Comjbles escial se-curity works only under such restraints as the 'imposed, by dictatorships. If an individual is compelled to follow the blue-print of a superior authority in working and in buying and selling—it he is restricted in what he may do or say—if he is robbed of the spirit of initia-tive and voluntary enterprise-he shifts responsibility and for-feits personal liberty and in exchange he receives a paltry sort of social security which, to a free American, would be un-bearable. Most people, used to depending on their own judg-ment and paddling their own cances, prefer possible losses and disappointments to meager security in virtual servitude. **Of County Dies**
