Club Enrollment Shows Increase

That farm life is again proving more attractive to Nebraska rural youth than is life in the city was indicated in the 4-H club enrollment report received this week by G. H. Leggett from L. I. Frisbie, state club leader at the Nebraska college of agriculture.

An increased interest in all phases of 4-H work in Nebraska is noted with 19,075 boys and girls enrolled in comparison to 16,881 in 1934. Attendance at judging and demonstration schools and club camps has also shown a substantial upturn this year.

In Wayne county there are now 152 boys and girls enrolled in 4-H club work, according to Agent Leggett. This compares with an enrollment of 115 for 1934.

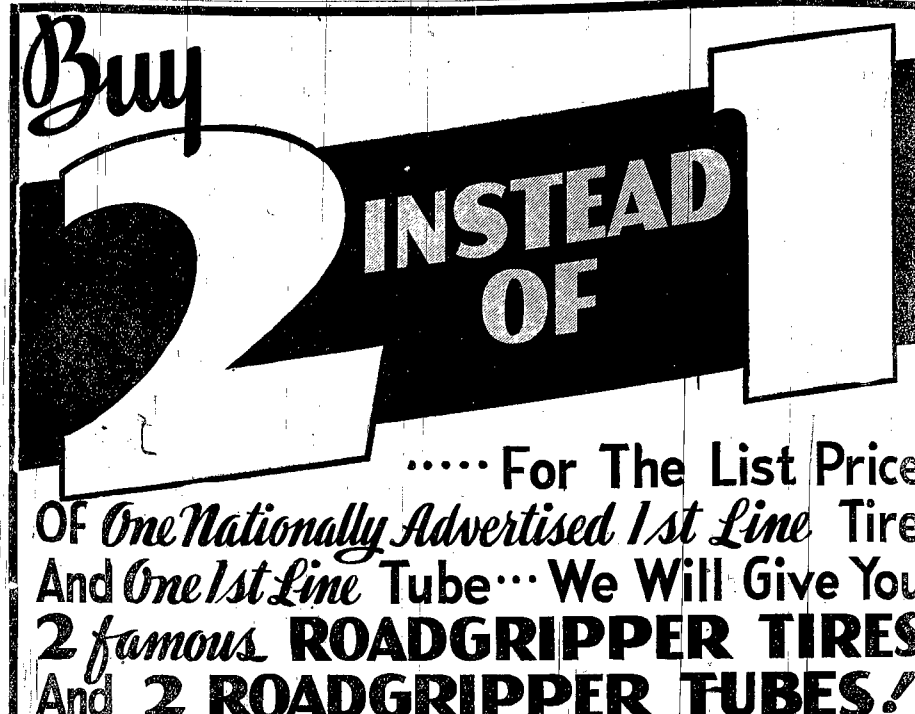

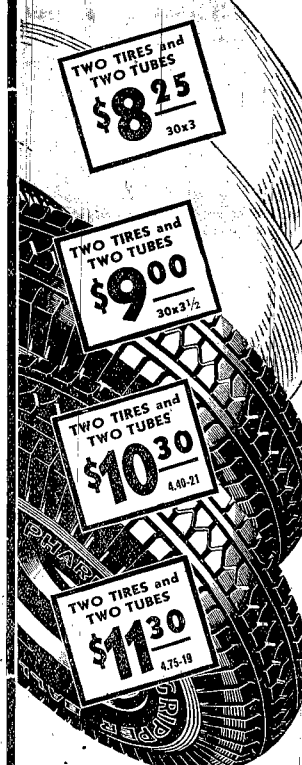

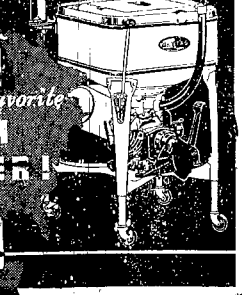

Sometimes names are borrowed from famous characters in history, or from persons temporarily in the public eye. The only draw-back to such names is that they date one's birth too clearly in the eyes of his fellowmen.

Millions and millions of names and name combinations to choose from, and yet some of us have to hunt upon the same . . . few persons, indeed, but what find their name duplicated at some time during their residence on this sphere.

And if you don't think there's a variety a plenty in northeast Nebraska surnames, just delve into the records. From Germany, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Czechoslovakia and Wales comes such names as Joseph Chmelka of Sioux City.

Be glad that you didn't live in the days of Roman glory, for three and even four names were frequently used. Originally all names were expressive of circumstances of the child's birth or appearance.

Verona and Delores, daughters of the L. W. McNatts of Wayne, have markedly musical names. Verona was named for a family friend, the name probably taken from the cathedral town in northeast Italy.

One wonders at the origin of many names encountered. Anna Floy Jones, daughter of Supt. and Mrs. Chester A. Jones of Beiden, for instance, and another daughter, Shirley Veronica Jones . . .

Often persons with too bulky names the kind you have to spell several times to the department store clerk—change their surnames legally. Harry Rinder of Columbus, for example, once answered to the name of Rinderspacher.

Settling of the United States brought into existence a new series of names for new emigrants had to translate their names into English, or else take English equivalents.
