Eleven were killed and 30 injured in the accident. Wayne county Sunday school convention will be held June 24 at the Congregational church near Carroll. C. W. Miss Hattie Crockett, Miss Helen Felber and Leslie Rundell are officers of Wayne high school alumni association planning a banquet for July 8. The Grainland highway from Sioux City to Grand Island will be marked with orange and black. The highway goes through Wayne. Mrs. L. M. Owen is improving in a Sioux City hospital after an operation. Miss Wilma Garwood of Carroll, went to Boulder to school. Mrs. James Eddie of Carroll, is in Belden with her father who is seriously ill. Exterior of the Citizens State bank of Carroll will be covered with Kelastone. A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Jess Wittie of Winside, June 10, 1921. Walter Gaebler, Alex Gabler and Art Auker have been named on Winside board of health. Jake Walde of Winside, underwent an operation at Rochester. Mrs. A. B. Carhart underwent a minor operation in Sioux City. John T. Marriott of Wakefield, who returned from a Sioux City hospital is able to talk and walk again. Mrs. Johanna Ney, 96, died June 10, 1921. Mrs. Ira Lyman of Wakefield, died June 10, 1921, after the birth of triplets, two daughters and a

son, and the babies are doing nicely. Wakefield park has been increased by a gift of land from Philo Graves. A cabin and arch have been built. Miss Martha Paul and William Kai, Jr., of Wakefield, were married June 8, 1921. Miss Ruth Peterson and Roscoe Slippe of Wakefield, were married June 9, 1921. Miss Kate Vollers and F. H. Re-whike of Wakefield, were married June 8, 1921. From the Wayne Herald for June 17, 1897: The Hawaiian annexation treaty was signed. The little son of Ed. Owen was injured when a horse knocked him down and stepped on him. Census reports show farm workers averaging 66c a day. C. K. Rash was acquitted of murdering his wife and children. He was judged insane and was taken to the state hospital in Norfolk. From Ponca Journal for June 17, 1890: Wayne county reports a population of 682. Several bridges are out between here and Sioux City and roads are almost impassable. All crops look excellent but if the rain doesn't ease up soon the weeds will get the start of the corn. Hail resulted in \$10,000 loss in Sioux City.

Wayne, Nebraska, June 8, 1937. Board met as per adjournment. Present: Frank Erxleben, Commissioner and Chairman, M. I. Swihart, Commissioner, and Bertha Berres, Clerk. Absent: David Koch, Commissioner.

Minutes of meeting held May 25, 1937, read and approved. The funds of the county and its numerous sub-divisions of which the county through its county treasurer is custodian, are found to be deposited in the banks of the county at the close of business for May 1937, as follows: (This does not include the funds invested in liberty bonds, or the funds on hand in the office of the county treasurer.)

Warrant No. 139 dated March 2, 1937, drawn in favor of Bert Lawrence for \$8.50, on the General Road District No. 2, was cancelled. Report of James H. Pile, County Sheriff, showing amount of fees received by him for the quarter ending March 31, 1937, amounting to the sum of \$110.00, and the payment of the same into the County Treasury, was examined and on motion duly approved.

Resolution Approving Depository and Securities. It was moved and seconded that the following resolution be adopted: Resolved, that application for designation as County Depository by the United States National Bank, Omaha, Nebraska, and that the further deposit of the following securities aggregating in amount the sum of \$20,000.00 to-wit:

City of Lincoln, Nebraska, 20 at \$1,000 following and subsequent coupons attached 7-1-37, 5 percent series A Water Extension Bonds (Twenty Thousands Dollars) due 1-1-47 No. 306-25, with the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, Omaha, Nebraska, trustee, by said bank, as a pledge to secure deposits of the public moneys of this county in said bank to and the same hereby is approved as to said securities and the deposit thereof with said trustee, the terms of the escrow agreement are:

The above securities will be delivered only on the return of this receipt, with the release and instructions for delivery appearing on said joint Custody Receipt Number JO 3691, duly executed. The release and instructions by the public officer above named must be under his seal of office, and acknowledged by him.

The coupons attached to said securities, as the same mature, will be detached and handled for collection under the rules of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, and the proceeds thereof, when collected, will be credited to the account of the above bank from which said securities have been received, unless such bank requests the return of such coupons, in which event the same will be returned to it.

The Omaha Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, Omaha, Nebraska, will give to the property left in its custody the same care that it gives to its own property, but beyond that will not assume responsibility. It makes no representations as to the genuineness of the securities described in said receipt, or any other representations whatever with reference to the same.

Theft, burglary and hold-up insurance carried by the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, is in a limited amount, and covers money and negotiable and other securities owned by the bank in addition to securities held for safe-keeping.
