DROUTH PUTS OFF TAKING SHARE IN PROSPERITY WAVE

IT MAKES us rather envious to hear about ascending prosperity in the east, and then look over the middle west and find nothing over which to feel elated. Radio speakers and newspapers speak of the depression in the past tense. Economist Roger Babson mentions a "tidal wave of dividend increases, wage boosts and year-end bonuses." Prices are up, and promise to go higher. Just drouth left the middle west with little to sell, and high prices only make the going harder. We are not enthusiastic over the altitudinal commodity costs in view of empty granaries and depleted feed lots. When we raise another crop we will cash in on improved conditions. In the meantime, we are inclined to look to the east's rising tide of good times with deferred and uneasy expectations.

KIDDIES' RIDES PROVIDED HERE

Evergreen Festoons And Colored Lights Are Being Hung. Free rides for children are arranged for next Saturday's Christmas feature in Wayne. Santa Claus and his famous tonch will be here from 1:30 to 3 p. m. to take all children for rides. The sleigh will carry 40 children at a time. In case there is no snow Santa will have rubber-tired wheels on the sleigh. Girl scouts have the pre-holiday feature for December 12. The girls will present plays, dances and music at the city auditorium at 2 o'clock that afternoon. Everyone is invited. Children are invited to remain for games which the girls will conduct, and for the visit of Santa Claus and his distribution of treats. Lily of the Valley and Oak troops are joining in the plans. The Christmas committee plans something special each afternoon beginning December 14. Decoration of the business district started this week. At intervals along Main street are hung evergreen festoons which are draped from the sides of the street to a point high over the center and from this peak hang evergreen wreaths. Colored lights are strung along the festooning. Wayne Business Men's club is in charge of pre-Christmas arrangements, and the business district is furnishing funds for decoration, entertainment and treats.

Work On Projects Showing Progress

Construction To Continue As Long As Labor And Teams Available. Work will progress on WPA projects in Wayne county as long as labor and teams are available through federal permission. Graveling of the new grade from seven miles south of Wakefield west six and a half miles, has been completed. Grading is continuing to join No. 15 miles south of Wayne but no provision is made for completion of the grade or for gravel of this mile and a half. The water conservation dam on the Chas. Schellenberg farm west of Winside will be completed this week. Work on straightening a creek channel and on a new bridge south of Winside continues, also grading east of Carroll and hand grading south of Sholes. A channel is being straightened east of Sholes and will be completed this week. Grading is being done west of Hoskins. The new cemetery fence in Wayne is nearly completed, and work is continuing on curb and gutters in Wayne. About 75 are working in Dixon county on a curb, gutter and gravel project in Wakefield. All WPA workers are being reinterviewed to determine future needs.

TOPIC AT CLUB IS EVOLUTION

Dr. R. R. Stuart Explains Plant and Animal Theory For Kiwanians.

"Evolution does not deal with man," said Dr. R. R. Stuart, instructor in the biology department at the Wayne State Teachers college, when speaking to the Kiwanis members Monday after the regular noonday luncheon. "Many people have the misconception that evolution deals only with humans," continued Dr. Stuart. "It is the derivation of plants, animals and such from one type to another." In 1798 an essay was written on the increase of things on earth. It pictured the world full of things and all could not exist so the weaker were the victims," said the speaker. Thus Charles Darwin was not the first to think of evolution of living species. Darwin studied 25 years before giving his theory so it was not just something thought up in a hurry. Darwin found flowers and animals on an island that had been separated from the main land for many years. He decided that the main land and island had been joined at one time and the flowers and animals were the same. At the time Darwin found the species, said Dr. Stuart, the flowers and the animals on the island differed greatly from those on the main land. Animals and flowers change by weeding out, which process is called natural selection. Thus the animals and flowers changed on this island. An experience with primroses brought about the mutation theory. The primroses had not been bred with any other variety but some of them grew very tall and had different petals while the originals were a small plant. Sudden changes in species produce true breeding. Mutations are now made by chemical treatments. Dr. Stuart explained how it is impossible for all the codfish eggs, the grasshopper eggs and others to mature. There would not be room for them on the earth. Thus the weaker have to be weeded out. Different species inherit certain characteristics because of necessities. The boys' glee club from the Wayne high school opened the meeting Monday by singing three numbers. Water Navigation To Be Available In Development of Mississippi

Flood control and river navigation in the valleys of the Mississippi and all its tributaries were considered last week when the Mississippi Valley association held its meeting in St. Louis. Developments in this inland water project will be of great importance to the middle west in a few years, according to Frank Kloppling of Carroll, who arrived home Thursday after attending the meeting as personal representative for Governor R. L. Cochran. Fourteen states are affected by the Mississippi system, Mr. Kloppling explains, tributaries reaching as far east of New York, Fort Peck dam in Montana is a big factor in the development. A sleet storm which created a demand for extra employees was

Well over 32 years are credited to Mr. Perdue, wire chief for the Northwestern Bell Telephone company at Wayne. In the sleet storm emergency Mr. Perdue's temporary service was recognized as valuable and he shortly thereafter obtained a permanent position with the telephone organization. Mr. Perdue's service in the plant department began August 7, 1904, at Norfolk. He was transferred to Wayne as wire chief June 16, 1911, and he has continued in this capacity the past 25 years. Those who use the telephone many times each day seldom stop to realize the service that makes for such efficiency of the utility. Snow, sleet and lightning, also extremes of heat and cold demand constant vigil. It is this watchful care which Mr. Perdue has given for nearly a third of a century and for which he now earns retirement.

Mr. Perdue has made no definite plans for the future but expects to continue his residence in Wayne.

Need of Religion In Thanksgiving

Rev. L. W. Gramly Speaker At Union Services Here On Holiday.

"Someone has said that religion without thanksgiving is like a song without music. Perhaps it would be better to say that religion without thanksgiving is like a song without music and also words." So began Rev. L. W. Gramly in his sermon at the union Thanksgiving day services in the Methodist church.

"We live in a confusing and dizzying age. Nationally and internationally many opposing forces are evident, and this disarms many ignorant souls. They do not know or have forgotten that there can be no equilibrium unless one force is balanced by another, and the greater the number of forces the less likely will there be crash. It is a time when some try to make fanciful remedies and time matters of permanence, but time makes all fashions obsolete." Rev. Gramly continued. "No matter how snappy and nifty a new model is, it still may develop a flat tire or run out of gas. Like an old model its usefulness depends upon the driver, his skill and resources.

"Men and women struggle and fight for more of today's manna than they can use to find it full of worms tomorrow. The world is God's experiment and not man's. Delicate instruments are made to give false readings in the hands of clumsy operators; great weights finely balanced can easily bring disaster if not appreciated and respected. By machines a tiny child can safely perform tasks that used to be hazardous for giants. Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord. Man's distrust for this God and faith has changed stars on service flags from blue to gold. The World War made sad-faced gold star mothers of women who were smiling madonnas 20 years earlier. It has recently been said that the world is only actually about one-tenth Christian and that tenth will be called upon to defend its institutions and very life shortly if it bequeath anything to posterity," added Rev. Gramly. "A leprous world cries out to Christ to cleanse it. He has bid it show itself in properly constituted ways that it is clean. But only one-tenth praises God and give evidence that his healing method was actually employed. Nine out of ten still are themselves diseased and threaten to contaminate those who have been made clean. To one out of ten Jesus said, 'Go thy way, thy faith hath made thee whole.' What a drag the faithfulness of the other nine makes upon the one!

"Distrust, suspicion, power, might prevent an operating League of Nations and today it is dead. Informed people are no longer trying to prevent war. They know it can scarcely be postponed. 'The snares of death compassed me round about, and the pains of hell got hold of me.' And yet," continued Rev. Gramly, "old religionists will offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving; he will do it in the sight of the people; he will do it in the Lord's house! 'Much as a people may love its flag and patriotically sing about seeing it by rocket's red glare and hear bombs bursting in air, it needs the equilibrant force for its patriotism that perhaps only the religion of Jesus Christ can give. Let them also see and hear. 'Praise the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, praise His holy name.'"

Wm. Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, called for an amendment of the social security act to protect the gigantic old age reserve fund from congressional "whisms." Green is fearful congress might use the 46 million accumulated by 1980 for some other purpose. Green asks an amendment as follows: To extend employment insurance and compulsory old age annuity plans to cover agricultural workers and all industrial employees; increase the maximum federal contribution for old age pensions from \$15 to \$25 a month; have the federal government contribute to the annuity system and reduce the workers' contribution; and provide for federal collection of the entire employer paid unemployment insurance pay roll tax with subsequent grants to state funds.

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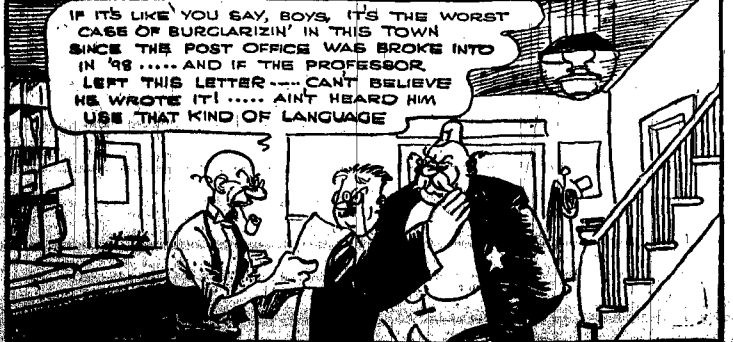
