

If no human power can prevent war in Europe, it is profoundly hoped the United States will be able to kelep out of it. In the event of war, even winners will be huge losers. The last world conflict set back civilization, and the impending one, if it cannot

Short crops are disappointing, but they should not be accepted as defeat. North areas will gather considerable corn. Less fortunate parts may be expected to do better next year. Silos will help solve the feed problem. In any event, it is supremely important to tighten one's grip, keep one's head up and look ahead with confidence. Townspeople who indirectly share in crop losses, should steel themselves to untoward fate and appear cheerful even if they do not feel that way.
