

Well Known Hospitality Is Source Of Strength - When Small Towns Had Too Many Banks and Newspapers - Anxiety Over Holding Trade - Nebraska's White Spot In Business.

A report that delegates to a convention in another part of the state were "soaked" by high food prices, reminds us that we have never heard of Wayne's eating places taking advantage of visitors. On the contrary, we have found a positive disposition among cafes and hotels here to give guests the best at lowest prices.

Wayne has earned a reputation for cordial hospitality, and people who have come here to attend public meetings, have been uniformly commensurate. They like the personal interest manifested. They readily sense an attitude of helpfulness rather than one of avarice and cold unconcern.

In the Old Days. Time was when Wayne had four banks. We recall towns half the size of Wayne that had three banks. They were not required to meet popular demand, but were usually the products of groups that attended the same church and had a little surplus cash to put into something.

Reducing the number of newspapers has also improved civilization in small communities. Too many struggling newspapers, started on shoestrings and designed to serve conflicting but unimportant ideas, kept a community in a fever of rival hates.

Pluck and Courage Needed. Economists express a good deal of anxiety over the fate of the small town, due to the increased accessibility of metropolitan cities. They wonder how the small center can be kept from fading out.

It is something new and worthy of special note to find Nebraska one of the brightest spots on the American business map. But that is the truth, according to a chart prepared by Duane Bradstreet and published in the current edition of Time magazine.

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Will Resume Work In May On Project Started Here Last Fall.

Stabilized soil base, prime coat and armor coat will be contracted by the state board at Lincoln May 5 for the new road from Wayne south to highway No. 8 pavement east of Pilger. Bids are asked on six miles of oil and eight miles of bituminous surface treatment.

Last fall the board contracted for bituminous surface treatment for the first six miles south of Wayne and three miles were completed then. The contractor, Widner & King, plans to resume work on that project May 15 to complete the first coat on the second three miles south.

One of the lettings May 5 will include finishing oil coat for the first six miles south. The other contract to be let May 5 calls for bituminous surface treatment for the south eight miles of the road. Later the final coat for that sector will be contracted.

Timely DEFEAT of the president's organization bill in the house had a favorable influence on the stock market. It encouraged the belief that healthier and wiser policies would rule, that the executive would be compelled to heed sound party heads more and chimerical experimenters less.

The president's proposal to ladle out additional billions from the federal treasury to prime the economic pump is meeting stiff opposition as the wrong way to restore prosperity. Senator Byrd of Virginia has issued a warning that renewal of wild spending would hurt rather than help business.

The president says he does not want to be a dictator, and granting he does not, the laws he has proposed would make him one. He tries to appear conciliatory in the presence of frustration, though he does not let up in demanding his own way.

The president should reread the economics of the budding geniuses who have been feeding him fantastic notions from the start, and see if he cannot find the reason for fear and lack of sustained recovery. By turning to seasoned statesmen for counsel, he would be led to cure causes of the country's disease rather than to try to modify results by using artificial and temporary means.

Patterson MRS. ELEANOR Patterson, publisher of the Washington Herald, received a great deal of deserved credit for telling President Roosevelt in an open letter what ails the country.

But the chief thing is to eliminate fear and thus restore confidence. You alone can do that. But you must do it thoroughly, forsaking hate and vanity, and resuming that patience with which you so nobly and courageously conquered an illness that would have broken the spirit of most of us.

led Nebraska's administrator to issue a command that no WPA subject could so testify without first getting permission from Chief Harry L. Hopkins in Washington. This unusual defiance of a state court, prompted District Judge Fitzgerald to rule that any WPA worker who refused to testify would be summarily cast into jail. In a justly critical attitude, the World-Herald, referring to the WPA, asks: "Does it claim its members are endowed with immunities denied other citizens?"

The more business is oppressed, the more unemployment exists, and the more need for government relief. More the relief, the higher is business taxed and the less is it able to absorb the idle. Restoring confidence of business and industry and freeing them from unnecessary burdens would seem the way to start factory wheels and get men back to work. Then buying would be stimulated and production would be rewarded. Then prosperity would return and government relief would end.

If the spirit of Easter could inspire men and nations to be more reasonable in dealing with one another, its results would be wonderfully enlarged. The story of the resurrection is utterly in conflict with the cold materialism that has tended to crush spiritual values, especially in the old world. Easter revival of religious thought should and will help safeguard the world's most important force. More practical religion is a pressing need of the time everywhere.

The house interstate commerce committee killed a senate bill to limit the length of freight trains to seventy cars. It is estimated the proposed law, would, if adopted and put into effect, cost the railroads \$125,000,000. It seems railroad labor had been lobbying for the bill, and while trying to squeeze more out of the railroads, we witness efforts to persuade the government to supply needed financial help for the roads.

A bill up for consideration in the senate proposes to keep government workers from taking part in political conventions. If it could prevent all on government relief from voting in elections and helping shape public policies, there would be less danger of control based on distribution of favors. The bill is sharply opposed by administration leaders, and therefore it is probably sound and should pass.

The report from Berlin that foreign journalists are to be expelled from Germany because Hitler doesn't want them to lie about annexation of Austria and other doings over here may be accepted as a camouflage of the real reason. Hitler is not afraid newspaper correspondents will lie. He is afraid they will tell too much truth.

The progress of a community depends largely on daring youths who possess plenty of fire and force. They must make mistakes to make headway. Oldsters who are conservative, are essential as steadying ballast if they are not in the majority and thus are not allowed to block every forward step with "No, it's too expensive."

Mark Sullivan, columnist, thinks the American democracy can be saved from fascism by the president reversing his course, or by congress dealing out defeat to Roosevelt policies. Sullivan also thinks popular approval of anti-Roosevelt candidates in coming primaries would help materially in averting fascist dangers.

Hitler's overwhelming victory in the recent plebiscite is accounted for on the same ground of fear that impelled crowds to applaud ancient Nero when he tried to play his fiddle.

FINISHING A TRIP of 7,000 miles, Samuel R. McKelvie, publisher of the Nebraska Farmer, expresses words of rejoicing on his return to free America. "Oh," he explains, "if only every American citizen—every voter could be taken into the lands where poverty, scarcity, ignorance, superstition, corruption in government and dictatorship are accepted as the best the world affords, what a revolution there would be against those who subtly are stealing away the birthright of every freeman American." McKelvie quotes from a London magazine, The Sphere, which points out the superior resources of the United States and the incomparable development in this country—its possession of nearly half the world's gold supply, its purchasing power that exceeds that of the 500,000,000 people in Europe, and then offering this conclusion: "Responsible leadership which cannot translate such a bulging economy into assured prosperity is destitute of capacity.
