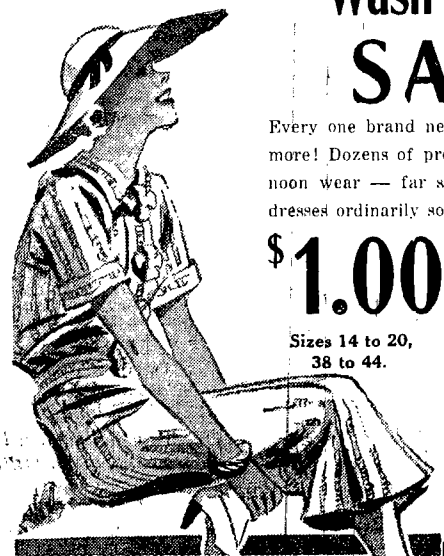

Sees Early Gambling Den Of Pioneer Days In San Antonio

R. H. Jacques Employed in "White Elephant" Building, Once Famous Meeting Place Of Lone Star State Characters.

The controversy over whether or not Buffalo Bill Cody was a federal spy and whether a statue of the Indian fighter should be included in the hall of arts at the Texas Centennial Exposition in San Antonio, recalls to R. H. Jacques of Wayne, numerous stories of the early characters in the Lone Star state.

Says Mr. Jacques: "I used to work in the same building where in the early days 'Silver King, Bill Cody and Billy Sims had their gambling den. Of course, it wasn't a gambling house when I worked there but the 'White Elephant' was a notorious place in the early days of San Antonio."

"The 'White Elephant' saloon was the highest building in San Antonio at one time and on the top floor was a secluded room where the famous early day characters stacked their chips and cut the cards. The story is told that Silver King always played with a six-shooter on either side of him and his motto was 'Not a Crooked Move!'"

"In Mr. Jacques' day a man named Sam Wolfson had a dry goods and clothing store in the building, and the Wayne man worked for him as 'cash boy.' The white elephant sign was never removed from the building even when it became a clothing emporium. New boys coming into the employ of Mr. Wolfson were initiated by taking them to the 'spook' room on the top floor—the entrance to the steep stairway was concealed in a plain white wall and of the wall at the point where the latch was hidden was the imprint of a bloody hand. The print had been there since the old gambling days and even those who were used to it were sometimes conscious of prickly sensations in the spinal region."

"The Wayne man describes the room where these famous early day characters spent their hours of leisure, as being very spacious and nicely finished. 'Silver King established the King ranch near Corpus Christi, Texas, and is noted as having been the biggest rancher in the world. 'Billy Sims,' say Mr. Jacques, 'was nothing but a gambler—a notorious one in the early history of the state. I saw him once—he was a big man and always wore a silk hat. They used to tell the story in San Antonio of how Billy once killed a hack-driver for smashing his silk hat. Sims died after I left there—I think he was killed in a fight.'"

Mr. Jacques recalls when Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders were stationed at San Antonio and had their camp at the fair grounds just outside the city. One of the buildings was used as a dance hall and people from San Antonio frequently went there for an evening's entertainment. On one of these occasions the Rough Riders, feeling a bit hilarious and not exactly responsible, made the evening interesting by tearing up carriages and stampeding horses from the stables where they were kept. People of San Antonio were highly incensed at such rowdy behavior and took the matter into their own hands. The soldiers were ordered out of the town and assisted in their hurried departure by being packed unceremoniously into box cars. 'Teddy Roosevelt was a fine looking man in those days,' says
