Wayne Schools Place In Meet

Take Part In Track And Field Events Held At Norfolk Friday.

Norfolk placed first with 53.5 points, Wayne high school fourth with 15, Wayne college high eighth with 5 in the annual track and field meet at Norfolk Friday.

Wayne high students took the following in the finals: Wallace fourth in 120-yard high hurdles; Cunningham, first in javelin; Goshorn, fourth in first heat of 440-yard dash; Cunningham, second and Alderson, fourth in shot put; Johnson, second in 220-yard dash; relay team, fourth in first heat.

Wayne college high scored as follows in the finals: Cecchin, third in 100-yard dash; Hunter, first in second heat of 440-yard dash; Hunter, third in final heat of 440-yard dash; 880-yard relay team, third in first heat and fourth in final heat. In the preliminaries the college high placed: Lewis, third in first heat of 120-yard high hurdles; Cecchin, third in third heat of 100-yard dash; Cecchin, third in second heat of 220-yard dash.

Windsie scored in finals of the meet as follows: Jensen, third in first heat of 440-yard dash; Holman, third in second heat of 440-yard dash; Jensen, fourth in final heat of 440-yard dash; Jensen, third in broad jump. In the preliminaries J. Brune placed in the javelin.

The evening banquet was served by Stratton hotel and carried out patriotic theme. The 225 guests were seated at long tables centerd with red, white and blue crepe paper and groups of small American flags and large flags were draped about the room.

E. W. Huse, upon invitation of Mr. McKelvie, presided over the program which was interspersed between courses and followed the dinner. After singing of "America," invocation was given by Rev. M. C. Powers of Wayne Baptist church.

John Landis of Seward, junior president of the state Founders' day organization, expressed the attitude of young men toward the present crisis as one of fear.

Said Mrs. Minier in brief address: "When Roosevelt went in as president, he faced the major problems—psychological, which he handled magnificently, social, and economic, both of which he handled poorly with impractical measures."

Calls for Program. "A political party is not a private plaything for any one group; rather, it is an instrument by which the people participate in their government." This spoke E. A. Sorenson of Lincoln, former attorney-general of Nebraska.

"I believe the republican party still believes in God," said the Lincolnite. "For a time our party did flirt with some of these new theories of government, believing that some things could be done contrary to the laws of nature."

"I actually entertain pessimism as I look into the future. We are on the brink of the greatest crisis in the history of this country because we cannot anticipate what our government will do. We cannot exercise initiative because we fear government's restraint."

A humorous touch was added to the program by the sudden appearance of four wild theorists who expounded their ideas. Ralph Higbee, college student from Battle Creek, advocated the Townsend old age pension. Wilford Parriott of Norfolk, represented the NRA.

A letter from Karl Stefan, read by E. B. Murtensen of Wayne, expressed the republican congressman's pessimism over national affairs and great fear of what was coming to this country. Said he: "In my opinion, more republicans are being made every day because of the huge spending program of the administration. Even northern democrats are beginning to doubt its wisdom."
