

Follows on Mid-Western Farms — Disappointing Answers — Agriculture Germany — Fifty Ago — Abuse of Payment Plan.

The honesty and sympathetic fellowship of the average mid-western farmer are often in evidence. In handling obligations, the rule of straightforwardness, inherent in first settlers, is made outstanding by notably few exceptions. Where there is material gain outweighs every other consideration—where envy is inflamed and pride is dwarfed—the rule is probably reversed, and only exceptions reveal finely spun principles. And the friendliness survives in unsolicited acts of generosity. The farmer and his wife do not just talk over the hills, suffered on a neighboring section. They bundle up and pile into their car and go over to see what can be done to help. They may not agree on politics or religion, but they do agree on interpretation of the Golden Rule, and they come nearer putting it into practice than any other group in the world.

In Street Broadcast. Answers to a question in Omaha's street broadcast recently were disturbing. The question—what is most desired, brains, money or beauty? With few exceptions respondents declared for money. Perhaps the prompting thought was that money could buy everything including intelligence. The record will undoubtedly show that highest qualities of mind are not essential in the accumulation of worldly riches. The faculty to make money does not necessarily belong to profound thinking or to creative genius. Money-making entails sound judgment and mastery of details. It is like a big game which monopolizes smartness along one line and does not fool around trying to figure out social or metaphysical problems.

Among liberal contributors to society who enjoyed life with comparatively small material wealth may be mentioned Edison, inventors and Emerson, author. In amassing a great fortune, Henry Ford seems to have the unusual faculty to lean far enough away from one central idea to develop a wholesome and helpful philosophy. But as a rule concentration on making money takes possession of all working brain cells and leaves room for little else. As to the answers to the question propounded at Omaha, it should be remembered that brains cannot be taken away by a drop in the stock market or by any other calamity.

Speaking of Henry Ford, he is rising to the stature of a real hero in the industrial world by his resistance to CIO demands. Attempts to shackle his initiative and run his business have so far failed, and Americans who prize their independence, are in agreement with his indomitable spirit. Ford is not charged with lack of fair and generous treatment of employees. His wage scale is at the top. What is demanded is control of his business. That is what he resists—resists with an iron will that is refreshing to contemplate.

But Ford's enemies have not kept him from studying conditions with reference to the future. He expresses conviction that increased production in factories and on farms is needed to supply normal requirements and promote prosperity. He has figured out from laboratory experiments that greater practical use may be found for farm products and that developing demands in that way may stimulate and stabilize farm prosperity. That he is in exception to the rule of persons riveted to the one idea of piling fortune upon fortune is shown by his taking time from the accustomed grind and speculating on possible benefits not alone to his thousands of employees, but to the entire country.

Compulsory Control. An example of arbitrarily controlled farming—the farmer answerable to the government for everything he produces and sells—is reported in Germany under the Nazi dictatorship. In a recent magazine article, George Kent explains that a German farmer may own his farm, but Berlin headquarters direct what and how much he shall plant. A Nazi officer supervises farming and fixes prices on animals and other things. A farmer has no say in handling his acres, and if he violates Nazi rules he is subject to a severe penalty. That is regimentation, and that is the kind of experience American agriculture wants to escape. An understanding of what is going on under foreign dictatorships is enough to persuade American farmers to oppose any compulsory farm plan here.

Nebraska Budget Law Increases Estimates

Balances in Funds Will Be Considered When Tax Levy Is Made.

Because of Nebraska's new budget law, Wayne county board, at its annual meeting Tuesday, was obliged to increase estimates for the year though expenses are not expected to exceed those of 1937. This year's estimate is \$159,500, as compared to last year's \$133,000.

The new law does not permit spending any more than the estimate in any department. Some funds have balances which will be taken into consideration when the levy is made. This applies mainly to the road fund which is estimated at \$50,000 this year as compared to \$25,000 last year, and in the relief fund which is \$18,000 this year as compared to \$12,000 last year. The relief fund is also affected by the fact that all direct state relief has been discontinued.

The estimate for 1938 follows: General fund, \$60,000; bridge fund, \$25,000; road fund, \$50,000; mothers' pension, \$2,000; soldiers' relief, \$2,000; county fair, \$2,500; unemployment relief, \$18,000. The 1937 estimates were: General fund, \$60,000; bridge fund, \$25,000; road, \$25,000; mothers' pension, \$2,000; soldiers' relief, \$2,000; fair, \$2,500; unemployment relief, \$12,000; blind, \$500; and insane hospital, \$4,000.

Fix Road Wages. Wages for road work were fixed the same as last year by the county board. These follow: Road dragging, 50c per mile; man and team, 40c per hour; man and two teams, 55c per hour; single man, 30c per hour.

A. L. Swan was appointed a member of the soldiers' relief commission for three years. Dr. C. T. Ingham is county physician. He, Sheriff J. H. Pile and Miss Pearl Sewell comprise the board of health. O. B. Nelson was re-named court house janitor at \$65 per month. The board allowed for extra help for the year: \$1,200 in county clerk's office; \$1,000 in treasurer's office; \$1,000 in judge's office; \$400 in county attorney's office; \$200 in assessor's office; \$720 in district clerk's office; \$100 in county superintendent's office and also \$250 for institute.

The four county papers were designated official. Wayne Herald and Winside Tribune will print the 1938 primary sample ballot, and the Democrat and Carroll News will print the election sample ballot. The Herald will be official paper for state road notices; office supplies will be bought on the open market; and the News prints blanks and stationery.

Officers Elected. Frank Erxleben was reelected chairman of the county board. Other members are Dave Koch and M. I. Swihart. Miss Bertha Berres is clerk.

BUREAU ACTIVITY VALUABLE AS KEPT FREE FROM FORCE

WE think the county farm bureau is valuable in sponsoring 4-H club activities and otherwise devoting itself to efforts to improve farm methods. Farmers would seem warranted in lending cooperation to all useful programs that do not involve compulsory compliance with the proposed federal farm bill now on the way through congress. Manifestly, great good may be done in different ways by county bureaus. As to falling for a compulsory farm plan, a majority will balk if the recent vote on such a proposition in Cass county may be accepted as an index of the general feeling. At the Weeping Water meeting 242 farmers voted against compulsion which they called regimentation, and 42 voted for it. But farmers should unite on gathering benefits from bureau activities without subscribing to restrictions that would mean forfeiture of prized liberties.

Miss Ruhlow was seated between the two young men and was knocked unconscious. She did not regain consciousness until after reaching the hospital. K. M. McKenzie of Norfolk, who was traveling a short distance from the Bowers automobile helped pull Miss Ruhlow in the car of a passing motorist, who took her to the hospital.

Burial followed in Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Echtenkamp enjoyed fair health with the exception of occasional attacks. Four weeks ago a recurrence of the ailment necessitated surgical work and he was taken to Sioux City where he underwent a major operation. Complications set in and in spite of the best medical care the malady could not be checked.

Frederick Herman Echtenkamp was born in Quincy, Ill., March 3, 1866. He was one of 14 children. Shortly after his birth he was baptized in the Lutheran faith by Rev. Kuhlenvetter of Adams county, Ill. When he was 2 years old the family came by wagon and train to Arlington, Neb. There deceased was confirmed in St. Paul's Lutheran church by Rev. Hilgendorf in 1881.

Mr. Echtenkamp married Miss Emma Schmidt March 3, 1892, the birthday of deceased. Five children were born to this union. For eight years after their marriage the Echtenkamps lived on a farm in the vicinity of Arlington. In 1900 they came to Dixon county, to a farm northeast of Wayne, and Mr. Echtenkamp engaged in farming until 1925 when they moved into Wayne, their home since.

It is planned to begin the building in early spring so that it can be used for housing students next fall. The building committee are: Wayne, John Rohn, chairman, Dr. Anderson and Fred Anderson, comptroller; Kearney, Mrs. Ryan, chairman, Fred Anderson and President H. L. Cushing; Chadron, E. D. Crites, chairman, Fred Anderson and President Robert I. Elliot.

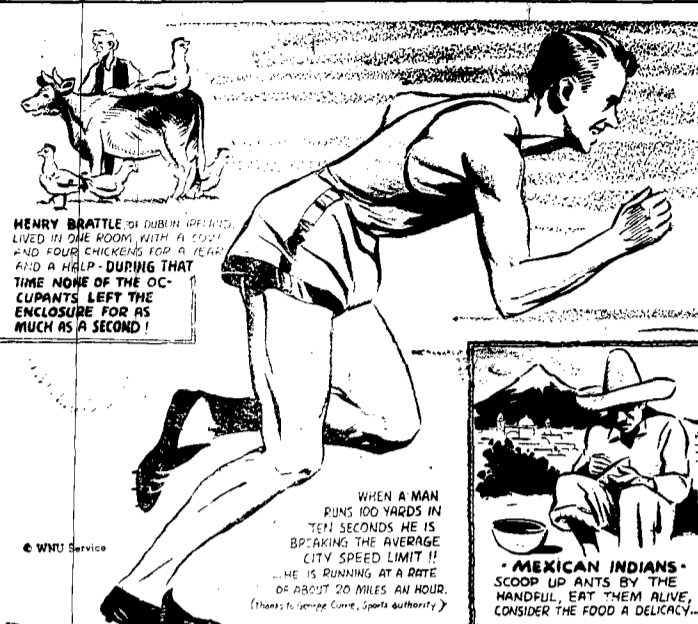

As set forth in the farm bureau constitution the object of the bureau shall be community cooperation for the purpose of systematizing methods of production and distribution, assisting and encouraging cooperative organization for the economic marketing of farm products; rendering assistance to farmers in securing good seed, fertilizers, livestock, credit facilities and farm labor; eliminating farm waste such as losses caused by plant and animal disease, insect pests and uneconomic systems of marketing; increasing efficiency in the production of crops common to the locality; demonstrating most approved methods of soil conservation; conducting demonstrations illustrating good agricultural and housekeeping practices; maintaining the health of home and community; assisting farm women through organized club work in solving farm home-maker's problems; assisting the boys and girls through organized 4-H club work to an understanding of better rural life and living; in general, working for the permanent betterment of rural life through study of the problems of the men, the women and the boys and girls, and cooperating with the Nebraska college of agriculture and the United States department of agriculture extension work through the employment of county extension agents in carrying out the objects enumerated.
