Bridge Near Dixon Destroyed By Fire

Hard-surfacing of the road from
Concord to Dixon and north to
highway No. 20 will be held up for
a time because a large bridge two
miles north of Dixon burned last
week.
The bridge, which was being
built on this highway under the
supervision of L. E. McBride, con-
struction engineer of Wakefield, was
left for the night with a
watchman who was keeping a
charcoal fire burning under the
bridge to keep cement for piling
from freezing. It in some way set
fire to the girder beams coated
with creosote. By the time help
was obtained the bridge was too
far burned to be saved.
Engineer McBride states that
those beams must be made to order
and require some time to be
replaced. As the contractor car-
ried no insurance covering that
type of accident on the bridge, he
will be out the sum of about
\$2,000 for its loss.

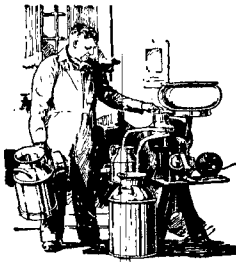
