



The government structure can survive all kinds of business wreckage. If confidence in business were properly restored, less spare money would go into bonds and more would find its way into developing and eemploying investments. More cash would seek rewards in business, industry, agri-culture and other individually directed channels.

Editor Howard grabs a frail reed on which to lean while pouring paens of praise on the administration's policy which diverts capital from usual arteries into government bonds—from contructive ac-tivity into quiescent security. His faith is beautifully expressed and is doubtless deeply felt, but it is unhappily void of rea-son.

The president is too willing to take over the functions of other branches of government, and the house will prove a real friend in need if it balks against the tracexecutive encroachment.

THE DIFFERENCE. Dr. Chas. Beard distinguishes between education on the one hand and ballyhoo and propa-ganda on the other. He states that propaganda in the broad-est sense is the technique of in-fluencing human action by the manipulation of representations, and by misrepresentation itself. He says further: "To be sure, education can not be entirely divorced from immediate ends and objectives. Yet there is a center of gravity in education and objectives. Yet there is a center of gravity in education which is not the center of gravity in propaganda. The spirit of education differs from spirit of education differs from that of propaganda. In some re-spects, as in other matters, it is a question of emphasis, but the emphasis is fundamental. The propagandist deliberately vietuses to present with all the fairness that human fallibility will permit the other positions or points of view which enter into competition with his own win permit the other positions or points of view which enter into competition with his own. He places the interest of his group above all other interests. His temper is dogmatic, not in-quiring or reasons. He puts forward opinions as established facis and closes his mind to new truths incompatible with his ends. If education could per-chance endorse any of his de-signs, it could not proceed in his spirit or follow his methods without violating its trust. By its inescapable obligations, it has other functions to dis-change."






