The various experiments with paper money that were tried during the Revolution and just afterwards by a number of the states had produc-ed general conviction (upon this point among the business men who exercised influence in favor both of the formation and the adoption of the Constitution.

Govern-ments generally have exercised this power in time of need, and contracts payable in money are made subject to the power of the government to declare what shall be money when they are paid (Le-gal Tender Cases, 12 Wall. 457). After the war steps were taken for some time to reduce the United States legal tender notes, the so called "green-backs;" but in 1878 Congress ceased this policy and ordered their reissue as fast as the old ones were cancelled or de-stroyed. At this date the act could no longer be justified as 'a war measure and so its opponents once more challenged its validity. It was finally upheld in 1884 as the exercise of a power legitimate-ly implied from the power to bor-row morey and to issue bills of credit. Just as the power to coin money gave Congress by implica-tion the power to make it a legal tender, so the power to sime bills of credit contained a similar impli-cation (Julliard v. Greeaman, 110 U S. 421). exercised influence in favor both of the formation and the adoption of the Constitution Prior to the Civil War no attempt was made by the United States government to make its bills of credit a legal tender for private debts.
