Progressives of all parties held a meeting the other day for the purpose of discussing various legislation. There were about thirty present at the meeting, most of them from the middle states.

This organization wants to know why the Administration will not allow the Wheeler Amendment to come out of committee. This amendment would cut the interest in farm loans down from 4-1-2 percent to 3-1-2 percent.

Of course some of them are interested in a Central Bank, and other progressive measures. They are planning to meet again next week to adopt certain rules and laws.

The Home Owners' Loan Bill was passed last Tuesday after three days of stormy debates. Scores of amendments were offered to the bill only to be knocked down with the exception of one or two important ones.

There have been many charges of inefficiency against the H. O. L. C. and an investigation has been discussed, but all possibility of that investigation seems eliminated because the instigator of that movement concedes that the inquiry will not materialize.

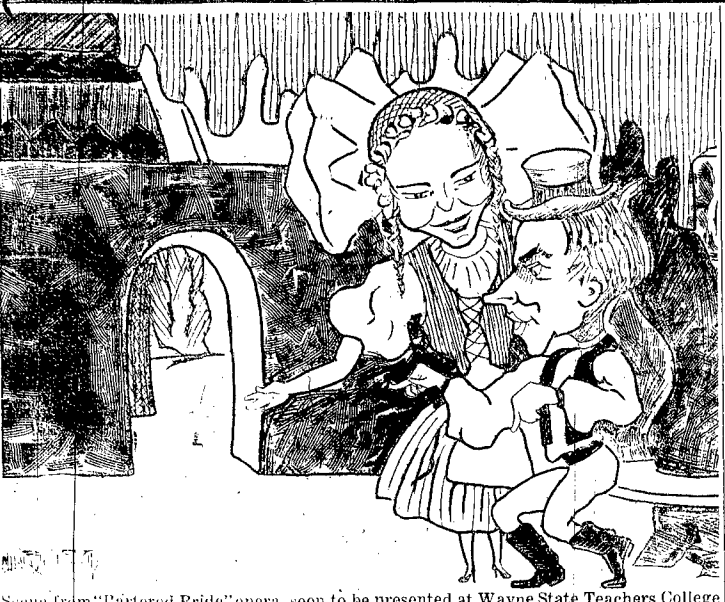

Recipes Tested In Wayne Homes.

- Queen Salad (Mrs. S. A. Lutgen) 1 large can pineapple; 1/2 lb. white grapes or 1 large can white cherries, 1 lb. marshmallows; 1 pt. sweet cream; 4 egg yolks or 2 whole eggs; 1/2 cup sweet milk; 1 lemon. Cut pineapple in fine cubes, half and seed the grapes, put in colander and let drain. Cut marshmallows into fourths and add to drained fruit. Beat eggs lightly, add 1 tablespoon of flour with pineapple juice and stir until it thickens then add 1/2 cup of milk brought to boiling point. (add milk to egg mixture, not egg mixture to milk.) Stir well as milk is gradually added, when thick set to cook quickly, add lemon juice, stir in fruit mixture, then add whipped cream and set in cool place to set for 24 hours. Do not cook too quickly. Serves 24.
Sweet Pudding. (Mrs. F. G. Dale) 1 cup suet chopped or ground fine (pressed down.) 1/2 cup sugar 2 cups flour 1 1/2 cups buttermilk, 2 level tsp. soda 1 cup raisins (ground) 1 heaping teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1 teaspoon nutmeg 1 teaspoon allspice 1 teaspoon each of lemon and vanilla extract. Rub flour, sugar and suet together well. Dissolve soda in buttermilk and add rest of ingredients. Flour-baking powder cans — fill 1-3 or 1-2 full and place in kettle with water half way up on cans. Steam 1 hour. Sauce: 1 cup sugar 2 rounding tablespoons flour Boiling water (about 2c.) To make thick sauce 1 teaspoon lemon Butter about size of walnut.
Vegetable Salads. (Mrs. Mary Brittain) 1. Spring salad, use sliced tomato, sliced cucumber, radishes, and green onions. 2. One cup shredded cabbage, 1/2 cup celery, 1/2 cup peas, 1 hard boiled egg, 1 tablespoon chopped onion. 3. 1 1/2 cups boiled potato cubes, 1/2 cup cut celery, 1 hard boiled egg, 1 slice onion or a teaspoon cut parsley. 4. Asparagus tips slipped in rings of green pepper, garnished with strips of pimento. 5. 2 cups chopped cabbage, 1 cup chopped peanuts, 1/2 cup toasted bread crumbs. Just before serving combine ingredients and add mayonnaise dressing. 6. 1 cup cooked cubed carrots, 1 cup potato cubes, 1 cup cold cooked peas.
Cherry Pudding. (Mrs. L. M. Owen) Three eggs well beaten, 2 1/2 tablespoons of sugar, 2 tablespoons of butter, 3-4 cup of sweet milk, 1 cup of fresh or canned cherries (drained) 1 tablespoon of baking powder, flour to make a stiff batter. Steam one hour.
Pudding Sauce. Cream 1 cup sugar, 1 rounded tablespoon flour, 1/2 cup butter. Add 1 egg and a little milk. Mix and pour in slowly boiling water. Stir and cook until it thickens like cream. Flavor and serve hot.
