Digest THE Literary Digest has oiled its poll-taking machinery, and last week announced a preliminary experiment dealing with the electorate of Binghamton, N. Y. The result showed a big swing away from the New Deal. In 1934 Binghamton voters were asked to pass judgment on Roosayelt policies and 55.5 per cent expressed approval. The late poll, drew New Deal favor of only 36.04 per cent.

The Digest has established a reputa-The Digest has established a reputation for accuracy in sounding public opinion. When it predicted the election of Roosevelt in 1932, republicans drummed up courage by figuring it was mistaken. In 1934 when the Digest poll indicated majority support for the New Deal, opponents figured there was a mistake—and there was, but it was in popular judgment, not in accuracy of the Digest's findings. 
