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London Letter

By ALFRED LARSON, LONDON, ENGLAND.

October 25

A friend has suggested that I write something about British foreign policy. Although I am convinced that two London newspapers cover the field of international relations with rare completeness and impartiality, I feel that a letter of this kind, since it cannot be very timely, is not a good medium for discussing world politics. I should prefer to restrict my attention to subjects that are not discussed in a large number of American newspapers and magazines. Since the subject has been broached, however, it may be not amiss to review briefly in this one letter some of the permanent phases of British foreign policy, which usually can be depended upon to influence the government's day-to-day policy.

Most obvious perhaps is Britain's desire to continue friendly relations with the dominions. She cannot favor the return of South West Africa to Germany because South Africa would object. She cannot go far in a trade treaty with the United States because she cannot absorb more American products without cutting down on Imperial products. She cannot show much friendliness to Japan because many Australians hate and fear the Japs.

Another policy is centricity old—maintenance of the independence of the Low countries. Britain is always much concerned about their fate because they are virtually next door, too close for comfort if an unfriendly power controlled them. Almost a century ago Britain was instrumental in securing an international agreement to respect the neutrality of Belgium. A recent German declaration leaves Britain to believe that the powers will continue to recognize that neutrality.

A third policy of permanent validity is the maintenance of communications with India and the Far East through the Mediterranean. Britain is probably

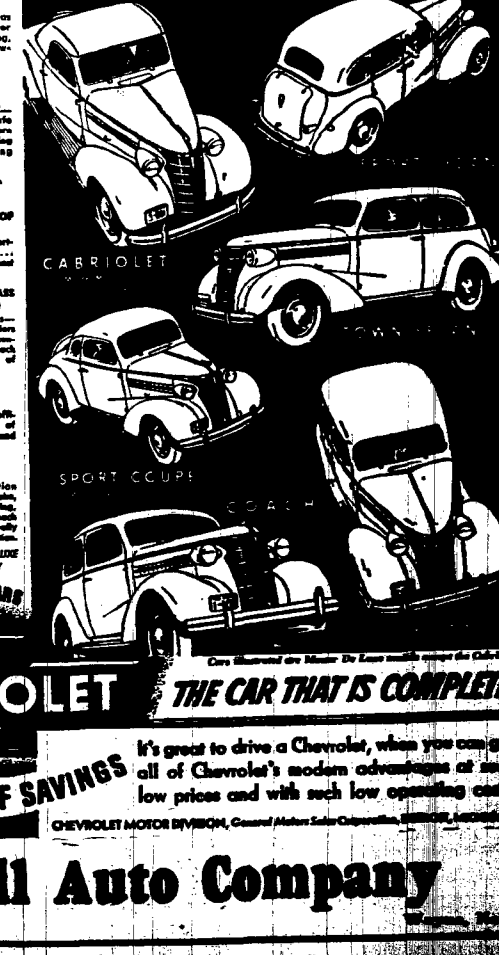

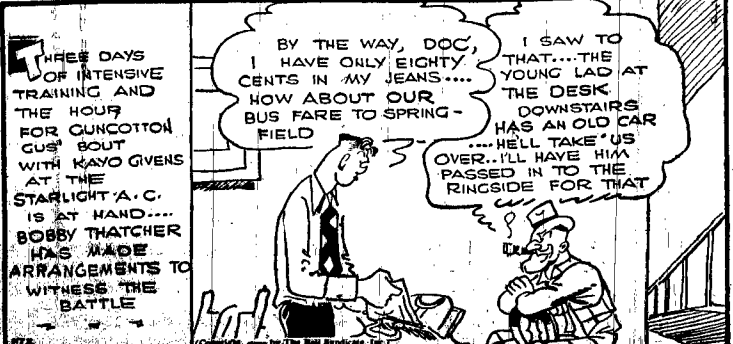
