Not Bloc A HIGHLY educated individual, commenting on what seems al, commenting on what seems of the public questions in Wayne, charged the reason to the existence of blocs, and the cowing of one bloc by other blocs. This conclusion does not tally with our experience or observation. A bloc is virtually a ring to carry out certain purposes or serve selfish ends. In twentyfive years' activity in Wayne we have discovered no bloc or ring, its imembers understanding one another as to methods and aims. Either we do not know a ring when we see one, or are too much aloof from the ring business to feel it, or none has ever existed here.

In conflict with the bloc idea, we re call that a lady teacher told us many years ago that Wayne was too well satisfied with itself to be demonstrably stirred up over anything. Isn't it lack of blocs or rings, itself to be demonstrator, some anything. Isn't it lack of bldes or rings, and indifference or smug content through independent thinking and individual decision rather than group cooperation that prevent response to popular subjects? Isn't the form too little rather than too much the time too little rather than too much organized to arouse its spirit and put dynamic force into its action? Far from being cowed by blocs, we cannot imagine anyone being cowed by anybody or anything. As we have known Wayne for la quarter of a century, that is not one of its weaknesses or faults.

Scarlet fever cases, usually in a mild form, are not so numerous in either Wayne or rural neighborhoods as imagination sometimes suspects. Mayor Ringer reports thirteen cases here, all strictly quarantined. Every precaution is employed to prevent spread of the disease. A trained nurse takes the temperature of each child at school every day, and if the slightest symptom of fever is discovered, whether due to approaching scarlet fever or to eating a cucumber pickle, the child is sent home immediately for observation. Under safeguards, with each family exercising reasonable care, there is really no occasion for alarm.

Governor Cochran suggests a change by which the attorney general and members of the railway commission would be appointed instead of elected. In the past there have been suggested movements to make all state officers below the governor subject to appointment. Thus, the ballot would be shortened and elections simplified. Modern youths who think they have no advantages, should read the story of Henry M. Stanley's boyhood days. Heihad no parent all support or guidance, and he was kicked along by a system in England where at the time little sympathy seemed to be felt for struggling young persons. After savage treatment in a workhouse, he made his escape. His reaf name was not Stanley, but when he turned up in New Orleans, he won the heart of a Mr. Stanley whose name he adopted. Finally, developing as a newspaper reporter against many and severe trials, he was employed to find David Livingstone, lost explorer in Africa. Stanley braved all kinds of hardships and perils, but he succeeded in locating Livingstone in a remote jungle settlement. Stanley's iron courage carried him through. Weak nerve would have failed. 
