Wayne friends of W. L. Cunningham will be grieved to hear of his passing at the family home at 873 Edgemont boulevard, Hollywood, California, on Tuesday, August 26.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon, August 28, at the Pierce Brothers chapel with Rev. Frank Tinning of the First Presbyterian church of Hollywood in charge.

William L. Cunningham was born in Millifort, Pennsylvania, on March 16, 1875. When a boy he came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Cunningham, to Wayne where they settled on a farm southeast of town.

Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham were both members of the First Presbyterian church of Wayne where for many years Mr. Cunningham sang in the choir.

Travel To East And Canada To See Many Sights

Miss Louise Wendt and Miss Evelyn Wendt arrived home last Thursday from a 3000-mile trip in the east. Walter Brauer of Randolph, who accompanied them as far as Milwaukee, remained there to teach.

The party started from Wayne at 4:30 on the first day and arrived in Milwaukee at 9:30 that evening. They visited friends there for several days. From Milwaukee Miss Louise and Miss Evelyn Wendt went to Toronto, making the trip in two days. They crossed the Ambassador Bridge at Detroit, going into Canada.

First impressions of Canada were not very flattering to the country. Farms looked run down and crops were very different from those in this locality. Instead of corn fields, tobacco and buckwheat fields were present. The nearer they got to Toronto the more prosperous things looked. Fruit orchards were overflowing with apples, peaches and pears.

Toronto itself was a disappointment to the Wayne folks. It is a well-kept city but its crooked, short and narrow streets gave one the impression of a jigsaw puzzle.

The Canadian National Exposition, a yearly occurrence, was just beginning at the time the Wendts arrived in Toronto. It reminded them of the Chicago World's fair but on a much smaller scale. England and her possessions were all represented. Each of them had buildings in which were displayed products of that country. The fair was considerably commercialized, as was the Chicago World's fair. Pageants and fireworks were nightly features at the fair. They were the most wonderful Miss Evelyn says she has ever seen. A band composed of 300 members made up of Scotch bagpipes, fifes, drums and usual instruments, played one evening. An outstanding feature at the exhibition was Rudy Valle and his Connecticut Yankees. They had charge of a huge ballroom on the grounds and were broadcasting on the Fleischman Yeast hour. Dr. Dufco, the Dionne quintuplets' doctor and Robert Ripley were also featured on the program.

Casa Loma was a very outstanding building. It is set in the heart of Toronto. The building is a huge, grey stone castle on grounds which cover about 8 acres. It was built before the war by a man who had high social ambitions and then lost his money after the war. It was turned back to the city for taxes and is now for sale. The cost reaches into millions of dollars and no one can afford to use it as an institution because of the up-keep. It is very typical of an English castle. No one is allowed on the grounds.

The Wayne folks made two trips to Niagara Falls. One was a boat trip from Toronto across Lake Ontario to Lewiston, New York. From there they took a bus to Old Fort Niagara. The fort is situated on the American side, just at the point in which the Niagara river flows into Lake Ontario. The fort has been reconstructed according to the French plan. At different times, England, France and America have held it in their possessions.

From the fort they went by bus back to Lewiston and took an electric car down the Niagara gorge to the falls. They saw the falls from the Canadian and American sides. The Wendts thought the Canadian Horseshoe falls the more beautiful.

The other trip to the falls was on the way home. They drove to

Niagara, Ontario and went through the customs and on into Niagara Falls, New York. They then drove to Buffalo, down through Pennsylvania to Akron, Ohio, Fort Wayne, Ind., and home.

Millions Spent By Last Congress

Karl Stefan Explains To Radio Audience About Work In Washington.

Norfolk News: Fifty million dollars were spent every day during eight months congress was in session, and that means a public dole of \$906 for every family in the United States, counting a family of four persons. Congressman Karl Stefan in a talk over radio station WJAG Sunday afternoon.

"Do you realize that we voted \$10,256,258,928.96 during the first session of the seventy-fourth congress?" he went on. "We spent \$301,000,000 every week; \$64,000,000 every day for 160 days; \$16,500,000 every hour, and \$175,000 every minute. What a spending program! This government is \$30,000,000,000 in debt. We spent \$3,500,000,000 more than we took in during the last twelve months."

"Those of us who fought for economy believe that we are going to be joined by Republicans and Democrats at the opening of the next session, who are determined the spending program is over and economy must be started."

No Mercy for Taxpayers.

The city of Washington, which measures a congressman by the amount of money he is willing to appropriate for the District of Columbia is merciless so far as the taxpayer is concerned, the congressman declared. "It is a city of about 600,000, and practically everyone of them is paying off the taxpayer in one way or another."

"I am not talking to you in way of criticism," Stefan said, "but more calling your attention to the fact that this has been a tremendously expensive congress for the man who pays the taxes. The following gives you some idea of what the present congress is spending:

"Works relief, \$4,880,000,000; treasury and postoffice, \$2,704,985; independent offices, \$7,628,480; agriculture department, \$701,610,578; navy, \$458,884,379; war department, \$401,998,170; state, commerce, justice and labor, \$98,561,895; interior, \$73,249,924; District of Columbia, \$40,547,115; legislative branch, \$20,747,560; first deficiency, \$112,633,830; second deficiency, \$272,901,232."

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Fair Exhibits By Wayne City School Show Much Talent. The Wayne city school has an outstanding exhibit at the county fair this year. Miss Maude Curley, art instructor for grades and high school, has stressed originality of work and subject matter and results are astonishing. At the entrance to the Wayne booth is a pen and ink poster sketch of the Wayne high school in shades of violet, done by Frank Strahan. Wilbur Ahlbers has a card of pen and ink sketches of faces, which is outstanding. A group of cartoons in pencil and pen and ink shows considerable talent. Cover designs for English essays are remarkably well done. Two of the outstanding displays are posters, one advertising American Airlines by Donald Sund, and the other Union Pacific Lines by Frank Strahan. These are pen and ink drawings, exquisitely done. The application of geometric figures to art designs is surprising in the wealth of material displayed. Booklets of quilt patterns, pictures, puzzles, bridges and dress materials make this colorful group interesting and attractive. Cards of pastel crayon sketches of high school girls and copies of cover designs by Betty Evans, Geraldine Gamble and several others show a surprising amount of talent and originality in selection of color. Frank Strahan has a pen and ink sketch of "Hell Gate Bridge" that is beautifully done. A football poster by the same lad is an interesting study in black and white. There is a display of charcoal and pastel still life studies well worth seeing. Displays of original Christmas card designs in block prints and stencil splatters, show a tendency to graceful lines and excellent color selection. Free-hand drawings by grade pupils are surprising in line and grace. The display is well-worth seeing and parents of children whose work is exhibited, will be rightly proud of progress in art. The work at the Wayne public school booth shows a more than ordinary amount of talent and application. State Fair Success. 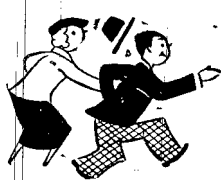

## As They Do It In Russia.

Omaha Journal-Stockman: It is no longer denied that many of our ideas of a planned agriculture are taken from Europe. Over there the farmers, or peasants, are accustomed to being dictated to and taxed heavily and while they do not like it they have learned that it is not safe to resist or complain.

With our own government tightening its grip on agriculture and practically all lines of business activity, Frank Kent, newspaper writer who has returned from abroad, is convinced that the United States is following in the footsteps of Russia. If our farmers could see conditions in Russia as a result of the encroachments of the Soviet regime on the lives of the people they would immediately lose all their enthusiasm for a regime that is progressing along Russian lines, Kent declares.

The Soviet has such a strangle hold that the country is groveling in fear. It is relieved of the necessity of thought and deprived of

## the power of initiative. Outside of millions of government employes they lead a straight-jacket existence in which he says, "their chief comfort is the knowledge that no one, other than millions of government officials, is any better off or has any more freedom than they have."

This is the view, he says, of Americans now in Russia. "In their opinion nothing is more vital than to check the trend in America toward full government control of industry, agriculture and finance, before it goes too far. They pray it may be done. In brief, the surest way to cure a pink communist is to let him live in Moscow a while."



**Canning Activities Occupy Time Of Farm Women in Summer and Fall**

September and October are the two months of the year when the country housewife feels a sense of well-being and deep inner satisfaction as she views the neat rows of jars tucked away on basement and cellar shelves. Great stone jars of cucumbers in brine hobnob with equally interesting jars of kraut in the dark coolness. Soon potato bins will be filled to overflow; heads of cabbage, carefully wrapped in newspaper, dark green squash and golden pumpkins will join the throng.

The Herald reporter had the privilege of visiting a number of farm women the past week and inspecting well-stocked basements and cellars. There is undoubtedly much of the artist in the souls of women who work with produce of the soil. The jar arrangement seems invariably with an eye to color, symphonies in yellows, reds greens and purples.

Cucumbers are plentiful since the rains and the spicy fragrance of pickling vinegar wafts from many open doors and windows. Dills, bread and butter, sweet and sour pickles are going into jars these days. Whitney crab trees have produced a good many apples this summer and a Whitney crab apple, pickled, is something long to be remembered. The crabs make excellent sauce, and many a Sunday supper is glorified with apple sauce and cake.

Many women have learned the wisdom of combining the lowly mulberry with cherries and also with apples. Cherries the past year were not so plentiful as they were a year ago but many women had jars of the fruit left from the crop of 1934, which with the fruit obtained this year, makes a brave showing.

Peaches and pears are coming in now and the next few weeks will find many a farm kitchen the scene of disturbing sights and aromas. Canned peaches and peaches, marmalades, pickled peaches and speed pears will be set to cool on kitchen tables before being put away on already well-stocked shelves.

Sweet corn did not do so well this year because of the dry weather but many women canned field corn, a splendid substitute. A great many families enjoy the flavor of dried corn and those who had sweet corn the past summer, spent days drying and putting the corn away in cotton bags.

A great labor-saving discovery which housewives have made in the canning of fruit juices, instead of immediately making them up into jellies, jelly-making over a hot stove when the thermometer hovers around 100 degrees, is anything but pleasant, while winter-time jelly-making makes any woman look forward to a morning in the kitchen. The juice of grapes, plums and apples may be canned in bottles or jars and jelly made when there are more leisure moments and time for experimentation.
