

Two Piano Recitals Planned Here Soon

Wayne college piano department has prepared two programs for school. These are sponsored by the K. M. K. music club and are under supervision of Prof. Albert C. Carlson, director of the piano department.

This is Miss Kile's second year at Wayne State and she has worked at music during both years. Robert Arter is a freshman this year. He has developed a considerable degree of proficiency as a pianist and will be heard with much interest in his work in the double-piano numbers and his solos.

Old Justice Record For County Is Discovered In Carroll Vault

Vaughn Williams of Carroll, recently discovered an old justice record docket in one of the bank vaults at that place and has returned it to Wayne where it rightfully belongs. The entries date back to November 2, 1872, the first case recorded by a justice of the peace in the little settlement of LaPorte.

D. Bennett. First record in justice court in which the names of Riley and Selden appear as attorneys is listed as March 24, 1886. In September, 1886, Alexander Scott, old settler in the county, filed a complaint in court for the failure of a boarder to pay his bill. The name of G. W. Riley, attorney, is listed for December 9, 1886.
