



icouldn't have been at the Omiha Chamber of Commerce last Friday afternoon for the splendid meeting on this subject which was held there. First of all, listeners would have been heartened by Paul Stewart's assurance that Nebraska is in no danger of becoming a desert. His showing, by rainfall charts, that this section has gone through two and three-year drouths before, always to find them followed by 10, 15 or even 20 years of good crops, was reassuring and so was his prediction that farmers who do leave the state for fear of dryness here probably will return in a few years wiser but poor ier than they would be if they had stuck it put.

The healthy attitude from which both speakers, Stewart and Ivan Wodd, ap-proached their subject also was most com-mendable and refreshing in this day and age of high pressure propaganda. They mendable and refreshing in this day and age of high pressure propaganda. They explained frankly that they had nothing to sell. In all probability everyone there learned something new about the normal crop possibility of this section, as well as about the reasonable expectation for in-creased yields where water is available and is applied properly to land that is fertile enough to grow big crops where an abun-dance of moisture is supplied. The short discussion of geology in which it was shown that irrigation is much more feasible and practical where soils are underlain with thick gravel beds fairly close to the surface as they are in central and western Nebraska, than in the eastern end of the state where gravel deposits are

and western Nebraska, than in the eastern end of the state where gravel deposits are not so generous, was most illuminating. So was Mr. Wood's frank analysis of why sound, careful, well-planned methods suc-ceed while haphraard, slip-shod, half-hearted practices do not. All in all the meeting offered encour-agement from two angles. 

The Wayne county Farm Bureau office wishes to advise all hvestock feeders and feed dealers that this rate has been extended. on livestock feed se all

in January to start the program off. Wickard said the 1937 program is so devised that all farmers, no matter how small their farms may be, will have the opportunity to benefit by the plan. The 1937 goal is to achieve a better balance be-tween those crops that conserve the soil's fertility and those that deplete or eventually destroy it— a balance that will maintain and improve the nation's agricultural plant.

improve the nation's agricultural plant. Of particular interest to Wayne county was the fact that Wickard announced the farmers who will not have their usual acreages of soil conserving crops in the spring of 1937 because of the 1936 drouth will be permitted to substitute forage crops for the soil conserv-ing crops which they lost. The principal payments in 1937 will be made as this year, for re-placing crops which deplete the soil, with those that restore its fer-tility. The payments wilckard said, for this replacement will vary from the average of about \$8 per acre for Nebraska as soil produc-tivity varies throughout the state, counting the state of the state. vity varies throughout the state, ounties and on individual farms. The maximum acreage to which hese payments will apply will be 5 percent of the usual acreage of oil depleting crops.

Chances Are Good

For Oil And Gas Nebraska's chances for finding oil are improving, according to Kent Kimbell, consulting geologist, who writes an article on this sub-ject in the December Oil and Gas Journal, a copy of which Dr. T. T. Jones has. At present there is no com-mercial oil or gas production in Nebraska, says Mr. Kimball. The state has been tested in various places and these places proved dry but oil companies are still continu-ing operations. "Nebraska is not condemmed as an oil and gas pro-ducing state, nor is it proved." More than 1,000,000 scres in Ne-braska are now under lease and companies are confident that dis-coveries will develop.




