

Of Hartington Here... Fifty Years Ago Is Recalled... County Fair Season Open... State Corn Husking Contest... Improvements Commended... Too Much Restraint... Evil Of Too Much Money.

Editor F. D. Stone of the Hartington Herald refers to the time, over fifty years ago when that newspaper was founded by this county's father... We recall that assignment for the newspaper was dumped on the ground and a shanty built over and around it! This was soon followed by more substantial quarters. On our first visit to Hartington rain fell all day and we devoted most of the time to roller skating in a rink—a common form of diversion in the early days. We also recall that we were by contrast with others on the floor at the time a darning poor skater. We consoled ourselves, however, with the fact that in going more directions we got more kinds of exercise than the others.

Editor Stone writes in detail his experience in leaving Esteline, S. D., where he ran a leased newspaper for a few years, and where he gained his first knowledge in newspaper work, and in journeying to the promising field at Hartington where he bought the Herald. That happened thirty years ago. All the Stones in the family joined in the task of lifting the Herald out of the ordinary and putting it in high rank in rural equipment and service. It is a far cry from the Washington hand press at Esteline to the modern, motor-driven presses at Hartington. The Trojan spirit possessed by the Stones from the start has brought due reward.

The art of printing has developed wonderfully even in conservative country communities, and service has been made commensurate with modern demands. Readers would scornfully turn up their nasal appendages at rural newspaper production that was considered adequate a quarter of a century ago. Looking to the future, if the government doesn't try to manage and hamper the publishing business—a thought believed nesting in the New Deal mind—rural newspaper service as exemplified by the Stones and others will find many additional ways to improve and appeal to increasingly particular reader intelligence.

Stanton is First to Show. The county fair season is starting with the initial exhibition at Stanton, now in progress. Next week the Dixon county fair at Concord will occupy attention. Other fairs will come successively through September. County fairs of the state will have more and better farm products to offer than have been possible in recent years.

Wayne Had Last Contest. Soon plans will be made for the annual state corn husking contest early in November. It will be remembered that Wayne county captured the last such contest held in the state—the one in 1935—and it was hard in that year to find anywhere a field to answer requirements. Last year there was no corn, and therefore no contest. This year there will be many suitable fields, but Wayne county having been honored two years ago could not expect to be considered now. But a county contest to select a participant for the state would be in order.

Pleased Over Progress. Former residents coming back to Wayne to visit or to look after business are pleased to note improvements that have been made here. A college town in a rich farm area inspires confidence in the future. Investment is encouraged by a feeling of permanence and security.

Amish Settlers. A story relating the strict rules governing the lives of the long-haired and long-whiskered Amish settlers of Pennsylvania emphasizes extremes of self-restraint that do no good and often much harm. They evidently have the old Puritans pushed far into the background in the matter of expelling joy and perpetuating gloom. Those reared in this stranger environment are careful to dress in a fashion that will not please the eye. They shun picture shows and all other amusements. They have no radios. Automobiles are not allowed to supplant the primal horse. They do not believe in higher education because their children might be taught to bring twentieth century enlightenment into conflict with seventeenth century notions. Ignorance is the way to hold the Amish people together, and 500 years behind the times. They justify themselves by the scriptures which they swallow literally.

Spotted Children. "Captains Courageous" at the local theatre the first of the week, showed the task involved in reclaiming a spoiled boy. One over-indulged in things money could buy, but neglected in the great essentials of home love. His great heart sinks when a child is made unhappy by an excess of material gifts. How one is thrilled by the gratitude of seemingly less fortunate.

DECISION GIVEN IN TRAIN CASE

Application Of Company Is Granted Partially On Omaha-Norfolk Line.

The Nebraska State Railway Commission, in a decision rendered Tuesday at Lincoln, granted the C.S.T.P.M.&O. railroad company permission to discontinue the train from Emerson to Norfolk and return, and denied permission to discontinue the train between Omaha and Emerson and return. The commission further ordered that the application to discontinue the Omaha-Norfolk train be granted in its entirety on condition that the applicant operate its Omaha-Sioux City train on the west side of the river and change time of trains from Omaha and Minneapolis to make connections at Emerson with trains going up the Crofton and Bloomfield branches.

The decision, H. E. Siman points out, assures Wayne of the same service from Omaha and Sioux City. If the train is discontinued, other service will be provided from Omaha to Emerson. The Crofton and Bloomfield trains will then provide the regular service from Emerson to Wayne. The only possible loss will be the morning train from Wayne to Norfolk and return in the afternoon. It is believed the rearrangement required.

To Readvertise For Road Oiling

Contracts For Graveling Are Let On Projects In Wayne County.

The state board, at a meeting in Lincoln the last of the week, decided to readvertise for bids on stabilizing base and oiling 8 miles of the new highway south of Wayne. Bids on this and Hay Springs-Ridgeway job were "too high," the board stated. The project is the north sector of the road from Wayne south to No. 8.

J. N. Emung of Wayne, was awarded the contract for graveling 17.7 miles between Wayne and Laurel, between Laurel and Concord, and from Dixon north. The bid is \$3,793.

Regraveling between Pierce and Wayne, also north and south of Carroll will be done by the Plainview Gravel company for \$6,346. This covers 24.3 miles.

Seeding of the roadside between Norfolk and Wisner will be done by A. L. Cook for \$1,509.

Mrs. Swinney died in 1917 and deceased had since spent his time with his children. He was in Wayne part of each year and left last August for Glenwood.

BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH IS AIM

Organize In Educational Program For Improving Care Of Teeth.

An educational program which is designed to improve public health was inaugurated Tuesday evening when representatives of various groups met at the Peoples Gas office. Health of the mouth and teeth is the first objective, and it is hoped eventually to improve the general health of the community.

Dr. J. T. Thompson of Lincoln, director of dental hygiene in the division of maternal and child health, explained the objects of an educational health program and cited examples of what has been accomplished by similar programs in other places through cooperation of federal and state departments with local groups.

"A serious condition exists in the mouths of children. Nine out of 10 children in grades need dental treatment," stated Dr. Thompson. "Dental decay is preventable in most children. While preventive dentistry in schools is valuable, the program should be broader. It should include the expectant mother and the pre-school child. Proper nutrition, oral hygiene and regular visits to the dentist are the three ways to assure results," Dr. Thompson added.

Many examinations have shown that perfect mouths are found only in children whose mothers have had proper food and intelligent care. Feeding and care of teeth (Continued on page 5.)

Drivers Will Get New Permits Soon

All Car Operators Must Obtain Licenses By State Ruling.

Automobile drivers will be required to secure new licenses after September 1. Examinations will be given under the direction of the Nebraska Safety council, and each applicant will appear with his own vehicle or one which he has permission to drive. Licenses previous to that date will be required to renew these. They shall submit to a visual test and pay five providing they can produce their old permit. If they do not have their old permit they will take visual test, written test on vehicle laws and driving test of one mile. They will pay \$1 fee. Persons who are getting licenses for the first time must be 16 years of age and must take examinations and driving test before November 30. It is unlawful to drive a car without license.

Children Of Five May Enter School

Registration Is Set For The Opening Day At Wayne High This Fall.

Children who will be 5 years of age by January 1 or before will be admitted to Wayne city school kindergarten, according to Supt. E. W. Smith. If a child is slightly younger and wishes to enter, tests will be given to determine whether or not he shall be enrolled. Wayne school opens September 6 with registration that day. Supt. Smith expects the usual enrollment. Regular classwork starts Tuesday. The school library has been centralized in the high school assembly for greater convenience.

CUT TAX LEVY IN THIS COUNTY

Amounts In Various Towns Are Approved By Board Here Tuesday.

Wayne county board, at a meeting Tuesday, fixed the county tax levy for 1937 at 3.56 mills, a reduction of .28 over last year. The 1937 levy is as follows: Unemployment relief, .25; general fund, 1.75; bridge fund, .60; general road fund, .80; mothers' pension fund, .01; soldiers' relief fund, .07; Wayne county fair, .08. The 1936 levy of 3.84 mills included the following: Unemployment relief, .50; general fund, 1.94; bridge fund, .58; general fund, .60; mothers' pension fund, .05; soldiers' relief, .07; county fair, .08; and hospital insane fund, .02. The 1937 levy is based on a valuation of \$24,670,385. The 1936 valuation was \$25,630,629.

The state levy this year is 2.64 mills, and the state assessment last year was 1.76 mills.

Free high school tuition levy is fixed at 1 mill, based on valuation of \$20,802,450. Last year this was 1.20 mills on valuation of \$21,724,127.

Old age pension tax of \$2 per person is raised this year, the same as last year.

The city of Wayne levy, based on valuation of \$1,734,615, is 28.79 this year, the same as last year. (Continued on page 5.)

of children is important from neighborhood on. More preventive work can be done before the child is 5 years old than in all the rest of his life for a child makes the greatest physical and mental growth of his life when his baby teeth are prepared to food. Care of these baby teeth is therefore essential to later mind and body health.

Dr. Thompson told of his health program which has been conducted in Atlanta, Ga., for 10 years. When this work started, 86 percent of the children needed dental care and the percentage is now 22. Besides the help to the children themselves, the Atlanta school board estimate the program has saved the city \$150,000 in school costs because children have attended better and have been promoted more regularly because of better health. Attendance has increased 5,000 or 10 percent. The children themselves have accomplished more in their studies, and their personalities have been improved.

Iowa has had a school health program four years and is now extending this to include the mothers and pre-school children. Dr. Thompson explained. The program is well started in Nebraska. An examination of 28,000 children shows that 90.4 percent need dental attention. They should learn the foods that build strong teeth for teeth. Children should cultivate the habit of visiting the dentist regularly to have their teeth checked for a tooth is nearly gone when a cavity becomes large enough to see.

Dr. L. B. Young spoke briefly of the plan to promote the health program which was started last spring with public educational meetings.

Mrs. Otto Victor, who presided,

explained that the Mothers' Study club and Better Mothers' club are cooperating in the health movement which is sponsored by the state health department and aims to help rural and city children. Dr. Thompson offered to attend the Wayne fair and show free pictures on health. The films will also be shown in school at that time.

man lines will probably lead the company to continue the service as it is at present.

The application, heard by the railway commission in Wayne June 23, sought to discontinue one train from Omaha to Norfolk, the one arriving in Wayne from the west at 10:45 and a Wayne from the west at 5:05. Objections were filed by many groups and individuals, and the case was taken under advisement.

For more than 40 years the applicant has operated a morning passenger mail and express train out of Omaha to connect with trains serving lines to Norfolk, Clinton and Bloomfield. By discontinuing the train the company prepared to handle business on the Omaha-Minneapolis run to Emerson, arriving there at 9:25 p. m. Passenger mail and express would lay over at Emerson until 10 in the following morning, resulting in a loss of 12 hours in service from Omaha to the two towns.

If the petition on the lines are to be reduced to one train each way a day, the commission rules that the remaining trains shall be required to change schedule to render best service. The commission also the opinion that by changing a train from the Iowa to Nebraska side of the river between Omaha and Sioux City and by rearranging the branch schedule to conform, the service from the east can be maintained. The only possible loss is between Wayne and Norfolk.

The railway commission includes F. L. Bollen, F. A. Good and W. M. Maupin.

ly founded Kingfisher college. Dr. House taught English and supervised the pioneer college, while Mrs. House instructed in piano and managed the dormitory. When the state bought the Wayne school, Dr. House came here as head of the English department. This was the family home until the fall of 1925 when Dr. House went to Montgomery, W. Va., to head the English department of New River State college. While there Dr. House also established and edited the magazine, Modern Literature.

In the fall of 1931 Dr. and Mrs. House traveled abroad, spending most of their time in countries bordering the Mediterranean. After their return they went to New York to spend the holidays with their daughter and family. They were pleased to attend December 26, the opening performance of the musical comedy, "Of Thee I Sing," written by their son-in-law, Morris Ryskind. Mrs. House died there at the home of her daughter December 28, 1931, and was taken to Montgomery for funeral rites and burial.

Dr. House and Mrs. Lucy Sprague, teacher in Crete, were married in New York in October, 1933, and they sailed November 11 to spend a few months abroad, making their headquarters in Greece where Dr. House studied early writers and their literature. Recently Dr. House had been doing extension work for New River college at Montgomery and he was writing a book of his personal history. His wife was writing one on her European travels.

Dr. House was a close friend of Dr. John G. Neuhard and it was through the former's efforts that Dr. Neuhard was named by the legislature as Nebraska poet laureate.

Surviving Dr. House are his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Mary Ryskind, son-in-law, Morris Ryskind, one granddaughter and one grandson. He has two brothers in the east.

In Eureka Springs, Ark., the group was impressed by the oddity of the city streets. The town is very hilly and streets wind in hairpin fashion. Many houses open onto two streets. Roads are worse than in the mountains.

Tobacco is one of the most profitable crops in the state of Missouri. The tobacco plant is first started in a hot bed or frame and when it reaches a certain stage is transplanted into the fields. It grows into big leaves which are picked when they are ripened and then sold to factories.

The Ozark people, particularly those living back in the hills, are very backward and shiftless. Homes are very crude and the mannerisms of the folk are peculiar to an outsider. In Blue Eye, Ark., the travelers saw two couples of approximately 60 years of age who climbed into an old buggy, the seat and the other two standing on the back. This was truly an unusual picture to those who are accustomed to the "horseless carriages." In spite of these oddities the Ozark region is very pretty and seems covered with a blue haze. All kinds of pottery and baskets are seen for sale along the highway. These are hand made by the Ozark people.

In Booneville, Mo., the group were impressed by the oldest theatre west of the Allegheny mountains which is located there. The building is typical of old buildings with its second floor balcony, high pillars and flower beds planted in front of it. At the present time motion pictures are being shown here but it is planned to make the building over into a museum. A monument in front of the building was erected to mark the spot where the Union soldiers had their defense work thrown up when the Confederates captured the city.
