Democracy Kept Active by School

HUNDREDS responded to the invitation to inspect the remodeled and enlarged school building Sunday. Completion of the improvement is a source of pride to teachers, children and parents. 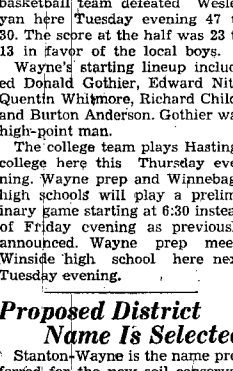

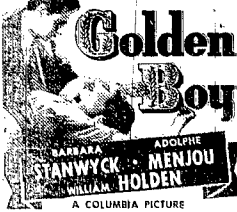

Heater Useful Device on Farms

Heating the water for livestock not only prevents freezing over, but in some instances encourages the animals to drink more water, according to Agent Chester Walters. Experiments have shown that fat cattle make considerably more gains with warm water than with cold.

Although the old wood and oil burning heaters are still used to a great extent, the county agent predicts many of these will be replaced with electric heaters where rural electric service is available.

According to E. A. Olson, assistant agricultural extension engineer at the University of Nebraska, home-made electric tank heaters of various kinds have been on trial at the agricultural college for a number of years. These heaters are made of lead covered soft heating cable and can be built by the average workman at a nominal cost.

Good insulation around a tank to be heated is of major importance, Olson points out. Provision should be made to keep the insulation dry, as most insulation loses much of its effectiveness when wet. Dry straw or earth will serve effectively if the tank is carefully banked and the insulation is protected from moisture.

Information relative to various types of heaters can be obtained without charge at the Wayne county farm bureau office.



Tenant Purchase Plan Progressing

In the tenant purchase plan under the Jones-Bankhead act, Wayne county has been allotted funds for the purchase of 10 farms. If this number cannot be purchased at a price in line with the productive value of the farms, the funds will be transferred to other counties so they can benefit as many as possible, according to Roy Verzal of FSA. Options are being taken by applicants, but to hurry the program along the FSA is asking anyone who has a farm which is for sale to list it at the court house. Purchase of these farms will be on a cash basis and no amounts will be carried back by the seller, according to Mr. Verzal, supervisor. The farms must be listed by December 20 so the office will know the amount of funds to encumber. The balance of the allotment will be lost and the county will not receive the full benefit of the tenant purchase program, according to Mr. Verzal.

Sixty Years Ago

Excitement aplenty reigned in New York one day 60 years ago when a herd of Texas steers, shipped to the city, broke loose in Harlem district and ran wild for three hours, according to a dispatch in the Northern Nebraska Journal published at Ponca in 1879 by Wm. Huse. To illustrate how people lost their heads, the item told that one woman who was wheeling a baby buggy ran into a store and left her child outside in the carriage. One bull came to the baby's carriage, sniffed at the little one and then ran and rammed its head into an ice wagon. Police lassoed or shot all the animals they could not manage by hand. After the three-hour period of terror the steers were either in custody or were lying dead on the streets. Washington territory was being settled fast in 1879. It was reported that 130,000 had already gone there. The early paper notes that a new variety of sweet potato was being cultivated. It was predicted that it would produce better sugar than the beet. Nebraska City scheduled a baby show and offered prizes of \$100 for the little folks. The outlaw, Doc Middleton, who was captured in his hideout near Niobrara, was taken to Cheyenne for trial for stealing horses. Rewards for his capture ran up to \$5,000. The Red River country produced six million bushels of wheat, an average of 20 bushels to the acre. The rush to Leadville, Colo., continued with important discoveries of ore reported almost every day. Now Mexico was reputed to be a richer mining country than California. A vein of coal 28 feet thick was said to lie beneath a million acres, and gold and silver along the streams promised to be better deposits than in California or the Black Hills. The W. E. Science Meeting Held at College

About 40 instructors from 14 schools attended the science program at Wayne college Saturday. Marvin Feddersen of Wayne, is president, and Miss Mary Tyrell of Blair, vice president. Another such gathering is planned here later. In speaking on "Challenging Students in General Science," Supt. N. F. Thorpe favored greater student freedom to work out actual problems and less circumspection by texts. He gives precedence to student growth rather than fact learning. J. R. Vinkel, Blair superintendent, feels that physics should be made practical with use of problems close to students but he thinks a fund of facts is prerequisite. Chemistry in everyday life was presented by Earl Franzen of Norfolk, who showed how the subject can be interesting and practical in everyday life. Making sound pictures from silent ones was Dr. H. D. Griffin's subject. Many fine silent pictures could be converted into sound pictures by use of readers or records. Dr. Walter Benkath expressed the opinion that teachers need to be careful in vocational direction of students, not building hopes too high or too low. Only a few go into professions so the need is to help more children find themselves vocationally. W. H. Siebert of Sioux City, gave some helpful suggestions of tree surgery.

Record of Long Service Is Made By Judge Cherry



Thirty-six years as secretary of Wayne Masonic lodge is the unusual record established by Judge J. M. Cherry who last Friday declined reelection to the post. Besides holding office longer than any other in the history of the local lodge, Judge Cherry has served this group as master and in all other official capacities.

In addition to belonging to the Blue lodge, Judge Cherry is a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason. Judge Cherry is one of the pioneers who has experienced the thrill of watching modern Wayne county develop from raw prairie. None of these early settlers will ever be able to realize how closely their lives are entwined with years of development.

Judge Cherry came in 1884 to Wayne, then a small village with little frame business shanties on either side of a sod main street and with few homes scattered short distances away in all directions on the treeless prairie. In 1886 Judge Cherry was chosen manager of the Milligan & English lumber yard in the then developing town of Windsor. Two years later the company sold the yard and Judge Cherry went to Lindsay.

Steve Russell, manager of the Milligan & English elevator in Wayne, was elected county clerk in 1890 and the company wired Judge Cherry to come back to Wayne and have charge of the business, which he did.

Judge Cherry served as county sheriff and treasurer. He has been since 1920. His public service, as well as his lodge service, compile a noteworthy record.

Wm. Beckenhauer Invites Public to Parlors Here Next Saturday.



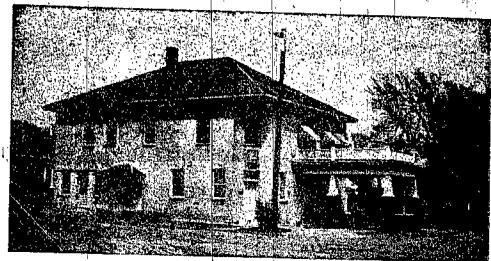

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Howard drove from Portland to Pomona a few days earlier to be present for the golden wedding occasion. Mr. Howard is with the Pacific Telephone company at Portland, in the building engineering department. Their daughters, Jean and Dencie Mae, were unable to attend the dinner.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard, the latter formerly Ida M. Feather, were married in Wayne Thanksgiving day, November 28, 1889, by Rev. F. B. Baker, Mr. Howard taught in the city school and was county superintendent from 1889 to 1899. Then he became cashier in the Citizens National bank here. The family moved to California in the 90's. Mr. Howard is 83 and Mrs. Howard is 78.

Life in Panama Canal Zone Differs Vastly from Middle Western States

Many people are employed at good salaries but everyone is "broke" most of the time in the Panama canal zone. This is the observation made by Paul Berntson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Berntson of Wayne, who is in the government employ at Balboa Heights.

"Everything in the zone is government owned and controlled. There are three places to eat in Balboa Heights and all are government owned and controlled, Paul explains. These include the club house, the Y. M. C. A. and cafeteria in the executive building. The government also owns and operates the only store, called the commissary, also the theatre, bowling alleys, etc.

For one lunch Paul ordered a ham sandwich, piece of pie and milk and the cost was 35c. Milk is high in the zone, 15c a pint. Frosted meats such as steaks and chops are expensive, 75c and 80c a pound. The native meat is a lot less and that is usually what one gets when eating in cafes, Paul explains. This meat has a peculiar taste and the Wayne youth adds, "I don't like it." He says that most people seem to get used to it.

Paul had Thanksgiving dinner in Ancon, which is just over the hill from Balboa. "So far I don't think I've eaten any mangoes, but I have eaten papaya, avacados, coconuts from the tree and even fresh pineapple. One can get a whole dozen bananas for 5c. There are also large groves of oranges and grapefruit up in the interior but one has to go into the republic before he can buy any native fruits. Here in the zone the government controls all business and everything is shipped down from the states."

While in Ancon the Wayne youth visited the Gorgas hospital, one of the seven best in the world. Approximately 600 patients are hospitalized all the time with accommodations for 750. There are over 135 doctors and internes, too.

Duty on Gifts Sent.

On the same trip Paul went to Panama City with the idea of buying some Christmas presents, but "I didn't," Paul adds, "because I found that the recipient of the article would have to pay a duty amounting almost to the cost of the article. A person can take so much merchandise with him when leaving, but otherwise there's a duty on everything."

"There is a church in Panama with a solid gold altar which I want to see," adds Paul. "It was for this altar that some early explorer was hunting but was unsuccessful back in the days of Ponce de Leon and Columbus."

Paul visited the zoo in Panama City and saw more varieties of monkeys and birds than he ever imagined existed. Some parrots with the brightest red plumage were flying loose in the park. Many native snakes, lizards, alligators, wild boars, deer, sloths,

farm grain will supply the extra nutrients necessary before lambing. Sheep use such hard grains as rye, barley and grain sorghums more efficiently than any other class of live stock. It is not necessary to grind these grains for ewes with sound teeth though all grains should be ground for broken-mouthed ewes.

Ewes require a larger percentage of protein than beef cows since the wool clip is made up largely of protein. There is a close relationship between the ration fed and the weight and quality of wool clip. A generous feed of alfalfa or one-fifth to one-fourth pound daily of some high protein feed such as soybean meal or cotton cake will supply the protein needs.

Although valuable for any breeding stock, exercise is particularly important to bred ewes. If green feed is not available, it can rustle to advantage in a stalk or stubble field. In stormy weather ewes should be fed their roughage a quarter mile from the shed to insure exercise.

Winter Feeding of Ewes Is Important More care in winter feeding of lambs means less trouble at lambing time, according to Agent Chester Walters. Sorghum fodder or silage will make up a considerable amount of the ewe's ration on many farms. These roughages are entirely satisfactory but are low in protein and mineral. If silage is fed, the sheep will crave some dry feed in addition. If ewes are in good condition, no grain will be necessary until near lambing time. But if ewes are old and have poor teeth, they must have a generous feed of ground grain through the fall and winter in order to raise a strong lamb crop and shear well.

Even ewes in good condition should be fed some grain for about six weeks before lambing. Rations low in grain and protein account for most of the loss from so-called ewe paralysis. One-half to one pound daily of any
