

### Contour Farming Is Shown on Tour

Wayne County Represented In Trip To Farms In Cedar County.

A group of farmers from Dix n, Wayne and Dakota countle oured Cedar county Thurs toured Cedar county Thursday morning to visit farms practicing soil conservation. The tour was sponsored by the soil conservation service and agricultural extension service.

The first farm described to the soil conservation is the service and agricultural extension service.

The first farm visited was prac-ticing brush dams in gully con-trol with planting of trees to form cover for the gully and to make a permanent natural drainage

Contour farming on a 160-acre farm was the second place visited. Corn was listed on the contour with buffer strip of sweet clover to take up acreage patches and short rows. Fences were also put in on contour to provide permanent guide lines for contour farming operation.

Contouring with alternatin, small grain and basin listed corr was demonstrated on the thur farm. This farm, under the community of the control of the contr

was demonstrated on the third farm. This farm, under the complete contouring plan, has been very successful in holding the water which has fallen.

The last farm visited was using a system of terraces which is not practiced much by soil conservation service in this section of the country as the typography of the land and the type of soil do not lend themselves to it. The terraces on this farm, however, according to Walter L. Moller, county agent, are proving very satisfactory. The terrace outlet canal has been constructed and seeded to brome grass and clover.
