.

**Represent Counties At Feeder Meeting**

Dixon, Dakota and Thurston county farmers, 300 in all, attended the feeders' meeting at Emerson last Thursday. P. M. Van Luchene, speaking on feed loans, stated that these loans are primarily for farmers who have no other source of credit and who have over 10 units of livestock. They help the farmer until he can again raise a crop.

Vern Morgan, vice president of the Sioux City Production Credit association, said production credit loans are available to farmers who have salable livestock with which to liquidate loans. Production credit associations will ultimately be owned by the borrowers who in a sense borrow from themselves by purchasing stock equal to five percent of their first loan.

Mr. Shulenberg, secretary of Sioux City Production Credit association, explained that borrowers pay in advance the inspection fee for loan applications. Mortgages are taken on all visible security to protect the mortgage for the association loan.

Dr. Plank of Lincoln, spoke on Bang's disease and explained the possible testing of breeding herds to rid them of this.

Paul McMill, Dawes county rancher, told of having wintered stock for three years on Russian thistles, straw, corn fodder and cotton seed cake. He stated that his stock is in good condition. Animals fed protein with low grade roughages are able to pick up quickly when turned on grain the following summer, he stated. He urged feeding of cotton seed cake or other protein supplement in small quantities, mixing with other feeds at first. Oil meal and tankage may take place of cotton seed, he added.

Robin Spence, Dakota county agent, urged farmers to be looking out for feed supply for the coming season.

T. W. Fife of Sioux City, spoke on cattle outlook for 1935. He said he looks for rise in cattle and hog prices in February. He said breeding stock would be in strong demand next summer.
