

Visitor Returns from South American Trip — Burdening Business — Worst Form of Life — Two Farm Fests — Wage and Hour Legislation.

Lee Boyer of Omaha, veteran traveling representative of the Western Paper company, was in Wayne last week for the first time in more than three months. He arrived home April 19 from a trip through South America. He sailed for the south January 15. This was Mr. Boyer's second trip abroad. A few years ago he toured Europe and of the two trips he thinks the one to Europe was the more interesting. It furnished more variety—more different languages to confuse and often amuse. Spanish is the dominant language in South America, though English ranks second and is growing in use. Learning English is compulsory in the public schools of Brazil.

Mr. Boyer journeyed through the Panama canal and down the western coast. He found rain never falls at Lima, Peru. He said clouds gather, but for reasons found in the lay of the mountains, they never give forth any water. Irrigation is depended on entirely. By bus he made the trip across from Valparaiso, Chile, to Buenos Aires, Argentina. Buenos Aires has a population of two and one-half millions, and is a city of wonderfully beautiful architecture.

Most of the world's supply of coffee is shipped from the port of Santos in Brazil. Hotel accommodations at Rio de Janeiro in Brazil were so delightful that he was almost charmed away from planned sightseeing trips. Complaint about hard times often made him feel he was among home folks in the United States. He pointed out that the dictatorship business was easily accomplished in Brazil. Present incumbent, up for re-election, was persuaded to avert the danger of communism by declaring the election off and putting opposing candidates into jail. The scheme worked, and one-man supremacy was established.

Mr. Boyer found few newspapers printed in English in South American centers, and those so printed aid partial to British news. He listened in on American broadcasting, but was rewarded with very little news. As South America is regularly bombarded by cleverly fashioned propaganda from Europe, he is inclined to favor a powerful American station to give South Americans an idea of civilization in the United States.

Mr. Boyer says no middle class is found in the countries he visited. Infidels are either clear down or clear up. The upper group does not draw the line against anyone who has a job and is apparently getting along. There seemed to be no distasteful snobs. Americans employed in South American countries appeared well satisfied. But Mr. Boyer is satisfied with the United States. He believes a trip abroad is a sure cure for discontent.

Needless Details.

Another nightmare imposed by the government on small industries is the census of manufacturers. The authority attempts to gather details of production that even the proprietor doesn't know—details that amount to nothing as means of valuable information. Asking for totals showing receipts and expenditures for different branches of a business for a year is altogether too simple. The government wants to know the different things done, the costs, involved and the net profits, if any. In its demands on the time and mental pabulum of an individual or corporation, the government ought to figure on allowing enough strength to handle overhead and maintain existence. In the interest of employment, the government ought to give floating institutions a chance to keep on floating, and this may be done by making fewer requests.

The Beastly Kidnaper.

Probably the lowest form of biped is the one who kidnaps and abuses a child and outrages parents with threats. Everybody should lend every possible aid to capture the guilty, and no one would feel aggrieved to hear of the summary dispatch of a known kidnaper in the process of capture.

Crimes seem to have become more frequent and terrible of late—perhaps due in a measure to examples in parts of the world where war-stricken and dictator-ruled peoples engage in ruthless slaughter, treating human life with amazing indifference.

Cultivars Have Innings.

Farmers now have to look out for cutworms which furnish chief tics to tender corn shoots when the weather is wet. Grasshoppers take over the job of supplying troubles when the elements are dry. The two pests take turns, so the farmer will not be allowed any great length of time when hazards are entirely removed and anxiety is no longer stirred.

SCHOOL TUITION INCREASED HERE

First Monday Is Chosen For Opening of Term Next September.

Tuition students in Wayne high school increased the past year by the two previous terms, according to report presented by Supt. E. W. Smith before the school board at its meeting Friday evening. Wayne High School had 96 tuition students the past term, the tuition amounting to \$7,422.75. The number in 1936-37 was 80 and the amount \$6,057, and the number in 1935-36 was 62 with a tuition of \$4,977. One first grader was a tuition pupil, paying \$54.

Of the 96 tuition pupils in high school this term, 54 were boys and 42 girls. All were from Wayne county excepting three from Dixon. With \$225 per week as the tuition rate, Wayne county students brought \$7,179.75 and Dixon county pupils \$248 to the school district funds.

Make Minor Changes.

The board decided to partition off part of the gymnasium to use for a class room, the work to be done this summer.

The possibility of adding chemistry to the high school curriculum, to be given alternating years with physics, was discussed. Since much of the equipment needed duplicates for the two subjects, chemistry could be added with very little cost. The two courses would be open to seniors and juniors.

G. B. Childs, who had a year's leave of absence to attend Harvard this year to work on his doctor's degree, returns to Wayne high school next year as principal. He plans to be in Wayne within a few days. Miss Anna Geiser and Mervin Feddersen who had his duties the past year, will instruct in their special subjects.

Attendance Shows Increase.

Enrollment in the high school has shown an increase the past year, according to another report given by Supt. Smith to the board.

CROPS HEREABOUTS IN LEAD THROUGH THE MIDDLE WEST

ONE group going to Des Moines by way of Omaha and returning by way of Sioux City and another journeying 200 miles through central Nebraska, agreed that growing crops look farther advanced and healthier in all respects in northeast Nebraska than in any of the areas observed. Too much rain in Iowa has prevented many fields from being planted to corn and has kept cultivators out of many other fields.

Considerable of central Nebraska's wheat is damaged by rust. But crops generally look unusually well, and northeast Nebraska ranks second to none. An inspection of the big government power project near Columbus reveals a costly piece of engineering, giving promise of electrical energy equal to any possible demand. The project is conspicuously labeled the "WPA in action," the two last words being adequately separated to avoid the wrong meaning.

Junior high had 97 the past year with 106 and 109 the terms before. Lower grades enrolled 175 last term with 171 and 183 the previous years.

Average daily attendance in high school the past term was 211 and 181.8 the previous year. This amounted to 93.7 percent this year and 93 the term before. Grades had an average attendance of 242.1 this term; 232.62 the previous year. This is 90.1 percent for the term just past and 87.7 for the year earlier.

Iowa Speaks in Iowa must be accepted as an unmistakable reaction against New Deal policies. Senator Guy M. Gillette, democrat, renominated to succeed himself, was opposed by four avowed New Dealers of the rubber-stamp variety. Chief among opponents was Congressman Otha D. Wearin who was openly supported by Administrator Harry Hopkins and Secretary Jimmy Roosevelt, son of the president. It is not supposed the two from inner administration circles expressed themselves contrary to the president's wishes.

Gillette, opposed the administration's court wrecking plan a year ago, and the evident intention was to get his scalp. In the late campaign, the senator said he did not propose to bury convictions and serve as a mere rubber stamp. Wearin boasted of administration endorsement, leaving no doubt in the minds of voters where lines were drawn. Manifestly he did not expect support from anti-New Deal democrats, and just as manifestly he didn't get it.

Former Senator L. J. Dickinson received the republican nomination, and with Dickinson and Gillette pitted against each other in the election, Iowa is certain to be represented in the Senate by men of self-assertion and definite convictions. However the outcome in November, there will be no trailing behind Son Jimmie. Adviser Tommy Corcoran and other administration satellites.

Iowa is a typical mid-western state. Its people cannot long be fooled by bogus claims and unfulfilled pledges. They evidently cannot be led farther in the direction of collectivism. They are plainly in revolt against unwise government planning. The Iowa result will encourage those who believe in American fundamentalists. It should strengthen confidence.

A democratic candidate who refuses to forfeit convictions in opposition to the administration, but who wishes success at

the polls, is in a disagreeably tight place. He doesn't know how voters feel in regard to presidential policies, and he doesn't want to be penalized by administration spokesmen for doing his duty. Constituents will resent Washington interference if they know what is best for them. They have done so in Iowa.

Robert Ross, Lexington blacksmith, has come to the surface again as a political candidate. He has filed for governor. In several previous campaigns he was a candidate for president. He is growing older and doubtless figures the governorship would yield sufficient burdens. He always reaps a harvest of votes—a fact that rather discredit the primary as a wise method of making nominations.

You can fool part of the people all the time and all the people part of the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time, so said Lincoln, and he was speaking of the American people who are free to think and vote without restraint. The vote in Iowa is proof of an intelligent electorate awakened to government fallacies and quick to resent instructions from Washington's higher-ups.

The Sioux City Journal thinks New Deal circles will put in the next few days trying to figure some way to create the impression that Otha D. Wearin's defeat was some sort of victory for the White House. An announcement from headquarters that the result was planned that way may be expected.

Treating shortsighted obstinacy as the unreasonable cause of retarded recovery, the Omaha World-Herald concludes: "We cannot help feeling that when, in water days, the history of our times is recorded, the names of a good many now exalted will be written down pretty middling low."

The Omaha Journal-Stockman notes conflict in reports sent out from the Chicago grain center. One reported heavy damage to wheat from rust, and another anticipated such a big wheat surplus that acreage curtailment would have to follow next year.

Mob violence is not the way to preserve American liberties.

Though in opposing groups, communists and fascists are equally dangerous to our form of government, but our best safeguard would seem to be to let radicals expose their alien notions and then vote them down. If a minority, they can be made to obey the laws of democracy without crushing free speech which is a part of our traditions and of which we justly boast. Let the law rather than a frenzied mob pass on the permissibility of what is said or printed. That is the way to hold liberty and security for everybody.

SECURITY.

With elaborate and costly government machinery set up to insure social security, we seem to have less of it right now than ever. With industry slowed down and idleness increased, chances for young persons seeking fields of employment grow less—temporarily, so we hope. Oldsters left out of jobs with no savings often look in vain for gainful work and must turn to relatives of public relief sources for support. But the middle west is now getting ready to realize record crops and if nothing happens to destroy the prospect, it will be a big help in furnishing jobs and stimulating business. Then the too frequent disposition to repudiate obligations should change. Old-time pride in achievement should revive. Large crop production will help industry, and in turn industry, employing more men, will increase consumption of farm products. People may then turn from relief rolls and paddle their own canoes. Directly and indirectly, crop abundance will do more than the government's social security or any other government plan to push back the depression or recession and restore normal conditions.

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The skill and cunning displayed by Japanese in the present warfare with China was also typical of that nationality in 1904 when Charles Goebbert who lives southwest of Wayne, saw the Japanese sailors attack Russian ships in the Russian-Japanese war. 282 Russian sailors were killed and two ships damaged.

Mr. Goebbert, who came here in 1907 after serving in the German navy four years, was on a German ship in August, 1904, when the Japanese attacked the Russians. The German ship was neutral.

It is a rule of the seas that warships shall not fire within the three-mile zone off any coast. It is also required that war ships in port must disarm while docking. If the two warring nations wish to confer, a neutral country's ship between them carries the messages.

The Russian war ships, S.M.S. Czarewitch, which was a 25-mile boat, the S. M. S. Askold, which was a 35-mile boat, and some torpedo boats comprised the Russian group which had been in dock.

When the ships got outside the safety zone, a Japanese gunner, who had been watching for them, fired at night on the ships at a range of 3,000 yards. The 24-centimeter shots from the 12-inch guns,

made 100 percent aim. One shot went through six-inch steel and killed the men who were directing the ship's course, also destroying the ship's electric steering. Another shot struck the firing squad, killing the men. A third struck a smoke stack. With the three shots the Japs killed 282 men and disabled the ship so that it had to use emergency steering and return to port for repairs which took nine months.

The Askold had only a smoke stack demolished and no persons killed. The torpedo boats sped away and escaped the fire.

In the war Japan took Manchuria from Russia.

Mr. Goebbert recalls that when he visited China, Shanghai and Tsingtao were very small. The city of Shanghai had but one or two shops of each kind. The international settlements were established that early and each nation patrolled its possessions. The city lies about three miles up the river from the coast. Tsingtao was also very small and the town was located on high cliffs overlooking the bay.

The Chinese people 24 years ago were suspicious. It was dangerous. Mr. Goebbert was told to go farther back than 10 miles from the coast unaccompanied.

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**Rhodes Scholar
Gives Views on
Foreign Affairs**

Supt. E. W. Smith has received an interesting letter from a friend, Frank Crabbill, former student at the University of Nebraska and at Oxford visited in London. He

for the past two years a Rhodes scholar studying at Oxford university in England. Mr. Crabbill discusses the European situation and the reaction of the English people to conditions.

At the end of the term Mr. Crabbill with four other students at Oxford visited in London. He

writes: "It was at the time of the crisis in Austria and we had some interesting experiences. I hadn't seen the English so excited since the abdication, and you could scarcely find any other news in the papers. One Sunday morning we went to Hyde park to hear the seaplane orators—they were certainly having their day. In the afternoon we watched a big peace demonstration; about 20,000 communists, laborites and other leftists marched from the Square to the German embassy, carrying banners, shouting and singing. The mounted police kept them at a safe distance, but it looked for awhile as if almost anything could happen."

The next day we got passes to the House of Commons and listened to a debate on defense and foreign policy. Chamberlain had his hands full answering questions from the opposition—he was none too popular for a few days after the German coup.

"Germany has again been the center of attention in the last couple of days. The Czechoslovakian situation was extremely critical for about two days, but it seems to have become less tense now. The English undergraduates seem to have resigned themselves to the fact that it can only be a matter of time."

"The Rhodes scholars spent an interesting afternoon and evening Friday. Ambassador Kennedy came to Rhodes house for an informal tea and stayed to address the U. S. A. society in the evening. He seemed rather pessimistic about things in general and the international situation in particular. He spoke 'off the record' and certainly didn't beat about the bush."

Mr. Crabbill also wrote that Ex-chancellor Brunning of Germany had been delivering a series of lectures on democracy during the term. He commented that he also is pessimistic about the future.

Mr. Crabbill has been awarded an extension of the scholarship for a third year, and is planning on returning for a B. C. L. degree next fall.




