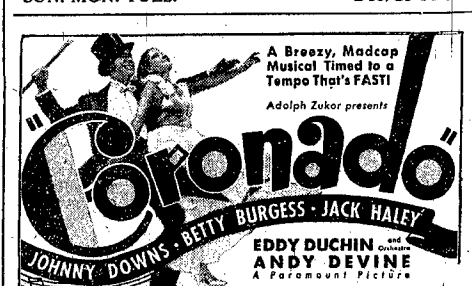

MUCH BUILDING IN WAYNE VICINITY FOR PAST YEAR

Town Has More Improvements Than Others In State—Rural Communities Of The Territory Keep Step With City.

Building activity in Wayne for the past year was greater than for a number of years past. Wayne has more improvements, both through federal funds and private means, than any other town in the state.

The city has done a great deal of work on the power house which was before installation of the new engine. In addition to the financing of new city auditorium through PERA and bond issue, new tennis courts for the city were built through PWA projects.

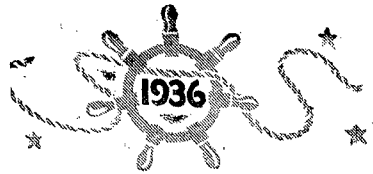

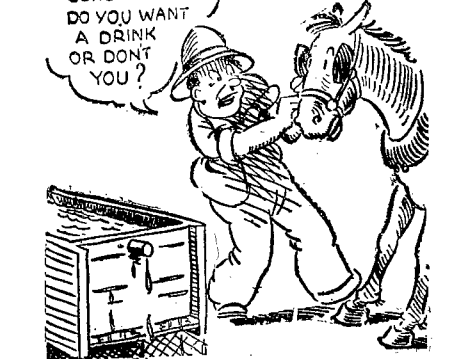
