

Foreign Oils Still a Menace. Toreign Oils Still a Menace. Omaha Journal-Stockman: American stock growers and feeders are being fed up with the statement from packers that our market for beef is depressed at this time because of excessive offerings of cattle. They resent the fact that we are getting imports of cattle and meat from other countries while we are producing more cattle and meat than the domestic market can absorb. But it is not alone in the matter of live stock and meats that foreign importations are exercising a depressing influence. Professor Gramlich of the University of Ne-braska, called the attention of the Kansas City chamber of commerce the other day to the fact that highly finished beef cattle from the corn belt and northern Colorado possess 10 per cent of their weight in the form of separable fat. "This fat," he said, "hunts a market of its own and the price which the processor realizes for it is with-out question reflected both to the farmer who buys the meat." Palm oil, cocoanut oil, inedible oils and similar importations from the tropics, steal-ing directly into market for home fats, greases and oils, were breasted somewhat in their flow by the three-cent excise tax on foreign fats and oils which went into ef-fect in 1932. The pressure is serious, nev-ertheless, and incidentally the battle for the removal of the tax is unrelenting. Toe Much Politics

In the next place, the policies and prac-

icies followed. In the next place, the policies and prac-tices followed in providing relief and work relief accentuate the suspicion. Boon-dogging projects of a useless, fatuous and even silly nature are sponsored and paid for. Funds are provided for open forums I and radio broadcasts, although both fields are amply filled by volunteer and private effort.

effort. But the New Deal seems to have money for everybody, whatever his or her whim or hobby. It also starts vast public works, to cost fabulous sums, such as the scheme to harness the tides off the coast of Maine and to build a canal across Florida. Both these schemes have long been 'regarded with doubt, yet they were rushed into by the New Dealers as easily and gaily as if they were the merest trifles.
