

Half Contracts In Wayne County

**Percentage Approved Is
Largest Of Any Place
In United States.**

In the entire United States 4,030 corn-hog contracts for 1935 have been approved in Washington, D. C. Of this number 1,000 belong to Nebraska and of the Nebraska total, 470 are from Wayne county. This shows that half of the contracts in this state and 15 percent in the nation so far approved are from this county.

Checking of corn-hog compliance is going forward now and Herman Podoll reports that the work will be completed by July 15. Animal husbandry judging school will be held at Wayne July 4.



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Battling Breakers THE Omaha World-Herald comments on the invitation of Rev. P. J. Mahan, president of Creighton university, for more criticism of our educational system; though that newspaper sees no dearth of criticism at this time when, due largely to an unsettled state of mind, faultfinding has become the rule—often without grounds. The president of Creighton of course wants constructive criticism—criticism that will enliven interest and promote advancement in the field of education. He doesn't want critics to knock just for exercise, but to point out faults and offer suggestions.

It would seem that colleges and universities have had plenty of nagging difficulties during these whipsawing days. The Norfolk Daily News treats recent college troubles in this way:

"There has been stormy weather on the educational seas these last few months."

"Dr. Fred M. Hunter, former superintendent of the Norfolk schools, has been chosen to go to Oregon to settle a controversy that has been raging there for many months; the Omaha municipal university is threatened in its very existence by a row which has led to the dismissal of an able president over the protest of most of the faculty and student body; Wayne State Normal college has just gone through a gusty season, ascribed to a factional fight in the faculty; a short-time revolt over Huey Long's dictatorship was repressed at the University of Louisiana; the University of Chicago has just had an investigation started by an indignant patron.

"No one cause can be found back of these flurries, but in practically all of them the question of what is called 'academic freedom' crops up as one of the issues, if not the main one. College facilities demand the right to teach the truth as they see it, regardless of whether or not it conforms to the ideas of a rich druggist whose niece is absorbing new ideas in her classes. A university can be no university, the professors say, unless it can teach the students to think in independent terms.

"In some instances the professors may be mistaken as to their call. Some of them look upon academic freedom as the freedom to force their own particularisms on their students, whereas broad-minded educators recognize that it is only the right to teach their students to think sanely and intelligently in their own way, on the problems they are meeting. The professor has no sacred right to put his own thoughts and prejudices into the minds of the students."

"... You will note," said Dr. Robert Hutchins, president of the University of Chicago, in his address to his graduating class, "that the virtues which a university seeks to inculcate are those which our form of government contemplates and without which it cannot endure. In subverting ignorance, prejudice, injustice, conformity, mediocrity, self-satisfaction and stupidity; and in sponsoring instead the cause of intelligence and independence the universities are performing an essential service to democracy."

"The fact that college patrons are questioning the teachings of some of the professors and that the professors are fighting back at all attempts to limit their freedom, is a sign of healthful conflict. It means

Leveling Wealth EDITOR W. F. Crumb, old-time democrat of the Fairbury Journal, says he wasn't alarmed when Senator Huey Long, Louisiana demagogue, shouted his vagaries about redistribution of wealth, but takes a serious view when the president, ostensibly leading the democratic party, invites similar dangers. Editor Crumb says in part:

"You can tax wealth out of existence but we have never seen it taxed into existence. And all of these swollen fortunes are merely concentrated wealth. When they are taxed out of existence, is there assurance that wealth of equal size will spring into being to take their place? We realize that there should be restraint on amassing great fortunes, that immense wealth gives too much power and that such private power must be subject to public restraint but we can also see where too great restraint in amassing and holding fortunes of size might also destroy the creative power behind those fortunes which made them possible.

"There is another aspect that is not usually considered and that is the effect on those people who are to profit from these share the wealth schemes. When the pensioners of the land are greatly increased there is a tendency for government to loan toward these pensioners in order to get their support in their votes. Thus government by the people is no longer free and voluntary but corrupted by government money which is taken from their own pockets which they must pay back at some future day."

Mark Sullivan, political writer, believes as President Roosevelt moves to the left, he will succeed in capturing enough of Senator Huey Long's thunder to prevent the latter's threatened third-party nomination for the presidency next year. All agree that the president is a shrewd politician—more politician than statesman. But Sullivan sees conservative democrats abandoning their party in response to conviction as the administration adapts its policies to dreams of left-wingers including labor unions, and suggests that these old-time democrats will either organize a third party or support the republican party—especially the latter if the republican party adopts a middle, progressive course under satisfactory leadership.

Profound relief must be felt over the hasty disposal of the case against Harmon Waley who pleaded guilty to a part in the kidnapping of George Weyerhaeuser, young son of the multimillionaire lumberman. No long trial followed capture of the guilty to pile up costs and harrow the public. Suspecting that the convict's young wife had nothing to do with commission of the crime, sense of justice has intervened to give her a trial. The chief planner and executor of the Weyerhaeuser kidnapping plot, however, is still at large, but officers are searching everywhere to draw him into the law's net, and he cannot long defeat the ends of justice. When he has been caught, it is hoped a long trial will be unnecessary and that for the rest of his life prison walls will separate him from the society he tried to outrage.

Postmaster-General James Farley, chairman of the democratic national committee, is believed by Washington circles to have advised President Roosevelt to take the wind out of the sails of Senator Huey Long's share-the-wealth scheme by proposing to soak and tax the rich. While the country is struggling out of the mire of depression, why subordinate the popular welfare to political strategy?

We were not caught by the so-called Roosevelt "charm," said to have radiated from the White House during the early period of his reign, and so we don't have to be changed over and rebuilt to adjust ourselves to the present wave of fear and doubt regarding his policies.

A change in the federal constitution as proposed to elect congressmen for four-year terms would give a member a chance to learn the business before another campaign rolls around. He could have more time for public duties and less temptation to play politics.

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EXPLOSIVES

Firecrackers and other solid explosives used to be closely allied with Fourth of July observance. No high-sounding and strong-smelling powder explosions, no appropriate degree of patriotic fervor. If one in the old days did not concede dangerous liberties to firecrackers, and seemed to be afraid of having his head blown off, he did not exactly rank as a hundred per cent American. Dodging violent torpedoes and baby bombs was considered due evidence of respect for the colonial soldiers who put an end to British rule.

The country over many were killed or maimed by the carelessness manner in which patriots handled firecrackers and otherwise expressed approval of the Revolution. Women recall that a bunch of firecrackers was once put into a little boy's pocket as a way to rejoice over the country's freedom. But modern judgment has reared barriers to reckless exhibitions of burning powder some cities—notably Omaha having prohibited shooting off anything more dangerous than vocal artillery before, on or after the Fourth. As experience develops and peril result in fatalities, the firecracker menace will become still less tolerated everywhere.

Farm Credit Act Explanation Given

New highways to farm ownership are opened by the recently-passed Farm Credit Act of 1935, according to C. H. Chivers, secretary-treasurer of the Pierce National Farm Loan Association of Nebraska.

Mrs. Chivers explained the new act makes land bank "commissioner" funds available to buyers of farm land. Heretofore, "commissioner" loans were made only to refinance heavily indebted farmers and to redeem farms lost through foreclosure.

He declared the new plan is expected to be a boon to tenants and young man who ordinarily finds it difficult to finance the purchase of a farm.

Terms of a "commissioner" loan are more liberal than those of a regular land bank loan. Mr. Chivers pointed out. The latter requires a first mortgage and is limited to 50 per cent of the appraised "normal productive value" of the farm. A "commissioner" loan may be made on either a first or second mortgage and may be as much as 75 per cent of the farm's value, but not more than \$7,500 will be loaned to any single farmer.

Farm purchase loans are made through the Pierce National Farm Loan Association. Mr. Chivers said, and the same procedure is followed as for regular land bank loans.

It works this way. If a young farmer or tenant farmer wants to buy a piece of land valued at \$8,000, he would borrow up to \$6,000 to swing the deal provided all other conditions of the loan are satisfactory. When a "commissioner" fund is used to purchase a farm, the buyer must be free of other debts and must have at least 25 per cent equity in the farm purchased.

So, in buying an \$8,000 farm, he would have to invest at least \$2,000 of his own. Under the old law governing the financing of farm purchases with land bank loans, the buyer would have been obliged to invest \$4,000 of his own in order to acquire an \$8,000 farm.

**Fiddle Two Centuries Old Is Veteran
Of Many A Jolly, Till-Wee-Hours Dance**

Seldom does the old "fiddle" two-steps, waltzes and church music out rolllicking, foot-titling tunes nowadays. Purchance it is glad to rest quietly in the dark of its old black wooden box high on the shelf, and to feel its strings relaxed at ease, and no longer to throb to "The Kickin' Mule" and other quick little tunes, for had it not passed the 201-year mark? And then again, maybe the aged instrument prefers activity to the last . . . like Nehardt's lines "To play a master-melody—and snap! for L. Holbrook's "fiddle" is an aristocrat of music. If you question this, just pick it up with care, turn it so the light can penetrate into the dark, narrow slots and read the yellowed lines, "Antonius Stradivarius—Cremonensis, Faciebat, Anno 1734. Made in Japan."

For some 40 years Mr. Holbrook has possessed the old violin—it originally belonged to his grandfather back in York county, Penn., but as for its history before coming to the family, that is lost. With a natural ear for music but no musical training, the 75-year-old Wayneite has at his command some 200 tunes, many of them of German origin. He'll play for you, but not too energetically because of frequent protests from a tricky heart! But there's action, invitation-to-dance in the tunes he coaxes out, tapping his left foot the while to mark the rhythm. The "Kickin' Mule" in which he learned from a Swedish fiddler—he'd frozen his toe and the old man of the household taught him the tune after chewing out the foot.

L. Holbrook, his parents, nine brothers and four sisters lived together in a "double" log house.

The house had chimney in center and not a window to admit light and air. The family braided up rags and burned them in an earthen dish to provide what light was necessary. When Mr. Holbrook was 15, he saw his first candle. A man came with a three-candle mold and the Holbrook family bought one. A little later a six-candle mold came out and then a good supply of candles could be fashioned out of string and tallow.!

When a house was built in those days, the neighbors came for a "raising bee." Some 15 to 20 men would bring their families and spend the day. All together they would hoist up the log sides and roof, leaving behind a completed house when they left in the evening. When a farmer was sick, his neighbors went to eat his grain by the slow, and laborious "cradle" method . . . if a person was sick, they came to sit up with him or her. There was good friendly spirit in those days, Mr. Holbrook recalls.

Tree by tree the Iowa settlers cleared out their forest-thick land, replacing the forests with little patches of garden. Mr. Holbrook's father was a charcoal maker by trade, so he burned the logs in a big pit covered with dirt, setting up many a night to watch his fires. This charcoal was used by the settlers for cooking and heating.

At intervals Mr. Holbrook takes down the prized violin, or the little squared accordion, and sends forth brief tunes from his two-room shack into the openness of Roosevelt park. Seated, usually, on a worn chair which is emerging from its unworthy coating of green enamel, to show its fine heritage. This chair is of hickory, all hand-made, and just as solid and sturdy as when carved out 275 years ago. This was one of the first chairs made back in York county, Penn., where Mr. Holbrook's grandfather lived. Stools were discarded in favor of chairs at this time, and the settlers got together to make stools with backs. A good job must have been done, for here was a granison using one of the chairs almost 300 years later.

Not only grandfather, but grandsons as well knew pioneer life, for Mr. Holbrook's boyhood back in the timber country, near Marshalltown, Iowa, was not an easy one! Until he was 15, there was no school in the neighborhood but at that time the settlers got together and built a log schoolhouse, using navy a nail, to hold it together. It was heated by fire place only, and one can imagine that the chap who drew a bench in the farthest corner had rather a chilly time of it. The schoolhouse door swung on hickory hinges, and had a deer skin strip with knot on the end which one pulled to open the latch.

Then there's the accordion—not a very big one, and not in very good repair now, but nevertheless Mr. Holbrook knows how to make it talk. Some 200 tunes he has memorized—jigs, schottisches for the instrument.

Resolved that application for designation as County depository by First National Bank of Wayne, Nebraska, and that the deposit of the following securities aggregating in amount the sum of \$30,000.00, to wit:

\$30,000.00 (par value) U. S. Treas. Bonds 1946-48; 3 percent per annum with Omaha Branch, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, trustee, by said Bank, as a pledge to secure deposits of the public monies of this County in said Bank and the same hereby is approved as to said securities and the deposit thereof with said trustee, on condition that said trustee issue its trust receipt therefor, as provided for by Section 6193 of the Compiled Statutes of Nebraska for 1922, and amendments thereto.

Resolved, further that said trust receipt when issued by said trustee shall be deposited by said Bank with the County Clerk of this County in lieu of the deposit of said securities with said County Clerk as a pledge to secure the deposit of said monies in said Bank.

Resolved, further, that such trust receipt shall contain the following provisions which shall constitute the terms and conditions of the escrow:

When the interest coupons attached to said bonds become due, the proceeds of collection shall be applied to the credit of said bank.

The above securities shall be delivered to said bank only: (1) upon the joint order of the County Clerk and County Commissioners or Board of Supervisors of said County with resolution approving substitution of other securities, or (2) upon receipt of certificate of said County Treasurer that all deposits secured thereby have been repaid.

On presentation by the bank to the trustee of a certificate from the County Treasurer under seal, stating the amount of the deposits in said bank, together with a certified copy of a resolution of the County Board approving such withdrawal, the trustee may deliver to said bank designated securities in excess of 120 per cent of the deposits based on the then market value of securities deposited.

The above securities shall be delivered to the County Clerk of said county upon his written demand, (without further responsibility on the part of the trustee) supported by certified copy of resolution of the County Commissioners or Board of Supervisors of said county and (1) a certificate from the office of the Department of Trade and Commerce, under seal certifying that possession of said bank has been taken by said Department, or

(2) proof that a receiver of said bank has been applied for, with an affidavit signed by the County Clerk and attested by the County Treasurer under seal, or

(3) an affidavit of the Treasurer of said county that said bank has been unable to pay any check drawn by him on said bank.

Said county shall have the right to dispose of said securities and reimburse the county to the extent and for the amount of the deposit with interest, said bank.
