AWAKENED MIDDLE WEST TO CAPTURE NEW INVESTMENTS

IT WAS pointed out at a meeting of the Associated Industries of Nebraska at Grand Island recently that Nebraska and some other middle western states have not shared fairly in the distribution of new industries through failure to make known resources and other advantages. It is shown the middle west is neither shipping nor making headway—at an unsatisfactory standstill. The plan is to attract attention and capture new investments. One who has studied the middle west and gathered information as to its possibilities finds too few facts understood by capitalists looking for investments. By increasing the population and multiplying wage earners, farmers and townspeople alike will be benefited. As Nebraska awakens and goes after new industries that are casting about for desirable locations, live communities will win the prizes. Wayne should be among the winners.

Interest Shown In Conservation

Petition Will Be Circulated To Determine Possible Further Action.

As a result of interest shown at four meetings held in Wayne and Stanton counties last week, attempts are to be made to organize a soil and moisture conservation district in the area north of the Elkhorn river in Stanton county and in Hoskins and Hancock precincts of Wayne county. Thirty farmers are circulating petitions through the area of about 100,000 acres, these to be completed by December 1 when they will be presented to the state committee who will call a hearing after a notice has been published in local papers for three weeks.

If the state committee, consisting of W. W. Burr, dean of the college of agriculture, W. H. Brokaw, director of extension, and Dr. G. E. Condra, head of the conservation and survey division of the university, is well impressed with the attendance and interest shown at the local hearing, they will then call for a referendum during which every landowner in the proposed district will be given an opportunity to vote. Seventy-five percent of the landowners, who vote, must favor the district in order for the vote to carry.

Ed. Doll and Gilbert Webster of the college of agriculture were present at the meetings in Bega, Cenadina, district 7 and Highland schools to explain the details of district organization. They also showed colored slides of the types of work done by other Nebraska soil conservation districts. They explained how districts run their own program through five local farmers, who are elected to serve as supervisors.

Audit Is Asked On New Project By School Board

Building Improvement Is Accepted in the Main After Inspection.

A semi-final audit, which will cover everything except some minor equipment contracts, will be asked by the Wayne city school board of education, Ed. Seymour, secretary, said late Monday. The audit is expected to start within the next ten days.

After two inspections last week, the board, on the recommendation of the architect and with the approval of the Public Works Administration, accepted the completed contract of the Kingery Construction company of Lincoln, principal contractor. This contract also covered the work of subcontractors, F. L. Deines of Lincoln for plumbing and heating and the Meyers Electric company of Wayne for electric wiring and fixtures.

The work was found complete except for the furnishing of a brass stair rail, ordered three months ago, a lock for one of the fireproof corridor doors, also being awaited and some smaller items. The board, in accepting the contracts, withholds final payment for 30 to 60 days, receives guarantees on various items, such as 10 years for the roof, and retains a surety bond which covers all defects in materials or workmanship discovered within one year of the job acceptance.

A PWA grant check in the amount of \$8,700 was received late last week for the district by Secretary Seymour. Subject to final PWA audits, the district is eligible to receive up to \$13,445 more from the government as part of the grant agreement.

Finish Details To Qualify for Building Grant

Funds Are Available for Equipment Contracts At Connell Hall.

Members of the Nebraska State Normal board building committee, in Omaha late last week completed all details to qualify the second amendatory grant application to the Public Works Administration for equipping the remodeled and enlarged Connell hall.

This does not assure the board of a second additional PWA allotment for this project, but it fulfills all of the requirements set up by PWA and leaves the decision up to Washington.

If the completed contracts are accepted by the board within the next few days, Resident Engineer Dan Farrell, Jr., of the PWA will ask for a semi-final audit of expenses incurred to date, so that the owner's board can receive the final payment on the grant for the greater portion of the work, ignoring the equipment contracts, for which a later audit can be asked when that work is completed.

It appears that the building will not be thrown open until after the furniture and lunch room equipment covered in the November 16 letting are installed.

Farms in County Get Electricity

Waiting Until Tomorrow... Nothing for explanation or apology. The fellow who says he intended to do it today, but didn't get around to it, confesses laziness which impairs confidence and hinders success.

The following from an author, identity unknown, shows up this too common weakness:

He was going to be all that he wanted to be—Tomorrow. No one should be kinder or braver than he—Tomorrow. A friend who was troubled and weary, he knew—who'd be glad of a lift—and who needed it, too—on him, he would call and see what he could do—Tomorrow.

Each morning he stacked up the letters he'd written—Tomorrow. And thoughts of the folks he would fill with delight—Tomorrow. It was too bad, indeed, he was busy today, and hadn't the minute to stop on his way. "More time I will give to others," he'd say—Tomorrow.

The greatest of workers, this man would have been—Tomorrow. The world would have known him had he ever seen—Tomorrow.

But, in fact, he passed on, and he faded from view, and all that he left here when living was through, was a mountain of things he intended to do—Tomorrow.

America's Defense IN NATION'S BUSINESS, Merle Thorpe says aggressive nations are the ones that are in trouble at home. He believes the best safeguard against interference from abroad is less centralization at home, less yielding to the Tugwell-Corcoran school of thought, and more freedom for capital and private endeavor. In conclusion he says:

"An American gainfully at work is our strongest defense. To get management, men and dollars once more into their old-fashioned American overalls, uncertainties caused by executive bureaus must be eliminated, restrictions upon management must be eased, a movement started toward putting the government's fiscal house in order, and the petty business baiters interned.

"We may fervently pray for another \$80-, 000,000,000 income. Management can't speed up our business machinery to that point if we deprive it of funds and freedom of action. Washington cannot enjoy the same satisfaction of seeing business managers on the rack and at the same time enjoy the harvest of management's accomplishments. Either one or the other. We can't expect speed and hill-climbing again with the brakes set too hard.

The business machinery, by which men exchange their labor and services, going at top speed, even with a little too much play here and there, is the greatest protection possible against any eventuality of peace or war."

Confidence THE SIOUX CITY Journal mentions that while Harvard, Princeton and Dartmouth have forbidden Earl Browder, notorious communist leader, to speak before their students, Yale has granted the privilege. Frowning on Browder's alien doctrine, and encouraging the conclusion that listening to a speaker does not presuppose belief in what he has to say, the Journal sounds this reassuring note:

"Yale university in permitting Earl Browder to use a campus building in which to speak his piece, probably about the time being ripe

in America for a transition to some other form of government, and not be put down as ready for the same thing. Confidence in a majority of the student body of any well established university having enough common sense to reject communism has not been destroyed or even weakened. If that isn't true we have not educated to a high purpose in this country."

In discussing the tax problem in Liberty, Bernarr Macfadden says the increased burden saddled on taxpayers pays little more than half of present government expenses. He says the effort to find a taxing procedure that the public will not feel has given us all kinds of hidden taxes. Then he suggests the sales tax, to which many have strenuously objected, as a substitute for all other tax sources, and as the way to make people tax conscious. He thinks that would be the way to awaken demands for retrenchment and budget-balancing.

The Herald is pleased to receive news stories or opinions for publication, but they should be accompanied by the authors' names, so that we may know the source. If communications are sent anonymously, they are likely to land in the wastebasket, and thus deprive the reading public of proper news or of desirable ideas. One should identify what he writes, not necessarily for publication, but for the information of the editor.

When a majority of the freshmen in Princeton voted Hitler the greatest person did they thus endorse the nazi form of government? And are these freshmen typical of many in high-ranking American colleges? If so, it is high time they learned more facts about the merciless processes forced as the accepted order in totalitarian states, and they need to be reinforced in the fundamentals of democracy.

The current Nation's Business map showing an upswing in the prosperity cycle will be applauded by this area as an altruistic spectator. Eastern states occupy a field of white with the business barometer reported registering not far below normal. Every favorable trend in the times in several years has caught us unprepared on account of drouth to feel jubilant.

Mark Sullivan says the republican party has plenty of good material from which to select a presidential candidate besides Vandenberg, Taft and Dewey, and mentions Representative James W. Wadsworth of New York, who, if he should succeed as a dark horse, would meet every expectation.

It is claimed the war is being fought with propaganda, and while we give what we think is deservedly low appraisal to propaganda, it is vastly preferable to bullets and bombs. Happily, Americans have learned to differentiate between news and propaganda and not to let the latter sink in.

Setting at rest the talk of running as an independent, Senator Burke says he is a democrat and will enter the senatorial race as a democrat. He does not propose to let the new deal root him out of his place in the party of his choice. His opponent for the nomination will be Gov. Cochran.

The weather has behaved poorly for growing crops, and is now unseasonal for heavy merchandise. If the elements could be normal, merchants as well as farmers would know how to make their plans.

A writer says so-called big business owes something to the new deal because the latter has drawn the fire of adverse public criticism with which the former had heretofore been belabored.

DISQUIETING. The disturbing report comes from New York City that eighty per cent of the young people in that city have become convinced that unemployment conditions prevent success to personal ability. They have arrived at the unhealthy conclusion that no talent, no skill, no ambition can overcome unemployment inertia. Thus, instead of creating, or opportunities, instead of using their initiative, they are surrendering to the belief that the cards have been stacked against them. Since the government has meddled with sources of employment beyond the needs of wise regulation, jobs in private industry have inevitably decreased. Unsatisfactory government paternalism has not kept up with shrinkage of private employment rolls. If the administration at Washington could see the wisdom of softening some of its master reform strokes—notably the wage and hour law, the Wagner labor statute and the social security setup—employment sources of employment would undoubtedly feel encouraged to absorb idlers, thus reducing government responsibility, and restoring the essentials of individual pride and content. Awards Damages in Court Action Here

Clifford Munson Is Favored In Suit Involving Loss Of Mare Here.

Clifford Munson was awarded \$50 damages by county court Wednesday last week in an action filed against John W. Schram of Sioux City, for loss of a horse.

Munson's petition, filed by H. E. Siman, charged that when the plaintiff was riding his mare eastward near his home two and a half miles west of Wakefield September 1 about 7:30 in the evening, Schram came in his car from the west and struck the mare which died a few minutes later. Munson stated that he jumped to safety and that the mare was dragged 33 feet. He charged Schram with careless driving and excessive speed. Munson sought to recover \$250 for the horse, a valuable breaking mare, and \$3.50 spent for veterinary services, a total of \$253.50.

Schram, through Kingsbury & Kingsbury, Burr R. Davis, Clum & Miller, filed a cross petition. In this Schram stated that he and his wife and three daughters, also Mrs.

Schram's sister and another child were riding in the car at a careful speed when they came upon the horse. Schram claimed that Munson's jumping off to the right of the animal frightened the mare so that the horse jumped in front of the car. He further charged that the occupants of the car were injured and that the car was damaged. Schram sought \$200 for injury to those in the car and \$74.79 for damage to the machine, a total of \$274.79.

In the hearing November 22, Clifford Munson, C. J. Ellis, Harry Munson, Wm. Victor, Elmer Lundberg and J. H. Pile testified for plaintiff, and John W. Schram, A. F. Herkents, A. M. Kern, Norma Schram, Mrs. John W. Schram, Mrs. Wm. Henkel and Arlene Schram for defendant.

Judge J. M. Cherry found generally for the plaintiff, Clifford Munson, and set the value of the horse at \$50. The court ordered that plaintiff recover \$50 with interest at 6 per cent from November 22 and that defendant be taxed costs of \$23.45.

Defendant has 10 days in which to appeal.

so he picked up a cigaret package. "I found a nickel in it and I was elated but I did not consider it a very good trade for the knife I lost on the way," the youth explained. "We proceeded about two miles when we met Rev. Whitman. He had Johnny Einung with him and also Rex Johnson. He took us a mile from camp and when we had gone about a half mile Bob got some candy at a station. "When we came to camp we were three very hungry and tired scouts, but very far from discouraged," Fredric concludes.

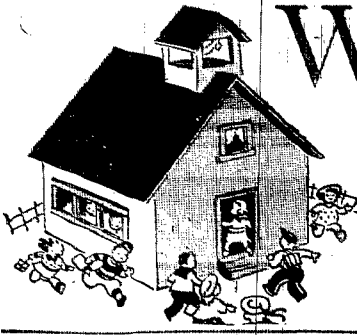

Health Seal Sale Is Being Conducted

Half of Funds Raised Will Remain Here for Welfare Work in Wayne County.

The annual sale of health seals is conducted by the National Tuberculosis Association through the schools between Thanksgiving and Christmas. Funds from the sale of penny seals are used for health work, half to go to the fund and half to remain for county welfare work.

A double-barred cross pin will be given each child who sells 25 seals. A Christmas pencil, notebook or comb will be presented for sale of 100 seals. Awards to schools on points are as follows: A set of anagrams or pick-up sticks for \$2 worth of seals; bongo set ten worth of seals; playground for \$3 worth; first aid kit, baseball bat, Chinese checker game, scholastic ball or soft ball for \$10 worth of seals; a complete ping pong set for \$12 worth.

The 1939 and 1940 double-barred cross pin is designed by Rockwell Kent. The red cross and double bars used in the campaign against tuberculosis throughout the year has been chosen as a sign for courage, health and the desire to make a healthy world—one from which tuberculosis will be banished. The National Tuberculosis Association chose the double-barred cross as its emblem in 1909.

Sixty Years Ago

To middle westerners whose lives have been comparatively free from disturbances, the almost continual upheaval abroad is hard to realize.

Financial conditions in Constantinople were reported as desperate. Government paper money depreciated until it would not pass at any rate and even copper money last 60 per cent of its normal value.

Conditions in England also led to resignation of Lord Chelmsford. There cotton spinners suspended because of strikes. This was also true in Switzerland, and directors of the big institutions committed suicide.

While English troops were being returned from Africa where they had settled a disturbance, Russian troops were ordered into Bulgaria to quiet things down.

Russia too had troubles at home. Terrible lists were reported added to the "martyrs of liberty." Nihilists attempted to destroy the palace at Moscow, saturating the great staircase with petroleum and firing it.

In addition to its political trouble, Russia was afflicted with a cattle plague in 1879. Agarian disturbances broke out in Poland and two towns in west Siberia were burned by revolutionists.

The affairs of royalty also concerned the public in Europe. The proposed marriage of King Alfonso of Spain, and the archduchess of Austria, resulted in disagreement and abandonment of the plan.

People in England were disturbed because of the habits of a spendthrift who had used up \$2,500,000 in eight years.

Emperor William, of England, the edition states, though a man of 82, sleeps on a bed hard enough for the Duke of Wellington. He does not smoke or use snuff, is fond of flowers and fresh air, rises early and fares frugally. He can ride horseback like a trooper.
