





LEGAL NOTICE AS TO MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 8, 1938

A proposal to amend Section 24, Article 3 of the Conditution of Nebraska authorizing the legislature, by law, to license and to regulate the operation of slot machines and other coin operated devices and machines of chance, exempting merchandise and service vending machines; to provide that revenue derived from license fees shall go into the state assistance fund, the school district in which the machine is located and for administrative expense; to provide a limitation on the smount of an occupation tax any city or village in the state may levy upon any owner or operator of such machine.

A MEASURE

FOR AN AMENDMENT to the Constitution of the State of Nebrasks relating to public assistance, welfare and social security; to provide revenue for the State Assistance Fund from the proceeds of an annual tax to be levied on owners and operators of coin-operated

Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska:

1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of Nebrasks, to read as follows:

Section 1. That Spetion 24, Article III, Constitution of Nebrasks, be amended to read as ifollows:

*Sec. 24. (a) The Legislature shall not authorize any game of chance, lottery or gift ienterprise; but nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the enactment of laws provided for the licensing and regulation of wagering on the results of horse races by the parimutuel or certificate method, when conducted by Ricensees within the race track enclosure at licensed horse race meetings; nor shall anything in this section be construed to prohibit the enactment of laws providing for the operation, leasing, distribution, maintenance or possession of any coin-operated machines, whether said machines are skill machines, regulation and taxing of said machines as hereafter provided. (b) No person or persona, corporation shall own or operats any coin-operated device without first having obtained a license therefor. For the purpose of this section, coin-operated devices are defined and classified as follows: (1) Coinoperated skill machines: (commonly referred to as pin games, marble tables and similar devices of this type which may have a skill feature) which may or may not pay a reward for skillful operation, or upon which operation premiums may or may not be given for high acore or making certain combinations. Such premiums may be awarded either automatically by the machine in the form of ichecks, tokens or orders which designate the value of the premium or premiums, or may be indicated by a score card attached to the machine. Hereafter, this type shall be referred to as skill machines.' (2) Automatic coin-operated vending and amusement, machines with premium features which would for each coin deposited and its addition, may vend checks, tokens or orders which have no merchandius of a recognized retail value equal to the coin deposited and in addition, may vend checks, tokens or orders which near no merchandius vending feature, although at intervals indicated that partin is entitled to receive premiums in mercha 24. (a) The Legislature shall not authorize any game
