**Independence Is Goal in Islands**

**Mrs. C. F. Maynard Tells Club About Preparations Made in Philippines.**  
"It is an interesting experience to be on hand to watch a nation prepare for an independent existence," according to Mrs. C. F. Maynard of Manila, who addressed the Kiwanians Monday. "We have promised the Philippines their independence in 1946 and unless something happens to change their desire for it before that time, they will have their freedom in a few more years. For 40 years, the Americans have spared neither time nor money to develop and improve conditions in the islands. Their standard of living is now far above that of any other oriental country. They have fine schools and hospitals, good roads, and disease has been reduced to a minimum. And now through the transition period, we are keeping a guiding hand over them and gradually turning positions of responsibility over to the natives.  
"Many seemingly insurmountable difficulties face a country that is planning an independent existence, even when it is being advised and aided by a friendly power. There is the question of defense; an army and navy must be built up. The Filipinos, under the direction of General MacArthur, advisor to President Quezon on military affairs, have started an intensive program of training men to be soldiers. In a few years, several million Filipinos will be familiar with the routine of army life. That is all that can be done at present. A strong navy seems at present to be an impossibility, since the financial problems are too great to be solved immediately.  
"The language problem is a very real one, though it may not be apparent on the surface. There are some 80 dialects spoken among the 17,000,000 Filipinos and interest in the central government in Manila is lessened in the more remote provinces because of this language barrier and because of the natural tribal habits of the people.  
"Much discussion of late has dealt with the question of whether or not the Filipinos really want independence now that they are about to receive it. I think there are some thoughtful and sincere Filipinos who truly wish to be independent, who believe that given a chance they can prove their mettle and take their place among the nations. I know there are some who fear the going of the Americans and who realize that the peace and prosperity of the islands are due to our sovereignty.  
"It is the opinion of Americans in the islands that when independence is granted, we must move out completely. If, as has been suggested by some, we maintain naval bases there after we give up authority, we are sure to be involved sooner or later when they are invaded by land-hungry neighbors. The Philippines is a rich land, sparsely populated and the 'guarantees of neutrality' that they hope for would probably give them very brief security. To quote Paul V. McNutt, until recently American high commissioner, 'I predict that if our flag goes down, the Philippines will become a bloody field and be a center of a war within a war for a generation.'  
"I hope to live in the Philippines during the next few years and the spectacle of that country preparing for independence should become even more absorbingly interesting as time goes on. I make no predictions but I am glad that I may be on hand to watch this unique and peaceful birth of a nation," concluded the speaker.

## Stress Education At Winside Camp

Classes Are Conducted to Give Young Men Work in Special Lines

(By M. L. Hazelrigg.)

A great deal of emphasis is placed on an educational program in the C. C. camp at Winside which has a school building 100 feet long and 20 feet wide. It is in this building where the boys of camp grind over their lessons and attend lectures.

The educational program in the camp near Winside covers a fairly wide variety of subjects for the enrollees. Whenever a member enrolls in camp he is given a series of tests, not only the mental, but achievement tests to see in what subjects he is deficient. Arithmetic, English, spelling, civic problems, farm management, soils, agronomy, conservation, mechanics, safety, carpentry, drafting, typing, bookkeeping, shorthand, first aid, health hygiene, news writing, photography, radio, woodworking and classes in job training are some of the classes taught to the boys.

Classes are held in the morning before the men report for work and after their evening meal. Instructors consist of soil conservation service personnel attached to the camp, army personnel, a few qualified enrollees and, when possible, WPA teachers and teachers from the outside.

Special emphasis is placed on vocational counseling and guidance. Every effort is made to prepare the enrollee to become a better citizen after he leaves camp.

Just as you will find public school teachers with certain aims so in the school of the C. C. camps one finds aims which camp educators are endeavoring to attain. The aims of CCC education are: First, to develop in each man his powers of self expression, self entertainment and self culture; second, to develop pride and satisfaction in cooperative endeavor; third, to develop as far as practical an understanding of the prevailing social and economic conditions, to the end that each may cooperate intelligently in improving these conditions; fourth, to develop and strengthen good habits of health and mental development; fifth, by such vocational training as is feasible, but particularly by vocational counseling and adjustment activities, to assist each man better to meet his employment problems when he leaves camp; sixth to develop an appreciation of nature and country life.

The school plant of the Winside camp, the largest building of the camp, has a library that contains nearly 1,900 books and a goodly number of the better grade magazines. Class instruction is helped by the use of a sound projector and a central library film service.

It may be of interest to know that out of nearly 200 boys, the educational spread is from the sixth grade to two years of college. There are nearly 50 boys who have finished high school. The whole group will average about the 10th grade. Each member in camp attends at least four classes each week, although the average for the whole group is over six.

Correspondence courses are taken by some of the members especially those who have attended college or those who are expected to attend. All efforts are made to assist members to make up school work, and those without an 8th grade education have many opportunities to make up the work. Any enrollee who is illiterate, although there are none in the company at the present time, is taught to read and write.

J. S. Clawson is in charge of the educational activities of the camp.
