Brutal assaults at the hands of guards when Jimmy was so sick he dould hardly stand contributed in a large measure to his untimely death, which occurred in the chain gang camp spon after chain gang camp soon after had been sent there. Today

was the case of Jimmy Blaine unique? No! Except for the tragic ending, all the circumstances are being repeated every stances are being repeated every day in this great country of ours. Many a hitchhiker you pass on the public highway is another "Jimny Blaine," inexperienced irresponsible Jimmy Blaine," inexperienced, irresponsible, perhaps a little wayward but in no sense criminal. The results of his adventures may be worse than death itself.

tures may be worse than death itself.
Young Jimmy should never have been imprisoned or sentenced to a chain gang. How many of you readers, young or old, fathers and grandfathers, have not stolen a ride? And yet, for this slight offense Jimmy was thrown into prison and in a few short weeks died a territying and agonizing death away from his relatives and friends.

The most condemning thing about it all is the neglect of many would-be courts of justice to provide means for learning the past records and true characters of "Jimmy Blaines," and their failure to protect and help





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
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
