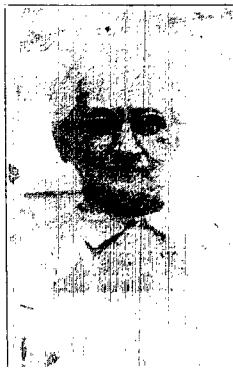

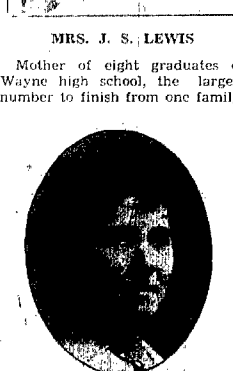

Nebraska Accident Reports For Weeks

The Nebraska Press Association, Lincoln Hotel, Lincoln, May 20, 1936. Accident statistics as compiled by the Nebraska Press Association and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction...

In the following charts an analysis is given of the major causes of accidents under each of the five major classifications: Motor vehicle: Skid 6, injured 10, total 10; mechanical defect, 1, injured 1, total 1; losses control 3, injured 4, total 4; passing car struck car passed 1, injured 1, total 2; passing car struck oncoming car 4, collision 22, injured 35, disabled 2, total 37; struck obstruction 8, injured 8, disabled 1, deaths 1, total 10; struck pedestrian 17, injured 15, disabled 1, deaths 1, total 17; struck bicycle 3, injured 3, total 3; driver asleep 1, injured 1, total 1; passing signals and highway markers 2, injured 3, total 3; railroad crossing 4, injured 1, total 1; struck parked car 6, injured 7, deaths 2, total 9; miscellaneous 10, injured 11, total 11. Total number accidents 88, injured 100, disabled 4, deaths 4, total 108.

Other public accidents: Fires 43, falls 26, injured 26, death 1, total 27; cuts 11, injured 11, total 11; miscellaneous 49, injured 39, deaths 3, total 42. Total number accidents 129, injured 76, deaths 4, total 80. The deaths were caused by drowning, accidental gunshot, results of a fall and child caught in wire hanging from tree. Other accidents were caused by fires, lightning, accidental gunshot, falls at play, accidentally falling in deep water and nearly drowning, running weed into eye, dog bites, crumpling cars, breaking window while lowering it and cutting hand, stepping on rusty nails, getting poisoned thistles and silvers in hands, face being cut by hairstones and sprained ankle resulting from walking over a brick.

Agriculture: Fires 36, falls 10, injured 9, deaths 1, total 10; injured by horses or cattle 9, injured 9, total 9; miscellaneous 20, injured 13, disabled 1, death 2, total 15. Total number accidents 75, injured 31, disabled 1, deaths 2, total 34. The agricultural deaths were caused by a fall from a tractor, and infection resulting from an ax wound. Other accidents were caused by fires, lightning, falling from machinery, falls from a housepost, barbed wire cuts, injuries received from buzz saws or chopping wood, gasoline burns while kindling a brush fire, escaping steam from radiator cap burning face, runaways, falling from horses and being kicked by horses or cows. A hedge thorn getting in the eye, causing infection and necessitating removal of the eye caused the one disability.

Industry: Falls 5, injured 4, death 1, total 5; machinery 5, injured 5, total 5; miscellaneous 11, injured 11, total 11. Total number accidents 21, injured 20, death 1, total 22. A fall from a ladder while painting a house caused the one death. Other accidents were caused by railroad engine drum exploding, railroad brakeman leaning too far from window of car and striking head, gasoline tank explosion, falls, catching hands in machinery, and particles flying into eyes and face.

Home: Fires 13; falls, 12, injured 12, total 12; burns and scalds 7, injured 7, total 7; miscellaneous 13, injured 19, deaths 1, total 20. Total number of accidents 45, injured 38, deaths 1, total 39. Drinking a cup of gasoline caused the death of one youngster. Other home accidents were caused by falls, cuts, bottle of carbolic acid breaking in hand, stove exploding, gas escaping in heating stove, attacks by roosters, apron catching on hook and breaking wrist, youngsters catching fingers in screen doors and almost losing fingers, two youngsters eating lye and burning mouths, youngster swallowing water disinfectant pill, and catching hands in wringer.

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
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Old Newspaper Files Yield Items Of Local Interest Fifty Years Ago

Early Days in Wayne School and City Retold In Excerpts From Papers of 1882 and the Years Following—"Time Marches On."

"Time Marches On!" No argument is more convincing than an afternoon of browsing among newspaper files from way back in 1882 when the town of Wayne was in its infancy—struggling on its way upward. Yellowed and brittle with age, many of the papers crumble at the touch, their pages giving off a faintly acrid odor as the edges disintegrate.

Newspapers in the early days of Wayne county were mostly plate, and looking for local news is like the search for the proverbial needle in the haystack. The hard-worked editor inserted this comment in one issue: "Don't forget the editor when you have news items. Remember we cannot do our own work and go around rustling news at the same time."

In connection with the golden jubilee of the Wayne high school, the Herald reporter searched through files at the county courthouse for news of the schools and the city of fifty years ago. The following excerpts will refresh many of the half-forgotten incidents in the minds of early Wayne residents:

Logan Valley Herald for May 23, 1884, A. P. Childs editor, gives the report of Jesse S. Hike, county superintendent for Wayne county, for the year ending May 7, 1884; number of school districts in the county, 29; number of children of school age, 914; number of teachers, male, 10, female, 26, total 36; average number of school days in all districts, 98; school expense for year \$15,035; cash on hand, \$5,530.

Publish School Papers.

The same edition of the Logan Valley Herald makes mention of two school papers published in Wayne, the "None-Such Record," Helen Lodge, editor; the "Wide-Awake Enterprise," Miss May Dawke, editor. Editor's comment on the papers is quoted: "They are said to be very creditable enterprises and are read on alternate Friday afternoons in the school."

Under the caption "How We Grow," is described the advancement of the "city" of Wayne in the early days: "Although it is still early in the building season, a walk around town will convince even the most skeptical that town continues to enjoy healthy improvement. At the present time improvements are being made, or are now under headway to the extent of upwards of \$30,000, and more will be done during the year."

"Soap Vender" Visits Wayne.

The editor gives the glibbie Waynites a severe tongue-lashing under the headline, "A Spider

and His Flies," and one wonders how many secretly abashed readers hid away their soap boxes: "The benevolent vendor of soap, at \$1 per box, with a \$10 bill thrown in with every three packages, did a rushing business on the streets of Wayne last Saturday, showing conclusively that the fool-killing hasn't been attending to business of late."

The editor, who in the early days was "paid" his subscription dues in anything ranging from cabbages to blind horses, likewise was the instigator of all public meetings. Editor Childs called a meeting May 31, 1884, for the forming of an agricultural society, and arranging for a county fair. In the notice is the following: "It will be remembered that produce sent to the Sioux City fair last summer by Dr. R. B. Crawford, and picked atrandom from his garden, carried off most of the honors."

John Beebe began putting up a new store building, 16x22 in front of his residence, north of the Henry Ley store in the spring of 1884. The Methodists began work on a new church building, with Rev. Pittinger having just arrived to take up ministerial duties for the congregation. W. O. Gamble proposed to have some hardy catalpa trees and planted several thousand of seeds on a lot in Lake's addition to Wayne. At a "pie-eating" contest, Pete Coyne was named county champion.

Publish 1882 Honor Roll.

Roll of honor for the primary department of the Wayne school for May 23, 1882, included: Eva Allen, Muriel Walter, Artie Quinn, David Morton, Lois Childs, Frank Nangle, Homer Skeen, Monte Goetner, Mertie Allen; Anna Davis, teacher. In the higher department the following were named on the honor roll: Nora Crawford, May Diltz, Emma Slater, Katie Porter, Dottie Brown, Mabel Gamble, Lizzie Hayes, Sadie Slater, Eva Beebe, Charlie Morton, Clark Miller, John Wise, Bertha Armstrong, Jessie Diltz, Clinton Slater, Fred and Robbie Armstrong, DeForest Hancock, Frank Beebe, Fred Nusbaum, Harry Fisher and Carrie Wise; Susie Davies, assistant teacher. W. J. McCoy was principal of the school.

Wayne had a school population of 125 in 1882; Wisner's school population was 185.

National Interest Items.

The Logan Valley Herald for May 30, 1885, are the following items of early day national interest: General Butler accepted the nomination of the national anti-monopoly organization for president of the United States; bills were passed in the senate for building bridges across the Missouri river at Rulo and Decatur, Neb.; an amendment was made on the agricultural bill for locating and sinking artesian wells on the plains to reclaim arid waste lands; the senate passed a resolution to examine failures of national banks.

Census returns for Wayne county from an issue for June 6, 1884, of the Logan Valley Herald: Spring Branch, 219; Hancock, 137; Deer Creek, 141; Wayne, 1290; LaPorte, 452; Leslie, 631; total for county, 2,882.

Celebrate Fourth in 1884.

Wayne celebrated the Fourth of July in 1884 with the Casey post, No. 5 of the G. A. R. in charge. The entertainment including races and other sports, an army dinner was served at noon for 25 cents. Men in charge of the arrangements were J. T. Bressler, Jas. Britton, L. C. Dearborn, A. T. Chapin, O. F. Crane, R. H. Wilbur, J. P. Culver, O. H. Burson.

Wayne churches in 1880 and their pastors were: Presbyterian, Rev. F. B. Baker; St. Paul's Lutheran, Rev. M. L. Mellick; Baptist, Rev. W. H. Swartz; St. Mary, Rev. C. Mugan; Methodist, Rev. Wm. Gorst.

First Children In Program.

From a paper for April 19, 1899, is the following: "As an example of the rapid growth of the fabled wild west, perhaps no point shows fairer illustration than this young and thriving community. The lariats, sombreros and buckskin breeches still hang on the walls of many homes beside the herds' long whip. But society has dropped these peculiarities and in imitation of the older section, the schoolhouse and the home of refinement are to be seen on every side. As an instance of the rapid transformation may be mentioned the school festivities of Washington's birthday. This was the representation of the father of his country and his amiable spouse by the first boy and girl born in Wayne.

"Edna Wayne Britton, the artless representative of the mother of America—round-faced, rosy-checked girl with sparkling eyes and mischievous mouth. Demure in ancient costume as she appeared on the platform. Edna was born in Wayne September 6, 1881, and is now quite 8 years of age. She is the daughter of the Hon. James Britton.

"The father of his country might have been a twin as to size and vivacious appearance. John C. Childs is the only son of Arthur P. Childs, editor of the Wayne Herald-Gazette. He was born December 23, 1881. The children are among the brightest in the Wayne school and aptly illustrate the adaptability of pure air of the west in the production of fine specimens of the human race."

Plan Academy Building.

The issue of May 3, 1889, carried the plans and specifications for the new Wayne academy building. The building was to be of solid brick, 50-feet square and three stories high. The plans were sent to the board of education at St. Louis, Mo., for inspection. A letter in reply from the St. Louis board May 31, 1889, carried the following advice: "Secure your teaching force to begin with and guarantee their salaries. When the academy is well-opened, appoint a board of trustees, composed of citizens of the place, in part clerical and laymen of the church. The course of study should be shaped to the end of developing the academy into a college. The institution will soon expand and expend more money with the town, than the town puts into it."

The following contribution from a Wayne citizen is amusing and probably struck responsive chords in the hearts of many harassed men of the community at house cleaning time: "Tell me, ye winged winds that round my pathway roar: Do ye know some quiet spot where housewives clean no more; some lone sequestered, leafy dale; some island ocean cleft, where life is not one ceaseless war, with cobwebs and with dirt; where only Nature's carpet spreads beneath the tired feet, and wretched men are never compelled, its emerald folds to beat?"

Crop prospects in June and July 1889 were excellent. It was expected that wheat would make from 20 to 30 bushels to the acre. Flax prospects were a third better than for the previous year.

The Herald-Gazette gave a graphic account of two buggies which collided on Main street on a Saturday afternoon, in the late traffic "rush."

Ninth Normal Graduation.

An account is given in the same paper August 10, 1900, of the ninth annual commencement exercises at the Nebraska Normal college with editorial comment as follows: Perhaps no similar temple of learning in all the Northwest has so successfully passed through such vicissitudes and barriers as has this typical school of the great west." The Crescent and Philomathean clubs of Wayne entertained the graduates with the class members furnishing the following program: Essays, Pearl Sewell, Belle Olmstead; orations, Jessie Cash, Chas. Cutter; recitations, Virginia Batchelder, Mabel Dodge, Sidney Smith; debate, Resolved: That the initiative and referendum should be adopted in all important state legislation, affirmative, Margaret Hilly, H. E. Hiatt and negative, Mabel Smith, Sidney Smith.
