PIONEER CITIZEN PROPOSES TO FARM ON HIS OWN HOOK

FRED Lessman who is a pioneer farmer northeast of Wayne, says he needs the production of all his eighty acres to feed his live stock and otherwise to carry out his plans. He has a farm in Kansas, and when it does anything, it does well, but he can't always depend on it. His eighty just over the line in Dixon county seldom fails to deliver satisfactory results. It is on this farm that he pins absolute faith, and he is therefore compelled to turn deals cars to government agents who invite him to join the government's control program. He has been instructed on the measure of his crop limitation, but he proposes to ignore the advice and do his own planning. He says he has been up and down in a gamble with the elements in past years, and he is not now ready to shift responsibility or surrender any degree of his independence.
