Suggest Method Of Hauling Animals

The Nebraska Farm Bureau suggests the following on loading animals for hauling: "When horses are loaded crosswise into an open motortruck they are safer if their heads are toward the outside of the load.

"A common practice when hauling horses in open trucks is to load them half and half, that is, crosswise with every other head toward the center of the load. The length of the average horse from tail to breast is about the same as the width of the average livestock truck.




