Schools of England Are Described By Wayne College Exchange Teacher

Speaking on English education, Miss Doris Palmer, exchange instructor at the Wayne State Teachers college from Leeds, England, who spoke at convocation Thursday, remarked that the English system had evolved very slowly and haphazardly. The chief function of education is to stress character rather than learning.

Games, according to the speaker, are very popular in England and are a means of training character. They develop self-control and are an intricate part of school life. To Miss Palmer, who is of English birth and received all of her education in England, it is hard to understand that athletics is compulsory in this country.

Many at the age of 10 start attending trade school, others attend high school or secondary schools. High school fees are paid by parents or are free. In most schools students are asked to buy their own books.
