Feeble Editor Edgar Howard of the Columbus Telegram, points out Reason with gusto, common to purlind New Deal enthusiasts, the increased purchase of government bonds by Nebraskans as a personal tribute to the wise leadership of President Roosevelt.

With everything dependent on the soundness of the government, and with usual investments made more uncertain by fantastic and obstructive legislation, it is no surprise and no compliment to the times, as Editor Howard wishes to believe, when individuals bury their surplus cash in government bonds even at a low interest rate.

Editor Howard grabs a frail reed on which to lean while pouring paens of praise on the administration's policy which diverts capital from usual arteries into government bonds—from constructive activity into quiescent security.

Passes THE president's reorganization bill survived in the senate by a vote of 42 to 49. It was hurried through in the face of a flood of protesting telegrams. It is designed, as explained by Amos Pinchot, New York attorney, to shift more power from congress to the president.

New Service THE Wisner board of education is submitting to a referendum a proposition to vote bonds of \$5,000 to put up a building to accommodate a course in vocational agriculture.

Wayne does not have to vote bonds to add vocational agriculture. The extra cost to a taxpayer for the improvement is infinitesimal. Advantages to the school and indirectly to Wayne in adopting the proposed course, are many and substantial.

Congressman Coffee is regarded in New Deal circles with a sort of pity because he has not trailed along with tife president on public policies, whereas the record is clear that the congressman has been steadfast in upholding party prin-

cles. It is the president who has not been consistent. Coffee would have to be a creature of unthinking and amazing adaptability to keep up with the executive's wild excursions away from the original platform to which all democratic candidates pledged faithful obedience. It is not Coffee, but the president who has got off the regular track.

Congratulations to Franklin Simonin, Wayne student, who won first place in the state oratorical contest. Franklin is also a musician of high rank. With wise direction, there would seem no limit to his possibilities. We would advise him to be just a common fellow, not elated by the glamour of immediate success, but buoyed to attain higher and higher goals.

The latest survey made by the American Institute of Public Opinion which still holds its reputation for accuracy, shows the president has slipped in popular favor from 65.5 per cent a year ago to 58.5 per cent today. If his standing moves steadily in the same direction until the autumn election, he will not have enough rubber stamps left in congress to insure clear sailing for future "must" bills.

Soon the miracle of vernal growth will redeck the trees and transform the countryside into refreshing green. It is time for the customary crop of little, squealing pigs, and for the dairy cow to appear in triumph over an angular descendant wobbling along by its side.

In dictator countries where the flimsiest excuse may be trumped up to get rid of anyone who happens to disagree or be in the way, many of the brightest minds are being destroyed. This process of ruthless elimination will impoverish intelligence and count heavily against finest achievements.

The Detroit, published by the board of commerce of Detroit, Mich, made some impressive comparison in its issue of February 26. It showed that a better Packard car can be bought now for \$1,075 than sold in 1910 for \$5,550.

The Hitler plebiscite called for April 10, is more of a farce than a municipal election with only one set of candidates. Great preparations are being made for the plebiscite and great cost will be involved, but no one who values his life will dare fail to vote or to cast a dissenting ballot.

Perhaps influenced by human disorders in parts of the earth, our sun—the one we use every day and the only one we know—has been engaged in a big disturbance. Recently a huge solar explosion set afloat a cloud 167 thousand miles long and 85 thousand miles wide.

Senator Norris is quoted as saying there is more reason for war now than there was twenty years ago when an endeavor was made to settle everything in favor of democracy. Wayne Office Ranks High In Sale Of Bonds

Wayne post office ranks tenth in the state of Nebraska on the sale of United States savings bonds in second class post office. Rank is made per capita sale. The total amount of post office sales were \$61,387.50 and mail orders were \$2,400.00, making the total for Wayne, \$63,787.50.

Seward ranked first with a total of \$192,362.50; Ainsworth, second with \$49,875.00; O'Neill, third, \$71,475.00; Madison, fourth, \$60,000.00. Towns surrounding Wayne ranked as follows: Hartington, 30; West Point, 38; Oakland, 38; Albion, 55; and Fullerton, 27.

The total maturity value of United States Savings Bonds sold through the close of business March 7, 1938, amounted to \$1,584,462.875. This total was purchased by more than 1,260,000 investors and represents an average sale for each business day since March 1, 1935, when the bonds were first sold, of \$1,720,375.

A record for one day's sale of bonds was set January 10 this year, when \$10,029,775, maturity value, was reported sold on this single day. The sale of bonds for the calendar year 1937 was 34.2 percent greater than for 1936, and the year 1936 exceeded ten months in 1935 by 82.6 percent. The total maturity value sale for the calendar year 1937 amounted to \$633,419,175 with approximately 600,000 purchasers and an average sale for each business day of \$2,090,200.

Almost 16,000 post offices throughout the country are authorized to sell the bonds. To date the government actually retains more than 92 percent of all the money invested in the bonds, less than eight percent having been redeemed.

The \$100 bond unit is the most popular denomination and has accounted for 30.8 percent of the number of bonds sold.

Cities of 100,000 and over account for 44.62 percent of the sale, cities of 25,000 to 100,000, 13.92 percent, 10,000 to 25,000, 10.20 percent, 5,000 to 10,000, 7.68 percent, the remaining 23.58 percent going to the villages and rural America.

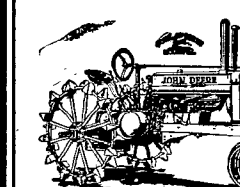

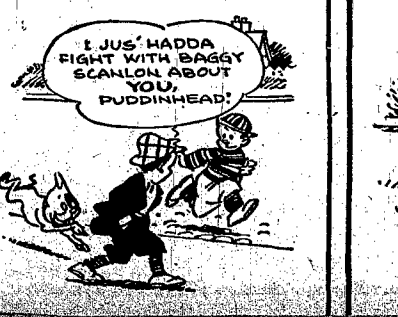
