Pension THE Nebraska Old Age pension association has asked Planning Former Governor Charles W. Bryan to run for governor by petition on a plation pleding the \$30 per month pension plan for oldsters above association reports that \$110 of the \$211 unicameral candidates favor the proposed legislation. J. E. 




