

In Russia, labor leaders are Stalin's lieutenants, and his controls are called the proletarian state, or communism. Both are autocrats."

Check your car to make sure that your tail light and headlights are not burned out. Be sure that the lenses on the headlights are not broken, and that they are matched. Check the tail light and be sure it is in good working order.

Clean the dirt from the motor number and check this number with your registration certificate, and make sure they correspond.

It is important that tire inflation is UNIFORM in all tires and the pressure is the usual amount carried in your tires. Proper inflation will give better results and always benefits any fair test.

In general, check your vehicle and have put in condition any part or parts which you know will not pass inspection.

The Nebraska law requires the owner of a motor vehicle of any kind to have the safety factors of the vehicle inspected and tested at least once each year upon precision equipment.




