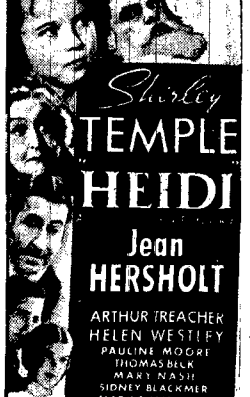

At Christmas the group was taken on a trip to Germany and entered the festivities with the German people. Easter was celebrated in the southern part of the continent, southern France and Paris.

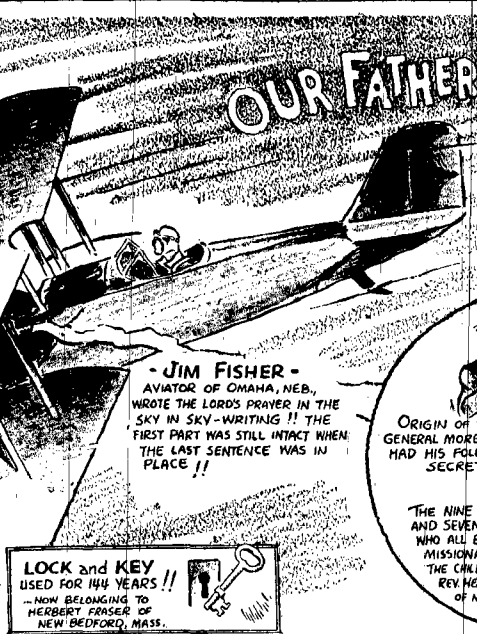
