It is doubtless true that a majority of the people favor a middle-of-the-road course, economy that will balance the budget and policies that will free private enterprise from crippling government restraints. As suggested by the Post, republicans must have something to sell the people besides an imitation of the new deal. Voters are plainly ready for something reasonable and constructive.

A poll of industrial leaders revealed a desire to cooperate with the government and increase prosperity. There is no dis-position to pulk backward in social and business reforms, but to curtail damaging Position to pult backward in social and business reforms, but to curtail damaging government interference, going forward on a fair basis beneficial to all interests. In-dustrial leaders would grant collective bargaining, but would want to modify the Wagner act. They would limit government competition with private business. They would improve standards of living by in-creasing production and means of distri-bution instead of following a policy of scarcity. The idea is to unite all forces in a just compromise of disagreements, all pulling together for befter group relation-ships and for the general welfare.

This is a queer world The fellow who specializes in leisure, is cussed because he doesn't work and save and pay his obliga-tions. The fellow who warks like a draft horse, and gets ahead by not contracting debts he cannot meet promptly, is cussed as a tightwad. The impetunious fellow is mad because his frugal neighbor does not divide up, and he would still be mad if the latter did not give up enough to lay him out flat. Having all uniformly hard up and de-pendent on the government is the shiftless fellow's idea of equality! That would be the abundant life in reverse.

As seen by the Saturday Evening Post, our war-time laws would, in ease of hostili-ties, convert us into a virtual dictatorship. About the last stronghold of a free nation would thus be washed up and laid away pending the outcome. Tenporarily, at least, we would lose our democracy in fighting to safeguard it against dictator-ship.

New restrictions and exuelties are im-posed on the Jews as fast as nazi and fas-cist tyrant heads can think of them. Fines are imposed without chattering up the record with reasons, and they come along in sufficiently rapid succession to insure stripping the unhappy minority of worldly possessions in the least possible time.
