Two Men Are Sentenced By District Judge On Wednesday.

Pleading guilty to robbing the Carroll bank of \$1,430 on June 13 at preliminary hearing in county court Wednesday morning, Albert England and Orie England, Omaha...

In court Wednesday morning Albert England wore deep blue shirt and striped overalls. Orie, his nephew, wore white shirt and light trousers. Each of the men is about 5 feet 5 inches tall and each weighs about 130.

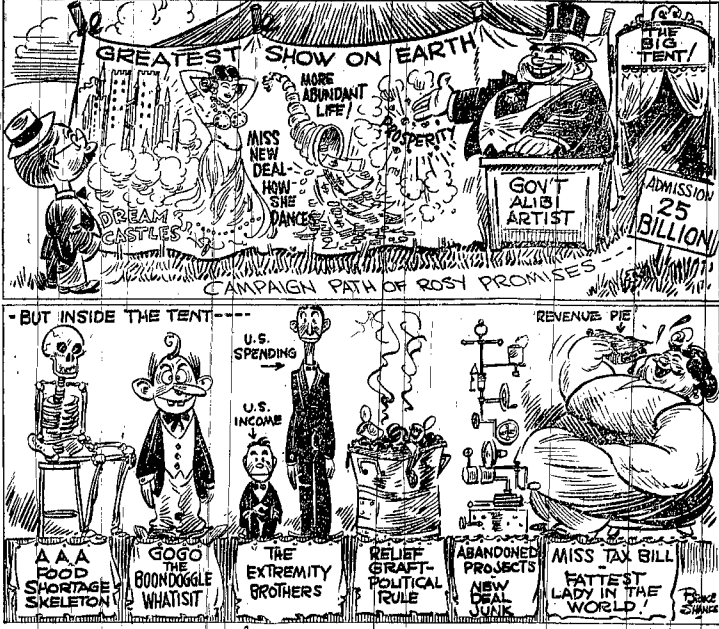
