weather to the farmer—these were sciences of primitive man and have been developed. New discoveries made possible improved conditions of life, such as setting fire by friction, shaping lenses for telescope and microscope, moving magnets to produce electric currents.

The net result of these discoveries has been to increase the rate of growth of knowledge and of the control of nature which is the most striking phenomenon of man's history. The knowledge of nature, which from the beginning had been man's gradually but accidentally increasing heritage, has now become the conscious objective of alert minds. Science has become the most significant intellectual quest of man. "As a result life today differs more from that of our great grandparents than did their age," stated the speaker.

"Science has become the basis of our civilization and the primary factor in promoting its growth. Development of scientific activity may be thought of as an aspect of social evolution. It supplies the knowledge which enables men to use the materials of nature for supplying their wants. The process involves a specialization of function. An important aspect of this truth is the recent establishment of many research laboratories. Research will continue with better organization and equipment and we can expect an increasingly rapid growth of the physical sciences."

Dr. Brock quoted a statesman as saying that "the future belongs to science, and more and more she will control the destinies of nations." The occupations and interests of the great mass of people are immediately connected with the application of physical and biological sciences, and these people are realizing the value of scientific training in their daily pursuits. Training should thus be broad and fundamental," Dr. Brock concluded.

Prof. John R. Keith explained that the schools and community are joining to present "The Messiah" under sponsorship of Kiwanian. He urged more from the community to participate.

Strange, new sights and unusual experiences! This is the observation of Paul Bertson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bertson, who writes from Balboa, Panama canal zone, where he has gone to accept a federal position. The canal, as a map will show, runs north and south across the narrow neck of land joining North and South America, and Balboa is at the south point of the canal.

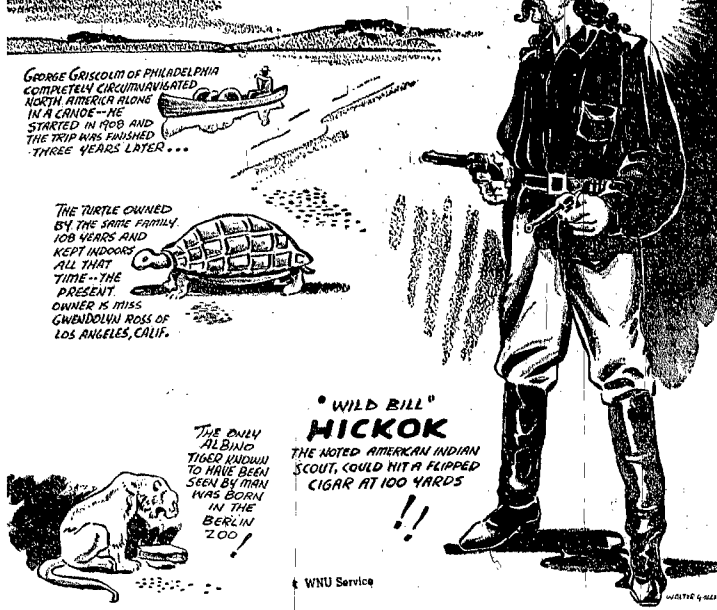
"I've started work today down here at Balboa Heights in the government administrative office, a beautiful large building overlooking the town of Balboa," Paul writes November 9. "We got to Cristobal about 1:45 p. m. yesterday and after having the customs officers go through my trunk and bag I got on the train crossing the

isthmus for Balboa. Balboa and Balboa Heights are practically one and the same thing, Balboa being the most level part of the town and Balboa Heights being the hills, and there are plenty of hills. The railroad crosses the isthmus right along the canal and practically all I saw was swamps, jungle and water. Seemed strange to see large steamers right alongside the train when going across.

"I was plenty glad to get off the boat although it was very nice. The three steamers of the Panama railway line are all new ships, having their maiden voyages this summer. The second night out of New York the seas began to get rough and the next day I surely didn't feel very well. I ate something every meal though except one lunch and some of the tables were all empty. Monday, November 6, we landed at the island of Haiti and after I got on land I felt quite a bit better. We landed at Port au Prince about 7:30 in the morning and left at 8:30 p. m. The city of Port au Prince looks very beautiful from the harbor but when you land and walk around the streets it is altogether different. Beggars everywhere! Even before the ship had docked the water was full of these colored Haitian boys diving for nickels and dimes and even pennies. Then as soon as one sets foot on land there are children galloping all around begging for pennies and nickels and trying to sell baskets of fruit, pieces of carved woods, woven straw objects, etc.

"We walked around the different market places in Port au Prince and saw all the goods and wares, and some of the things and mixtures the natives were eating would turn anyone's stomach. Then we hired a car and took a long ride up through the hills and finally wound up at an American hotel. The Kahn in the hills and there we had lunch. The hills of Haiti are simply too beautiful to describe with the most gorgeous flowers and vegetation that I've ever seen. The colors are so vivid that they hardly seem real. At one old church that we visited in Port au Prince the whole altar was

covered with flowers, with all different colors of orchids in thick profusion.

"Everything seems alive, even the walls of buildings," Paul continues. "While we were at the American hotel at the summit of the mountains a botanist from Yale university, who got off yesterday at Frijoles (a mere collection of huts) caught three different species of lizards crawling on the damp cement walls. And we weren't in the place over 40 minutes." Paul explains that the office building in which he works is atop a large hill and from it he can look down a long avenue of palms to the government club house.

"It rained all afternoon yesterday—not a gentle rain but a down-pour," according to Paul in concluding the letter November 13. "I don't know where all the water goes; it seems like half of it stays in my clothes because they're so damp. They say that after you become acclimated the mugginess doesn't bother, but until then I'll just feel uncomfortable. Everyone here carries umbrellas.

"The typewriter I'm using has all the nickel rusted off and when I took off the cover the keys and roller were covered with dew. The closet in my room has a heater in it. A person has to put everything into the closet or it will mildew and rot.

"I was vaccinated on the boat for smallpox.

"I've been in Panama City three times. Avenue Central, the main street, is quite nice but I think that's the only one. Most of the streets are mere alleys with the houses or hovels built right adjoining and I don't believe I'd want to be in the city by myself at night, although some people who work in the zone do live in the better parts of Panama City. There are all kinds of foreign shops and foreign wares to be had for little or nothing, but a person hates to buy anything from the dirty and diseased proprietors."

Federal approval was received last Thursday for a WPA project for revising all records in the office of the county superintendent. The WPA provides \$977 for this purpose and the work will be done at no cost to Wayne county.

All teachers' certificates registered and in force will be recorded in an alphabetical file. The 7th and 8th grade examination papers will be arranged in files. Teachers' examination grades will be recorded in systematic order. Records of high school tuition will be filed. Students are entitled to free high school tuition for four years and systematic file of this information will make checking easier.

The project will provide employment for several months for one person.

## Training Drivers In High Schools Curtail Planting For Coming Year

Nebraska is joining other progressive states in providing driver training in a safety program. Foundation is laid for safe driving, and also includes courtesy, cooperation, responsibility and citizenship. Laws, rules and regulations are required, also good judgment and common sense. Three out of five high school graduates will drive cars, and the highest accident injury rate occurs between the ages of 15 and 24. Fatal records increased 129 per cent since 1922. The church, it seems to us, should advertise its wares, should let the general public know its purposes and services. We once humbly made this suggestion in an address to a large group of ministers, who, surprisingly, for its character is revolutionary, treated it kindly.

Merchants, manufacturers, theatrical promoters, all who wish to attract public attention to their products, adopt well-organized advertising campaigns. Newspapers, magazines, billboards, radio, and screen, the nation over, advertise everything on earth except the most important service — that the church renders.

When approximately 50 per cent of all school children are outside of the influence of the church, how can they gain true knowledge of religion and morality? Why not advertise this fact?

Most of the four million criminals at large today have had no religious training. Why not advertise this fact?

Church attendance has fallen off 30 per cent in recent years, while crime is on the increase. Why not advertise this fact?

There is a definite connection between the lack of church training and the prevalence of crime. Why not advertise this fact?

The church, it seems to us, should advertise its success in spreading religious knowledge, in forming character, and in building lives.
